- 2 cups all-purpose flour
- 1 cup firmly packed brown sugar
- 1 teaspoon baking soda
- 1/2 teaspoon salt (optional)
- 1 cup applesauce
- 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 1 egg
- 2-1/2 cups Quaker oats (quick or old fashioned, uncooked)
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 1 cup raisins

Heat oven to 350°F. Beat margarine and sugar until creamy. Add applesauce, egg and vanilla; beat well. Gradually add combined flour, baking soda, salt and cinnamon; mix well. Stir in oats and raisins. Drop by rounded tablespoonfuls onto ungreased cookie sheet. Bake 11 to 13 minutes or until light golden brown. Cool 1 minute on cookie sheet. Remove to wire rack; cool completely. Store covered at room temperature. **About 4 dozen**

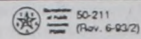
