"Dragnet" Keeps Tabs On Boll **Weevil Movement**

The phermone traps, or sex trans as they are called, are bright vellow and each is sexily baited with four live male boll weevils. The trap itself stands about a foot tall and is coated with a sticky substance which snares weevils as they are attracted to the caged live weevils in the center.

"The system of traps will enable us to keep tabs on the movement of veevils into the High Plains area to pinpoint 'hot spots', " points out the entomologist. 




