U. F. Coker, Jr.

U. F. Coker, Jr. entered the Armed Forces on November 4, 1942. He served in the U.S. Army Infantry. He trained at Oklahoma, California and Washington. U.F. went overseas on April 26, 1943. He was in the Theatre of Operations in Alaska. He received the following decorations: Good Conduct Medal, World War II Victory Medal and Asiatic-Pacific Theatre Ribbon.

He returned to the U.S. in February 1, 1946 at North Carolina. He achieved the rank of Technical Sergeant and served a total of thirty-nine months.




William Abner Rucker

William Abner Rucker entered the Armed Forces on September 13, 1942. He served in the U.S. N. R. V6 6175936 and was assigned to Motor Torpedo Squadron 16: Companies in Gulf Antisubmarine Patrol. He was in the Theatre of Operations in the Pacific at Attu & Kiska-1943 (Alaska), New Guinea-1944, Palawian & Battle of Lenguian Gulf-1944, Mendaua, Leyte Mendera & Luzon-1944 & 1945, and in Borneo-1945. He was discharged on December 15, 1945 at the Fargo Building in Boston Massachusetts.


Turkey's next jamboree is May 4th at the Bob Wills Community

From Nashville, Tennessee Terry was voted by the Traditional Music Association as its songwriter of the Year in both 1995 and 1996. He wrote the song "Far Side Banks of Jordan" which is featured twice in Robert Duvall's movie, The Apostle. It has been recorded by more than fifty artists including Johnny and June Carter Cash, and Allison Kraus and has won three Grammys. Terry has written about 2000 songs and some of them have been recorded by such greats as Kitty Wells, The Oak Ridge Boys, Chris LeDoux, Roy Acuff and others.

A traditional singer in his own right Terry has released five albums of original material to date. He writes gospel, ballads, novelty, story songs, honky-tonk, and western swing. You need to listen closely to every word because he has such a unique way with words. He is indeed a "Songwriter With A Different Touch" His novelty songs will certainly make you laugh and his ballads story songs and love songs touch not just your heart, but your soul as well. Terry was raised in Denton, Texas and says his roots are still in Texas. He taught English and coached baseball in schools in Texas and Tennessee before he gave it up to become a full time singer and songwriter. He has steadily built a following over the years in Europe, Australia, New Zealand, and the U.S. Terry will be backed by some of the Turkey Gems with special guest drummer, Jack Greubel. Is The Farm Bill A Done Deal? Almost

Over the past two months farmers and ranchers have watched with a mixture of anticipation and dread the progress being made toward finalizing a new Farm Bill.

For most of these interested watchers frustration has usually outweighed other reactions at the snail's pace with which the House/Senate Conference seemed to move

That cycle, though, has apparently been broken as House and Senate Conference Committee members came together Friday afternoon, April 26, to announce that a final Farm Bill framework is virtually complete. Senior negotiators from the House and Senate have been meeting regularly over the past week and apparently forged the deal during those

The agreed upon framework evidently does away with many of the

more onerous provisions contained in the senate bill and reestablishes a missing safety net for U.S. agriculture. No final figures have been released concerning loan rates, fixed payment rates or target price values although some figures have been reported by a variety of sources. Some of the numbers being discussed are included in the table below

Of key importance when looking at these figures is that the numbers

quoted above are not yet cast in stone.

The results of the Congressional Budget Office (CBO) score on the compromise agreement and its provisions could dictate minor adjustments on a commodity-by-commodity basis.

Of particular interest to cotton producers, however, is the language on payment limitations. The original Senate pay limit provision would have disproportionately impacted growers in the southern U.S. and reduced the protection and limitations. the protection available to them

Key parts of the payment limit provisions include a \$40,000 per per son limit on fixed, decoupled payments; a \$65,000 per person limit on counter-cyclical payments; and, a \$75,000 per person limit on loan deficiency payments and marketing loan gains. Also included in the agreement was retention of the 3-entity rule; current rules regarding spouses and actively engaged designations; and, the availability of generic certifi-

Generic certificates have been one of the most misunderstood and overly maligned provisions of the marketing loan program, even though their primary purpose is to allow all of a producer's production to benefit from the minimum protection provided by the marketing loan program when prices fall to the unprecedented levels of the past few years.

Overall the parts of the final agreement that have been discussed at this time are a boon to the cotton producers of W est Texas and will allow

them to focus their full attention on producing the 2002 crop.

The agreement should also allow many growers and their lending in stitutions to refigure production and operating loans with a more secure safety net underpinning their efforts.

ARB Begin Property Owner Protest Hearings On May 15th - 17th

Property owners in the Hall County Appraisal District will have an opportunity on May 15 - 17th to protest proposed appraisals of their property for local taxes. The districts Appraisal Review Board (ARB) will begin hearing taxpayer protests on July 3rd.

After the ARB completes its hearings and approves final property appraisals local government will use these energies be a 2000.

After the ARB completes its hearings and approves final property appraisals, local governments will use these appraisals to set 2002 tax rates. The ARB is a group of citizens who live in the appraisal district and are appointed by the district's board of directors. Their responsibilities and qualifications are outlined in the Texas Property Tax code. Property owners may protest to the ARB any of the following appraisal office actions: * the appraised or agricultural value of the property in the district. *inclusion of the property on the appraisal records. *denial of the partial exemption, such as a homestead exemption. * denial of agricultural use, open space, or timber productivity appraisal. * determination that agricultural or timber land has had a change of use and is subject to a rollback tax. *identification of the taxing unit or units in subject to a rollback tax. *identification of the taxing unit or units in which the property is located. *determination that the taxpayer is the owner of the property. *any other action of the appraisal office that adversely effects the property owner.

Marlin Felts, Chief Appraiser for the district, outlined the steps a property owner.

erty owner must take to file a protest. First, the property owner must file a written notice of protest that shows why the owner protesting to the ARB. The taxpayer must file this notice by May 31 or within 30 days after the appraisal district mails the taxpayer a notice of appraised value

Felts said that hearing will be held on Wednesday July 3 and that the ARB expects to approve the final appraisal roll on July 22. State law requires the ARB to review and approve the appraisal records by July 20, or when not more than 5 percent of the total property value in the district remains under protest.


Those protesting their appraisals should not contact ARB members outside the hearing, the Chief Appraiser stressed. Each ARB member must sign an affidavit that he or she has had no contact about the protest with a property owner or the appraisal office staff before the hearing



The Cattle Cycle - Where Are We?

About at the bottom, according to the Food and Agricultural Policy Institute. They predict beef cow numbers to start increasing, peaking around 2007. Conversely, they predict weaned calf prices to stay about where they are, start down sometime next year and bottom out in 2008 - 09, declining by around \$25 - 30/cwt over that period. If so, high dollar heifers saved this year will probably hit their peak productive years during the period of lowest calf prices. Cows with two or three years productive life left might not be as risky. Of course, numbers predictions are just that, and can be influenced by a lot of things, not least of which are weather and politics, domestic and international. The current cattle cycle is in its 13th year, longer than the average of about 10 years. Who knows what will happen for sure? Nobody, but you should plan on what is most likely and adjust as things change, or look like they'll change.

Stink buts can be quite a stench for producers and vegetable garden-

ers to deal with, Texas Cooperative Extension reports.
"Stink bugs are often a nuisance as they move around from one crop to another," said Dr. John Jackman, Extension Entomologist in College Sta-tion. "We see the worst problems when field crops are drying up and they move to whatever is still green which concentrated their numbers." Some stink bugs overwinter as adults in small numbers, Jackman said.

They usually build up their numbers later in the season. Also, like all insects, they tend to grow faster in the warmer weather, he said.

"Some stink bugs are actually beneficial and feed on other stink bugs."

Jackman said. "However, many do feed on plants, seeds and fruit."

They feed with a piercing mouth so the damage is a puncture. Dam-e can include irregular shaped peaches, pock marked tomatoes, off color

black eyed peas and similar damages.

"They produce a foul odor from glands on the underside," Jackman said "They release it when disturbed, threatened or frightened."

He said stink bugs are difficult to control for a couple of reasons.

The sucking moth does not pick up much insecticide when they feed so contact insecticides are usually required," Jackman said. "Product selection depends on the particular site, son be sure to check product labels for current use regulations and follow label instructions."

The second reason stink bugs are difficult to control is that once they are adults they can fly well. Jackman said if you kill out bugs today you may have a whole new batch that will move in tomorrow.

"Organic gardeners are almost limited to hand picking stink bugs to control them," he said. "When doing this, watch for egg masses that can be crushed before they hatch.
