The 1987 Briscoe Co. Jr. Livestock Show was held Saturday at Silverton. The show was participated in by 58 FFA and 4-H members from Valley and Silverton Schools. These students competed for over six thousand dollars in prize money donated by generous businesses and individuals in and around the county. Valley FFA and 4-H club members took 672 animals to the show.

Suzie Farley of the Valley FFA showed the Grand Champion Lamb. Of the 31 lambs in the show, her 158 lb. Suffolk lamb won the heavy weight medium wool class and medium wool champion on his way to the Grand Champion Lamb. Scott's 127 lb. Suffolk Lamb won the Light Medium Weight Medium Wool Class and Reserve Medium Wool breed championship on his way to the Reserve Grand Championship. Clay Merrell of the

This past week she purchased the remaining stock of drugs and bottles from Mr. Irby of City Drug in Turkey, who closed earlier this month. This is another effort she has taken to be of service to her community. A more complete line of drugs is now available to compliment her laboratory and x-ray services, making her clinic a complete one stop emergency medical center.

Weatherly Resigns As Hall Co. Hospital Head

Hall County Commissioners accepted the resignation of Hall County Hospital Administrator Jerry Weatherly during a Hospital Board meeting Friday, January 23.

Administrator Weatherly resigned last Thursday after accepting the position of Administrator of Ochsleer General Hospital in Perryton.

OGH Administrator Billy Robertson will depart Jan. 23 to take a similar position in Wheeler. Weatherly's resignation becomes effective Feb. 1, according to Hall County Judge James Chappell.

"Our County Commissioners Friday night after accepting Weatherly's resignation, will be discussing a replacement to fill the administrator position," Judge Chappell said.

"After taking a hard look at leasing, it would appear we can operate the hospital as economically as a leasing company could," Judge Chappell said.

Jerry Weatherly moved to Memphis in October 1982, to be the Hospital Administrator of Hall County Hospital, from Rotan where for two years he was the Administrator of the Fisher County Hospital

Weatherly started in the hospital business as a clinical laboratory and X-ray technician of Haskell Memorial Hospital in Haskell. After over seven years in that position, Weatherly was promoted to administrator.

A graduate of Turkey High School, Weatherly Attended Houston College of Medical Technology, graduating in 1966.

Superintendent's Corner

A difficult curriculum requirement set down by the state of Texas has increased the actual number of courses a school must offer a student during his high school career. Small high schools with limited classroom space, staff, and funds discover it must be innovative in order to meet state standards.

According to the standards, each school district must make available to each student as many as eight English courses, seven math courses, five science, four social studies, two physical education, health, two fine arts courses, three business, two vocational, two foreign language, and one computer.

The school district must provide each student the opportunity to participate in all the courses listed above but the student is not required to take all courses in order to graduate. From these courses the student will take fourteen required units (credits) and seven electives for the necessary 21 units needed for graduation from Valley School.

A paramount question becomes "Suppose only one or two students request that a particular subject be offered?" State law stipulates that if ten or more students indicate a desire to participate in any of the courses, the course must be offered. For those courses where fewer than ten students express a desire to take the course then the school must offer the course but may use an alternate delivery procedure.

Most alternative methods of offering a necessary class are impractical. There are possibilities of cooperating with neighboring schools or even contracting with other institutions to provide needed courses. These methods can be difficult to administer, cause transportation headaches, and will probably prove to be very expensive.

The use of technology is a method making its way into the scene and is becoming quite popular in many areas of the state. This may become the next best way to provide high level course offerings which small schools are now unable to teach. A number of technological advancements have been introduced that appear to be an effective tool in both cost and

delivery of needs. The capability is available to provide interaction between a teacher in Austin and a trigonometry student at Valley via satellite.

Valley School improved its curriculum this year by the addition of a course which is taught by Mrs. Scrivner to high school students. Data Processing is a course taught by the use of computers to prepare students for college or the business world.

Two new students have enrolled at Valley School. Kirk and Scott Garner have transferred from Clarendon and live in Quitaque with their father, John Garner. Kirk is an eighth grade student, and Scott is a sophomore. We welcome these students to Valley and hope they enjoy going to school here.

The Valley Patriots will be playing their final two basketball games this Friday night at Silverton and next Tuesday at Valley against Hedley. Two wins here should clinch the district championship for the girls and boys.

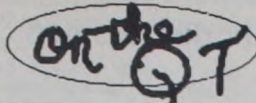
