## Deputy Sheriff Warns Residents To Take Caution in Coming Months

Sometimes we take for granted that we will have our children forever. We make plans for their future, never daring to think that we might lose them at any time. The tragedy at Lake Mackenzie Saturday

should make us all aware that at any time we can lose the ones that we take for granted. Just moments after returning home from this tragedy, still thinking about the boy's family and how they would bear this loss forever, my own son came in, scared and shaking, and told me that someone had run a stop sign and almost hit him on his bicycle. Only a week ago I was taking a prisoner to Tulia, driving faster than I should have been, when a teenage boy ran in front of me chasing a basketball. I swerved, and missed him barely. Both times the drivers avoided a tragedy; however, by driving safely and observing the law, these children would not have had near misses.

Parents, teach the children about safety, practice it yourselves. Buckle your children up, we all know what good drivers we are--the trouble is there are too many others out there who know what good drivers they are. Children, watch each other. If it doesn't look safe, don't do it. Tell your friends not to do it, and tell your parents not to do it. You can't imagine how important safety is...until you see a child die.

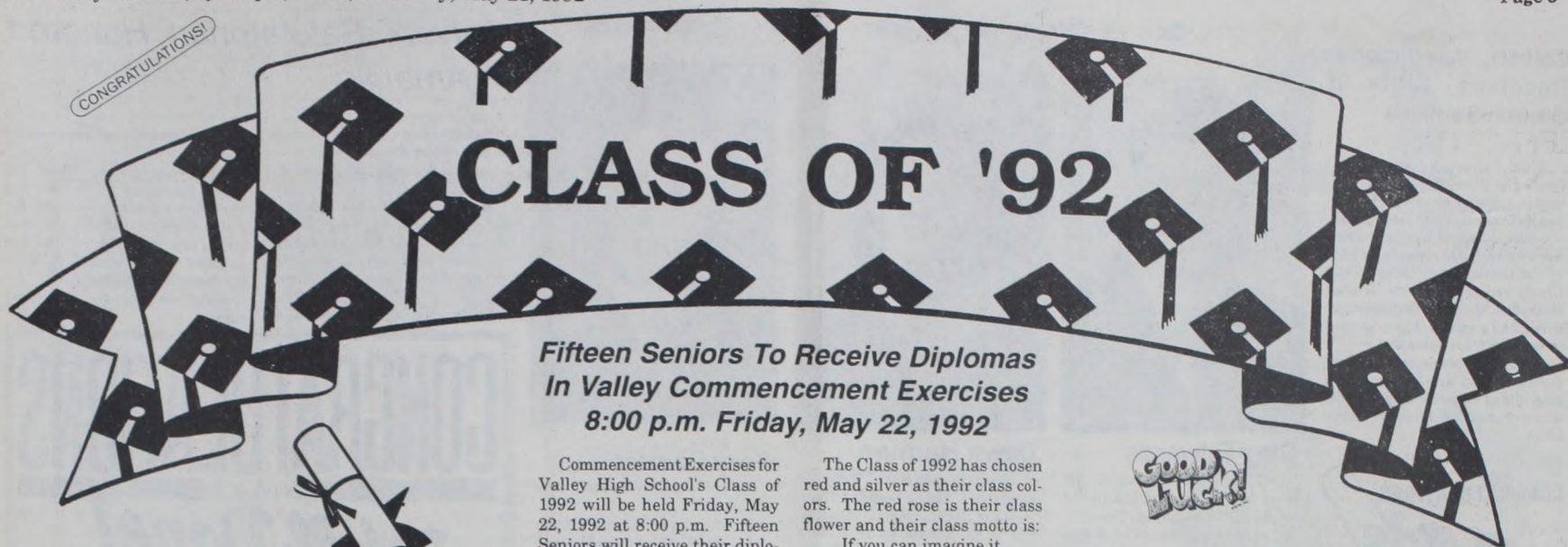

Superintendent Jerry Smith and Valley School Board President Rusty Henson will then present the diplomas to the graduates.

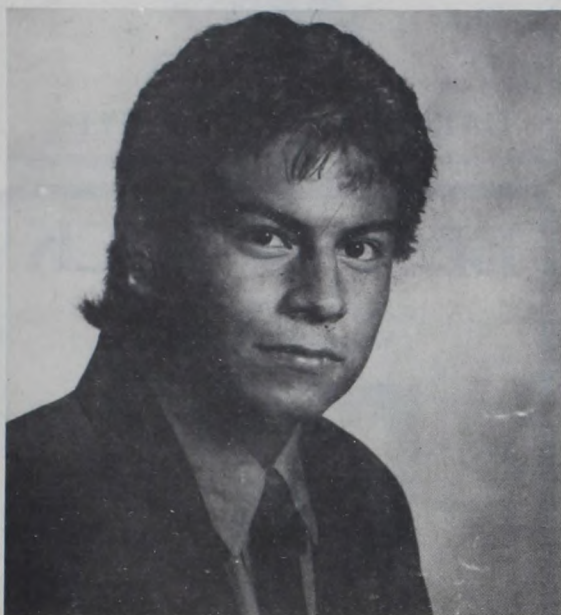
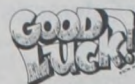

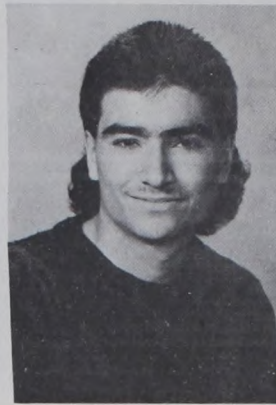
Branda was active in other ways too, she was president of the pep squad, president of spirit community, member of student counsel and basketball captain her senior year (which was shared by the other seniors on the team).

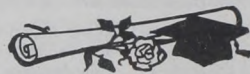
