Advised to Protect Infants
Turkey Residents Warned of Nitrate In Water
The Texas-natural Resource Commission has tested Turkey wigh enough level to cause concern among parents of very young infants.
The Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission (TNRCC) sets drinking water standards and has determined that nitrate poses an acute health concern at certain levels of exposure. Nitrate is used in fertilizer and is found in sewage and wastes from human
and/or farm animals and generally gets into drinking water from and/or farm animals and generally gets into drinking water from
those activities. Excessive levels of nitrate in drinking water have caused serious illness and sometimes death in infants under six months of age. The serious illness in infants is caused because nitrate is converted to NITRITE in the body. Nitrite interferes acute disease in that symptoms can develop rapidly in infants. In most cases, health deteriorates over a period of days.
Symptoms include shortness of breath and blueness of the skin. Clearly, expert medical advice should be sought immediately if
these symptoms occur.
Letters have been sent out to notify Turkey residents of the
results of thenitratetest, toencourage parentsand other responsible results of the nitrate test, to encourage parents and other responsible parties to provide infants with an alternate source of drinking
water. Local and state health authorities are the best source for water. Local and state health authorities are the best source for
information concerning alternate sources of drinking water for
TNRCC has set the drinking water standard at 10 parts per million ( ppm ) for nitrate to protect against the risk of these adverse effects. It has also set a drimking water standard for nitrite at 1 ppm . To allow for the fact that the toxicity of nitrate and nitrite are
additive, TNRCC has also established a standard for the sum of nitrate and nitrite at 10 ppm . Drinking water that meets the TNRCC standard is associated with little to none of this risk and
is considered safe with respect to nitrate.
