The winter months are ideal for planting trees and shrubs. The correct plant in the proper location is important, but equally important is proper soil prepara-tion prior to planting. The key to successful plant growth is a well-prepared garden soil. Time spent in soil preparation prior to planting will reduce later

maintenance, watering and diffi-cult soil conditioning. Poor internal soil drainage is

Foor internal soil drainage is harmful to the roots of almost all plants. Soil drainage refers not only to the surface slope, but also to the downward movement of water through the soil. Drainage is often pooled in heavy clay soils. Soil where water stands for soils. Soil where water stands for a day or two following a rain indicates a poor internal drain-age. This type of soil indicates low oxygen supply. Oxygen is essential for good root growth. When water is trapped in soil due to poor drainage, the roots of the plant will finally rot. If your soil drainage is poor.

If your soil drainage is poor, try raising your planting beds above the surrounding soil level. If you are planting trees or large shrubs, postholes may be dug in the bottom of the planting digs and filled with gravel. This will greatly aid in the drainage of excess water away from

In soil that is very heavy or an soil that is very neavy or one containing mostly clay, it may be necessary to dig all the soil out and replace it with good topsoil. Sometimes, tight soils can be satisfactorily improved by mixing sand, peat moss, well-rot-ted manure or compost material. Winter is probably the best

Winter is probably the best season of the year to plant trees and shrubs. A winter planting insures needed moisture and root development prior to spring growth. The average gardener tends to have more time in the winter. The good nurseryman will certainly welcome your business at this time of the year instead of your waiting until the spring rush.

Shrubs and trees planted now will take advantage of the early planting. No top growth is in evidence during the winter, but signs of spring, this will begin to change. The sturdy,

developed root system makes it possible for the individual plant to take advantage of the full surge of spring growth. The result will be a maximum of growth throughout the spring. A winter planting insures well-dev-

eloped roots prior to summer heat and possible drought. Take a good look around your home and see what an improve-ment a new tree, shrub or border planting might make in your total landscape picture. Then, make a stop at your local nursery and see what they have to offer you which will best suit your

CONSERVATION COMPLI ANCE is a term new to most of you; however, it is a term you need to become familiar with due to the enactment of the 1985 Farm Bill. What this portion of the 1985 Farm Bill says is that if you produce crops on highly erodible cropland, you must have a conservation plan approved on your farm by 1990. By 1995, you must be carrying out that plan to keep erosion at or below tolerance levels. The Soil Conservation District must approve the plan. It will be up to you to get together with the Soil Conserva-tion Service and work up the


