James and Linda Jennings of Dallas have spent three and a half years driving to every city, town, community and village in the Lone Star State, or at least all the ones listed in the Texas Almanac. They cov-

ered 254 counties. Semi-retired, Jennings, 64 is a former policeman and one time stadium voice for the Dallas Cowboys. Touring the Texas towns, they designed and painted it on their suburban; because people wondered what they were doing, driving slow up and down the streets, carrecially at Wolf City, where especially at Wolf City, where they took pictures of the bank.
