



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Planters Rolling To Begin 2001 Crop

Planting activity across the Texas High Plains is progressing smoothly following several beneficial rain events across the area over the past ten

Best estimates indicate the area could be approaching the 20 percent planted mark through May 11.

Barring unforeseen interruptions growers could have the remainder planted within two weeks, although some areas have still not receive adequate planting moisture.

Growers are employing a mixed bag of management techniques to find the most economical way to grow the 2001 crop. Many have made changes in varietal selection to decrease seed expenses while others have tried to reduce inputs to save money up front.

No matter what strategy is employed, everyone is looking to the sky for beneficial rain to augment irrigation efforts or to sustain a 2001 dry-On the insect front several pest species are appearing on the radar

screen early on and growers need to be aware of the damage they can do to yield potential even at this early stage of the game.

Newly planted crops will be vulnerable to thrips, fleahoppers and boll weevil early in the year. Growers are encouraged to do a good job monitoring and making treatments that could save them additional expense later in the season. Well planned treatments early can prevent yield losses that can't be made up later.



Have You Taken Your Plant's Temperature Lately?

Peanut plants in Texas are now able to tell producers they need water. Short, pencil-size, infrared thermometers mounted on posts take the plants' temperature. The units being tested in Oklahoma and Texas relay their information to the web. These devices can save water and energy by giving plants water to cool them off and reduce their "stress time". The plant owner can then check the web to decide when to irrigate. The devices can also be put on "automatic" to trigger irrigation systems. Future versions should allow users to choose the plant species they are watering from a digital menu display.

Researchers Urge Containment Of Broomrape Weed To Prevent Future Threat To Ag Production

Bluebonnets, wind cups, and other wildflowers have been springing up along Texas highways. But along with these spring flowers is a blue flowered form of branched broomrape. Extension researchers, Mike Chandler says broomrape is a parasitic weed that looks like a wildflower. It is a threat to agricultural production. Broomrape sucks away water and nutrients causing stunted growth to the host plant. It is best recognized by its yellow stem and blue or white, snapdragon-like flowers. To control the weed, remove the branched broomrape plants and then treat the area with low rates of Roundup®.

Maintenance Of Home Wastewater Treatment System Needs To Be A Top Spring Priority

Tens of thousands of homes in Texas are located in suburban or rural communities where houses are spaced widely apart. In many of these areas, wastewater collection and treatment systems are not available, so homeowners dispose of their waste using aerobic wastewater treatment plants and spray disposal systems. Aerobic systems are similar too septic tanks in that they both use a natural bacterial process of treat the wastewater, but unlike septic tanks, aerobic plants require a constant supply of oxygen to operate properly and a special type of chlorine tablet to reduce bacteria levels before the wastewater can safely be used for spray dis-

To supply the oxygen necessary to treat wastewater, aerobic treatment systems use a mechanical blower or aerator that is operated by a control panel located in a basement, crawl space, or on an outside wall. Pumps and controls for the spray disposal system are also a part of the treatment system. Because of the mechanical components involved, aerobic treatment systems must be serviced by a factory authorized maintenance professional at least three times per year. This preventative maintenance insures that the wastewater being disposed is safe and can be applied to

your lawns and shrubbery.

If you have an aerobic unit and need to locate a factory certified technician, check the inside cover of the system's control panel. The name and phone number of the company providing service to your system should always be on the control panel. Your local health department can also direct you to a qualified service technician. When the service technician arrives for routine service, he will check all mechanical components to insure that they are operating properly, thoroughly inspect all sprinkler heads and test the treatment system to insure that it meets Texas Natu-

ral Resource Conservation Commission requirements.

Lastly, system maintenance also includes filling the system with chlorine tablets to reduce levels of potentially harmful bacteria before it is disposed of onto the lawn. This is especially critical in wet spring weather when the ground may be saturated with water. Purchasing chlorine tablets and refilling the chlorinator is usually up to the homeowner. Only use calcium hypochlorite tablets labeled for wastewater treatment. Do not use tablets or sticks sold for swimming pools. The wrong type of disinfecting tablet can harm your lawn and possibly cause a fire or explosion. The correct type of wastewater chlorine tablets are available in 10 pound pails from major home improvement stores, hardware stores, or can be ordered online through www.norweco.com.




