land crop On the insect front several pest species are appearing on the radar to yield potential even at this early stage of the game. Newly planted crops will be vulnerable to thrips, fleahoppers and boll
weevil early in the year Growers are encouraged to do a good job monitoring and making treatments that could save them additional expense
later in the season. Well planned treatments early can prevent yield losses
