State Sen. Wayne Connally, youngest brother of U. S. Secretary of Treasury (and former Go-vernor) John B. Connally, jumped into the lieutenant governor's race. Connally is a conservative into Democrat

Harold (Barefoot) Sanders of Dallas reportedly is getting set to run for the U.S. Senate as a Democrat.

Sen. Joe Christie of El Paso indicated he will reveal at a dinner in his home town December 7 whe ther he will enter the lieutenant governor's race or stand for re-

Republicans, calling for a "top to bottom cleanup" in state gov-ernment, began recruiting prelim-inaries, concentrating on the gov-ernor's race. (They already have a U. S. Senate candidate, incum-
