GORDON HARMON CHOSEN FOR NATIONAL SCHOOL PROGRAM

Alton O. Bowen, Assistant Commissioner for Regional Education Services of the Texas Education Agency, recently announced that Gordon Harmon of San Marcos has been chosen as one of two Texas school administrators from the entire State of Texas to participate in a national program sponsored by the National Academy for School Executives.

The program is available through a \$500,000.00 Danforth Foundation Grant for the purpose of planning and conducting an Individualized Study-Learn program for school administrators. These individualized study-learn programs are for one month's duration scheduled for January and July, 1974.

Harmon was chosen for his leadership in the implementation of programs being piloted by the Texas Education Agency. The San Marcos Schools, under Harmon's leadership, were one of the first schools in the state to use the state's new budgeting system.

Mr. Harmon has been used throughout the state as a consultant in this area as well as for data processing. In the past three years under Harmon's leadership, the schools there have implemented a full Kindergarten program wide use of individualized instruction and statewide recognition for implementation of the quarter system.

The school administrator serves on the Executive Committee of the Texas Association of School Administrators, and holds active memberships in the American Association of School Administrators, Texas State Teachers Association, and National Education Association.

Harman is the son of Mrs. Bob Jameson, jr., of Matador, and A. M. Harmon of Plainview. He is a nephew of R. J. Harmon, Quitaque. He was reared at Roaring Springs.

The Valley High Patriots will play host to the Lefors Pirates at Turkey Friday night at 8 o'clock. The Pirates, a Class B team, will probably be one of the biggest teams the Patriots will face all year and the Pirates already boast victories over two of this district's members, although both were by very narrow margins.

Last Friday night the Patriots drove to Paducah to joust with the Dragons and came out on the short end of a rather high-scoring game, 47-26, a better contest than the score would indicate.

The Patriots got on the score first, that coming in the first period when Brent Guest scored from 18 yards out and Steve Eudy boot the PAT. The Dragons scored their first TD later in the period when Carl Wright, very speedy young man remembered from last year, took a 24-yard pass and romped in. The run for the extra point

failed and the Patriots led 7-6 at the end of the first period. The Dragons went on a scoring spree, however, in the second quarter with Wright scoring three times on runs of 90, 64 and 72 yards. Danny Garrett tallied once on a 71 yard run and the Patriots were held scoreless in the second period and the Dragons led 32-7 at halftime.

The Valley High youngsters were not through, however, and Brent Guest scored from 21 yards out in the third quarter, with the PAT being added by Steve Eudy. Later in the third period Brian Wheeler legged it 20 yards for another TD, but the kick try failed. Wright added another touchdown in the third quarter and Garrett kicked the extra point. The score was 39-20 at the end of the third period. Each team added one more touchdown in the final period, Ron Eudy sneaking from the one for the Valley TD and Garrett getting a score from the three yard line.

The Patriots played well, despite the score, but had no one who could catch the speedy Dragon backs once they got up a head of steam. The Patriots are scoring, however, something they were unable to do last year.

In the unofficial statistics, the Patriots made seven first downs to the Dragons five. Most of the Dragons' scores came on long runs and did not require sustained drives. The Patriots gained a total of 169 yards while the Dragons had over 400 yards total.

The Patriots came out of the game in fair shape physically, and Coach Chalmers stated that all hands could probably play Friday night, although Smitty Lane, who received a bruised collar bone, might not be able to go all the way.

As previously stated the Pirates are a big team with three or four boys topping the 200 pound mark and the Patriots will probably give away 20 to 30 pounds per man average in the lineup and in the matchup some of the Patriots will knock heads with men that outweigh them by 50 pounds or more. The Pirates won 48-7 last year. One thing for sure—the Patriots will challenge the Pirates. All Patriot fans are urged to turn out and root for the Patriots.

Next week the locals will go to Claude to open the district campaign.

The Lucky Moores

Pictured is Elsie Bass Guthrie with a copy of her new book, "The Lucky Moores," just released by the Naylor Publishing Company of San Antonio. A longtime resident of Hall County, Mrs. Guthrie teaches in the Memphis School. She received her master's degree from West Texas University and has been named Texas Teacher of the Year and one of the Ten Top Teachers of the United States.

"The Lucky Moores" is the story of a motherless family who carry out the mother's wish that the Moores remain a family. Although the book is historical fiction, it is based on the story of a family who came to this country the last of the nineteenth century, and whose descendants now live in Memphis and Turkey. Many of the episodes are factual and may have been experienced by pioneers who came to this section to establish homes in the 1800's.

The conflict between Melissa, only thirteen when her mother died, and her father's selfish pursuit of a cattle empire creates an atmosphere of drama and tension throughout the book. After his wife's death, Claud Moore was driven like a man possessed, sparing no one, not his sons nor his daughter, not even himself. Shrewd and rugged, he thought only of more land and more cattle. Driven by a desire for wealth, he often neglected his family's needs. This left Melissa with the entire burden of raising the family.

Her mother's dying words about her father had been, "Love him but never give in to him." Melissa worked hard to fill her mother's place in the family, but she followed her mother's advice and never gave in.

One crisis followed another, but the Moore's luck held. The neighbors called it luck, but Melissa called it pluck with the "p" worked off. She was a combination of her mother's compassion and her father's stubborn persistence. She attacked every task with a gusto that was amazing. Whether cooking prodigious meals for her father's ranch hands at roundup time, or selling horses to earn money to buy a new home, she was always able to turn adversity to advantage.

This story is worthwhile reading for anyone interested in authentic details of pioneer living or the engaging story of a remarkable family.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS
SPECIAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 4, 1973

NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (S.A.R. 5)

Article III, Sections 5, 24 and 41a and Article VIII, Section 6 of the Texas Constitution are amended to:

Provide for regular annual sessions of the Legislature. The regular session in each odd-numbered year would be for a period not to exceed 180 days. The regular session in each even-numbered year would be for a period not to exceed 60 days and would be limited to consideration of fiscal matters and any emergency matters authorized by the Governor. The 60 day session could be extended by the Governor for a period not to exceed 30 days.

Provide an annual salary for members of the Legislature not exceeding \$15,000 per year and a per diem not exceeding \$15 per day for each day of such regular session or special session.

Provide that no appropriation of money shall be made for a longer term than one year and direct the Comptroller to make annual estimates of anticipated revenue rather than biennial estimates.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide for annual regular sessions of the legislature, and to provide an annual salary of \$15,000 and per diem for the members of the legislature, effective in JANUARY, 1975."

NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (S.A.R. 7)

Article XVI, Sections 50 and 51 of the Texas Constitution are amended to:

Include within the scope of homestead protection the real property of a single adult person which meets the other requirements of homestead property, and to provide that a family homestead may not be abandoned except with the consent of both spouses.

Presently a single adult person is not entitled to claim a homestead exemption and a married man can abandon a family homestead without the consent of his wife.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to include within the scope of homestead protection the real property of a single adult person which meets the other requirements of homestead property, and to provide that a family homestead may not be abandoned except with the consent of both spouses."

NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (S.A.R. 11)

Article VIII, Sections 1a and 1b of the Texas Constitution are amended to:

Extend the \$2,500 of widow tax exemption to the residential homestead of unmarried adults.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to extend the \$2,500 of widow tax exemption to the homestead of unmarried adults."

NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (S.A.R. 1)

Article XVI, Section 29, of the Texas Constitution is amended by adding a new Subsection (x) which:

Provides that no law creating a conservation and reclamation district shall be passed unless a copy of the proposed law is delivered to the commissioners court of each county and to the governing body of each incorporated city or town in whose jurisdiction and district or any part thereof it or will be located. Each such commissioners court and governing body may file its written consent or opposition to the proposed law with the Governor, Lieutenant Governor and Speaker of the House of Representatives. Each special law creating such a district must comply with general laws then in effect relating to consent by political subdivisions to the creation of such districts.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment establishing certain requirements relative to the enactment of laws creating certain conservation and reclamation districts."

NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT (S.A.R. 12)

Article XI, Section 7 of the Texas Constitution is amended to:

Provide that all counties and cities bordering on the coast of the Gulf of Mexico are authorized to levy a tax to pay for bonds issued for the construction of sea walls and breakwaters upon a majority vote of the resident property tax-payers. Counties and cities are presently authorized to levy such taxes and this amendment only changes the required vote from a two-thirds majority to a simple majority.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing counties and cities bordering on the Gulf of Mexico to issue bonds for the construction of sea walls and breakwaters upon a vote of the resident property tax-payers."

NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT (S.A.R. 20)

Article V, Section 8 of the Texas Constitution is amended by adding a new paragraph which:

Provides that the district court, concurrently with the county court, shall have the general jurisdiction of a probate court and in a probate proceeding shall also have the jurisdiction otherwise conferred on it by law. It also provides that the legislature may increase, diminish, or eliminate the jurisdiction of the district court or county court in probate matters, and may provide that all appeals in probate matters shall be to the courts of civil appeals.

The wording of the proposed constitutional amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment stating that the district court concurrently with the county court shall have the general jurisdiction of a probate court, and providing that the legislature may increase, diminish or eliminate the jurisdiction of the district court or county court in probate matters, and further providing that all appeals in such matters shall be to the courts of (civil) appeals."

NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT (S.A.R. 8)

Article III, Section 49-b of the Texas Constitution is amended to:

Provide for an additional \$100 million in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the Veterans' Land Fund. This amendment increases the present \$400 million authorization to \$500 million.

Remove the present provision which permits buying of land only by those veterans who served between September 16, 1940 and the date of formal withdrawal of United States troops from the armed conflict in Viet Nam. This amendment would allow all veterans who served after September 16, 1940 to buy land from the Veterans' Land Fund, provided they are otherwise qualified.

Provide that, in the event of the death of an eligible Texas veteran after the veteran has filed with the Board an application and contract of sale to purchase through the Board the tract intended by him or her and before the purchase has been completed, that the surviving spouse may complete the transaction.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide for an additional \$100 million in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the Veterans' Land Fund."

NUMBER EIGHT ON THE BALLOT (S.A.R. 20)

Article XI, of the Texas Constitution is amended by adding a new Section 16a which:

Authorizes and requires incorporated cities, towns, and villages, regardless of population and notwithstanding the constitutional limitations on total tax rates, to levy such annual ad valorem taxes on the taxable property in the city, town, or village as are necessary to pay the principal of and interest on, when due, the general obligations hereinafter issued by the city, town, or village. The legislature is empowered to limit by general or special law the total principal amount of general obligations which may be issued, when due, and until the legislature acts to do so, the limitations established by statute with respect to the total principal amount of bonds which may be issued by independent school districts shall apply as the rate limitation on cities, towns, and villages.

The wording of the proposed constitutional amendment as it appears on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to authorize cities, towns, and villages to levy such ad valorem taxes as are sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on their general obligations hereafter issued subject to the restrictions provided by law."

NUMBER NINE ON THE BALLOT (S.A.R. 20)

Article VIII of the Texas Constitution is amended by adding a new Section 2C which:

Allows the Legislature, by general law, to exempt all real and personal property used by non-profit water supply corporations or cooperatives from all property taxes. The exemption would apply only to such property as is reasonably necessary to conduct the business of a non-profit water supply corporation or cooperative.

The wording of the proposed constitutional amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to exempt from property taxes certain property used by a non-profit water supply corporation or a non-profit water supply cooperative."

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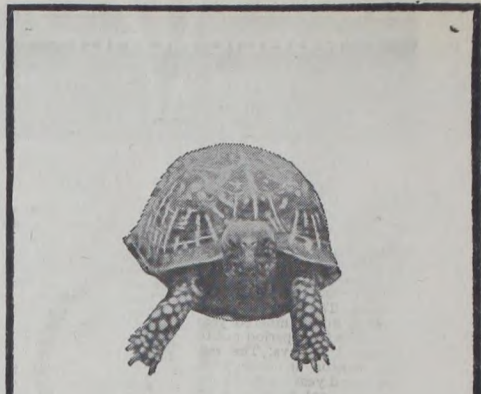
