The Quitaque Chamber of Commerce met Thursday, January 17 at the Quitaque Community Center for a planning meeting/pot luck dinner to get the ball rolling for 2002. After a wonderful buffet of homemade goodies new chamber president Phil Barefield opened the meeting with an overview of the evenings agenda. To brainstorm ideas among everyone and compile a list of long and short term goals for the chamber. With over 20 members present there were alot of very good ideas and suggestions presented. Ideas for shrot term goals ranged from park improvement, developing a brochure, early planning for a bigger

Ideas for shrot term goals ranged from park improvement, developing a brochure, early planning for a bigger and better Trails Day, increase community involvement and awareness, to identifying our untapped human resources and talents. Ideas for long term goals ranged from attracting new businesses to our community, overall beautification of our town, having a place to host big events, maintaining our "small town" character, to addressing short term housing availability.

After evaluation of all of the ideas the group unanimously agreed short term goals shoul include developing a brochure to help attract tourist to our area, increasing outside advertising for major events to help draw outof-towners to Quitaque, develop an events calendar for the year, and to have a free "community resource analysis" performed to determine our strengths and weaknesses. Long term goals agreed upon by the group were, the beautification of Quitaque, finding a place to host events that will accommodate large crowds, improve our downtown area with flowers and trees, seek out new businesses willing to locate here, and address short term housing solutions.

The following events were discussed for the upcoming year, a bigger and better Trail's Day, an Easter Egg Hunt in the park for the kids, a Fall Health Fair, the annual Chamber Banquet, a Community Christmas Party with caroling, a "Santa Parade", and a toy drive with other local organizations, two clean up days per year, and a community New Year's Eve get together.

The Chamber would like to extend an invitation to anyone who would like to help with any of these projects or has any ideas for the promotion of Quitaque to come and join them on the first Tuesday of the month at 6:15 p.m. in the Quitaque Community Center.

Turkey Roost Museum Will Soon Be A Reality

In 1996, those in the community of Turkey, who were interested in starting a heritage museum, set out to accomplish this goal. The group began raising money and looking for a location for the museum. They wanted a location in the downtown area and made a lot of inquires regarding the possibility of buildings for sale.

Their first purchase was "Beth Mills' building", but due to the damage to the building and the expense for repairs a decision was made to tear that building down along with the other two buildings on each side of it, which were also beyond repair They then met with Turkey city officials to see if they would donate the old clinic building for the project, which they agreed to let them have. Cleanup began on the building and grants were applied for to help with some of the things needed for the museum. Although grant assistance was not received, the group continued to work to raise money for the project. In the meantime the dreams of a downtown building, they planned to try to get the Boll Weevil Program located in Turkey. The Boll Weevil 'Program was started and the economic benefit this program has been to our community and the surrounding area has been appreciated.

In the meantime, inquiries about the "Pizza Place" were being made and a price was agreed upon which was affordable, without having to borrow money With the agreement made, the Turkey Roost Museum Project had nine hundred dollars left to begin work with. Margie Pinkerton, spokesperson for the group stated, "We appreciate everyone who has supported us in our fund raising and who donated so generously to help the project get off the ground and are anxious to help with future projects."

Plans are now being made for needed renovations and Jeff Pinkerton, son of Leland Pinkerton, is in the process of having some display cases made for the group, he will donate as a gift. Jeff along with other members of his family have been anxious to help in anyway they could. Another person who has been instrumental is Woodrow Mullin, who attended one of the first meetings and made a generous donation which enabled us the group to purchase "Beth's shop".

With local community organizations and area businesses that have continued to support The Turkey Roost Museum Project, the group hope's to soon have a sign up on their new building. "Hopefully we will be able to have part of the building open for Bob Will's Day." said Lawana Cruse, Turkey Roost spokesperson.

Memorial To Be Built For Floyd County Veterans

Sixteen year old Skyler Cornelius, of Floydada, is leading a 4-H Citizenship and Civic Education Project that involves the building of a Veterans Memorial for Floyd County Veterans, living and deceased, on the courthouse lawn, to honor the dedicated men and women of floyd County who served in our country's armed forces beginning with the Civil War. Approximately 2000 dedicated individuals from Floyd County devoted their time to protecting our freedom during wars, conflicts and peace.

The Veterans' Memorial Committee consists of 25 Floydada and Lockney 4-H junior board members and 23 adult board members. The project officially kicked off their fund-raising for the project on Veterans Day, 2001. They hope to have the Veterans Memorial completed and dedicated by Veteran's Day 2002

The vision has turned into plans, designs, dates and goals. Floyd County Commissioner's Court has stepped forward and set aside a location for the monument. Willis Monument of Granite, OK has submitted a design and bid. Veteran's Memorial applications are due before July 4, 2002. Dedication ceremonies are scheduled for Veterans Day, November 11, 2002. The financial goal is \$60,000 to cover the cost of the monument and its groundwork.

The group has been diligently working on all aspects of the project and only six weeks into the project contributions already total over \$25,000.

Eligible For Low Interest Economic Injury Loans

According to Briscoe County Judge, Ted Kingery, Briscoe County has been designated as eligible to apply for low interest Economic Injury Disaster Loans. In a letter he received from Governor Rick Perry, Judge Kingery was informed that the Small Business Administration (SBA), in an agreement with the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA), provides Economic Injury Disaster Loans to eligible small businesses dependent on farmers and ranchers in counties that have received a disaster declaration from the Secretary of Agriculture. Briscoe County has received it's disaster declaration and is eligible.

Stricter Laws Affect New Teen Drivers As of January 1, 2002, there are several changes in T exas law that will

affect teenage drivers who receive their licenses after January 1, and parents should be aware of the changes.

GRADUATED LICENSING This new Texas law will extend the time it takes a 16 or 17 year old to get a drivers license. It is also designed to give them more driving experience before they can drive solo. Under the new law, once teenagers turn 16 and are enrolled in school, they can take a driver's education program and get a full privilege driver's license. T eens can get a learner's permit at 15 and take the course, but they can't get a full license until age 16. The new law also mandates that teenagers have a learner's permit for at least six months before they can apply for a driver's license. After new teen drivers get their license, there is another six month probati DRIVING HOURS During the above mentioned six month probation

period after a teenager first receives his or her license, they will not be allowed to operate a motor vehicle between the hours of midnight and 5 a.m. unless they are directly returning home from work, or school related activities

PASSENGERS Also during the six moth probation period after a teen-ager first receives his or her new license, they are not allowed to carry more than one passenger under the age of 21 who is not a family member PENALTIES Violations of these new laws will be a Class C misde

anor with a \$500 fine, plus court costs. If a teenager gets two traffic tickets while driving with a provisional license, the license can be susnded for 90 days.

The new laws are designed to reduce deaths and injuries among the teenage driver population. Car crashes are the leading cause of death among teenagers in the United States. According to government statistics, 41 percent of teenage driving deaths occurred between 9 p.m. and 6 a.m. when teens are most likely to be driving without parental supervision. Sixty-three percent of teenager passenger deaths occurred when another teen was driving.

As more accident and risk data becomes available, T exas lawmakers may seek to tighten these laws even further in a future legislative ses-







Emergency Farm Loan Applications Being Accepted In Briscoe County

Applications for emergency farm loans for losses caused by ex-treme amounts of rain, flash flooding, flooding, high winds, hail, lightning, and a tornado, that occurred on June 1, 3, and 5, 2001 are being accepted at the Farm Service Agency (FSA) office located in Tulia, according to Ross W. James

Swisher and Briscoe counties are two of eight in Texas recently named by Secretary of Agriculture Ann M. Veneman eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from the extreme amount of rain, flash flooding, flooding, high winds, hail, lightning, and a tornado.

FSA announced farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80 percent of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue in business, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest is 3.75 per cent

"As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for an FSA emergency loan," James said. Farmers participating in the federal crop Insurance program will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.


Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until August 13, 2002 but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and possibly over into the new farming season.

FSA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work at and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who are U.S. citizens and to farming partnerships, corporations or coop-eratives in which U.S. citizens hold a majority interest.

PCG Board Highlights Legislation And Trade

The Plains Cotton Growers Board of Directors held its quarterly meeting Wednesday, January 16 and gathered the latest insights into develop-ment of new Farm Program legislation and a report on the status of the U.S. textile industry. PCG Executive Vice President Steve Verett updated the Board on the

situation in Washington, DC in regard to prospects for completion of a new Farm Bill. He noted that some of the comments now circulating

brighten prospects for getting a new program in place for 2002. He explained that probably the most important indicator that things could get done is the fact that USDA and Administration officials are now

saying that their preference is to get a program in place for 2002. The Administration's change in attitude appears to have begun follow-ing the hiring of Chuck Conner as White House liaison and an early December meeting between President George W. Bush and House Agricul-ture Committee Chairman Larry Combest.

Although it is unfortunate that the chance to pass a Bill in the Senate before Christmas was missed, Congress returns January 23 and the Sen-

ate could begin to reconsider their version shortly after that time. Verett noted that while it will surely take more cooperation and less political gamesmanship from both sides to move the process forward, all sides appear to have the goal of 2002 implementation as a mark they work toward.

The bottom line noted Verett is that past actions are water under the bridge as far as producers are concerned and that U.S. agriculture needs a Farm Bill as soon as possible. He added that agricultural lenders have made it clear that supplemental assistance simply won't provide enough help to allow producers to overcome the cumulative effects of the past few

In other business incoming American Textile Manufacturers Institute (ATMI) president Van May of Plains Cotton Cooperative Association in Lubbock, discussed the issues surrounding the current downturn in the U.S. Textile Industry and the prospects for seeing that trend reverse it-

He noted the symbiotic relationship that exists between cotton and textile production in the U.S. will eventually be the key to turning around the fortunes for both industries

He noted that the U.S. textile industry has been and continues to be cost-competitive with its overseas counterparts but that post-production barriers eventually push the U.S. product out of the picture.

The key point that he made remains a source of consternation for pro-ducers as well-U.S. trade policy has been one keyed around giving access to U.S. markets without getting the same access from other countries. He added that one of the most notable changes that could positively affect the future would be the formulation of trade that requires the same con-duct from both parties and is viewed as fair trade and not protectionism

He noted that implementation of trade opportunities, such as the Car-ibbean Basin Initiative that provides U.S. companies access to lower -cost labor in nearby countries, can eventually make a big difference in how much U.S. cotton is actually purchased by U.S. consumers.

He concluded that it appears the textile industry is bouncing along the bottom and that things could start improving from where they are now That rebound, however, will be significantly influenced by both current and future trade policy decisions and the new farm bill.


State Agency To Host Historically **Underutilized Business Forum**

Texas Farmers Union Rates U.S. Senators On Key Farm Votes

Texas Farmers Union (TFU) recently assessed how the state's U.S.

Senators measured up on key farm bill votes prior to the January recess. TFU derived the score by analyzing 14 key roll call votes during recent senate farm bill discussions "The higher the senator's support for family agriculture and rural America, the higher their percentages,: said TFU President Wes Sims.

According to Sims, Senator Gramm voted 8 percent, while Senator Hutchison scored 28 percent. Nationwide, 18 senators voted 100 percent with the family farm and ranch organization, and just over half had a voting record of 50 percent or better

The key votes included:


prohibition of packer ownership, which TFU supports attempts to reverse improvements to the dairy safety net, which TFU opposed

* efforts to substitute farm safety net provisions with insurance vouch-ers or savings accounts, which TFU opposed * a motion that TFU supported to kill an amendment that would have removed the no-cost sugar program from the Senate Agriculture Committee Farm Bill proposal

* an attempt to pass the House Farm Bill proposal, which would allow lower rates than the Senate version and would not address concentration

or renewable energy issues \ast a TFU supported amendment to ban the use of mandatory arbitration \ast tion on farmers involved in contracts

* three failed cloture motions, which could have limited debate and allowed the Senate to complete the Farm Bill process in 2001. "Farmers Union avidly supported the motions to invoke cloture with hopes for a new Farm Bill in time for farmers planning and planting spring crops" Sims said. "These and the other votes included on our scorecard speak volumes about how our elected officials have acted in addressing the challenges that confront rural America.

NEW YEAR USHERS IN NEW LAW ALLOWING TEXANS TO BUY CAR **INSURANCE BY THE MILE**

With the arrival of the new year on January 1, 2002, T exas gets a new state law that encourages insurance companies to let car owners buy miles of insurance as needed. It's called "cents-per -mile choice" and advocates say it could finally put Texas on the road to making compulsory insur ance work.

Insuring all cars was made compulsory two decades ago, despite opposition from auto insurance companies. Now the companies are saying that the law has failed because the proportion of uninsured cars may be even higher than it was twenty years ago, about one in five cars on the road is without insurance

But the reason compulsory insurance does not work, according to proponents of "cents-per-mile choice", is that car owners can only buy insur-ance at annual rates. Such rates, they contend, make the insurance like a tax on owning a car, instead of a cost of driving it, which is the activity that produces accidents. This fixed cost may be resented, they say, but drivers in most areas are able to have their own car and keep it legally insured.

In low-income zip codes, however, studies show that paying for insur-ance as a cost of ownership forces drivers to share insured cars. Although sharing cuts individual driving, it causes annual mileage for cars to in-crease. Increased mileage sets off a spiral of increased cost to companies, raised rates, and fewer insured cars. Instead of forcing drivers to share cars, mile rates let them save on insurance the way they save on gaso line, by driving fewer miles. "We thank the legislature and governor for this opportunity to put

forward an alternative way to buy car insurance that is opportunity to particular ing compulsory insurance work," sad Deborah Bell, president of T exas National Organization for Women (NOW), which lobbied hard to get the new Texas law enacted. Bell said insurance companies owe it to the driving public to explain why they often charge from 50% to 150% more in low-income zip codes. "No wonder compulsory insurance is not working", she said

Patrick Butler, Director of NOW's Insurance Project, says having a choice between annual and mile rates won't change the way the car is profiled by car and driver type, and by residence zip code. "The owner of a car is offered the choice between continuing to pay at an annual rate and buying miles as needed only after the company sets the annual rate and mile rate for the car's profile group," Butler explained. "For example, a buyer might be choosing between \$500 per year and 5.0 cents per mile."

Because the new law lets insurance companies restrict the choice of mile rates to selected customers, Bell is urging T exans to demand that their companies make this choice available to all of their policyholders.

"We need the mile rate alternative to fixed annual rates that force millions of cars to go uninsured," Bell said. Supporters of cents-per-mile choice have developed a web site with more information at *www.centspermilenow.org*.






