On the Great Plains, reduced forage during drought conditions is gen-erally caused by the intensity of grazing. Field studies have shown that light grazing is no more harmful than not grazing. The reason being the reduction of root growth after heavy use.

The weather's part in grass duced regardless of stocking production can change from levels. But, once rain returns, duce more growth than the duce more growth than they need. This suprlus growth is what can be grazed. Most range plants need about half of this year's top growth to healthy, remain productive. Small stunted plants will have stunted roots. Large, healthy plants will have healthy roots. A large, healthy root system will reach more water and nutrients. Healthy roots will produce a healthy plant which can outgrow unwanted weeds and grasses.

The Soil Conservation Service's guideline is: graze half and leave half of this year's and leave half of this years growth. The purpose is to provide forage over several years time. Not overgrazing during years of normal rainfall will provide plants with good roots. Plants with good roots. Plants with good roots are better able to survive years of low rainfall. When normal rainfall returns, plants with good roots will be ready to produce plenty of good forage. Good roots are the foundation that grass will grow on. Proper Deer Management Will Yield Good Harvest

Proper management and habitat structure will help reduce the impact of drought on a deer herd, according to a Texas A&M University Agri-cultural Extension Service

wildlife specialist.

Besides habitat quality, deer herd dynamics require a proper harvest

management program to help them through drought periods, said Dr. Jack Payne, who is headquartered at Corpus

Proper harvest management has many elements. It is necessary to have an idea of the density of deer, the buck-

doe ratio and survival rate of fawn crop. This information can obtained by herd surveys before the hunting season and results can be used to set harvest quotas," Payne said.

He said a well managed herd has a density below the carrying capacity of the land, and acceptable buck-doe ratio (less than 1:3), and a good harvest program where adequate does are harvested and the bucks are not over-

"In this situation, effects of drought will be less severe when adequate harvest management is practiced and

high quality species of woody plants and vegatition, such as granjeno, colima, guaycan, persimmon, brazil, huisache and guajillo.

Deer need woody cover for food, a cover screen and shade. The remaining range should have small open areas (less than 200 yards wide) interspersed with the woody cover. The openings should provide forb and weed production, since deer would rather eat weeds than brush or grass. During drought the forbs are usually lacking, however," Payne said.

The drought has reduced the food supply. Many Texas deer currently are eating the

the deer numbers are under carrying capacity," Payne

Besides good harvest management, a harvest record keeping program is essential. Minimal records required are the age and sex of each animal, their individual weights, and a body condition

score of good, average and poor, based on the amount of body fat," Payne said.

"For bucks, antler measurements should include the antler spread, number of points, length and circumference of b um," he said.

effects of various management practices on the deer, Payne said.

Quality habitat is essential element of good harvest management, Payne said. Good deer habitat should have at least 50-60 percent of the land in woody cover. Wildlife need a diverse, stressed presently, they are reducing their late summer food resources which will spell trouble if the drought continues, Payne explained.

"Supplemental feeding can help the deer herd get through periods of drought stress. Most Brownie News artificial feeding programs serve as baiting programs during the hunting season, and are scheduled following the dry summer months until begins. winter programs do little to assist deer in times of stress," Payne says. Managers should be aware that a straight grain diet can lead to acidosis- or toxic buildup- and animal

Leaves that turn yellow, yet the veins of the leaves are still green, is the condition known as CHLORO-SIS OF THE LEAF which is an iron deficiency in the tree or shrub. Maple trees are generally the first ones to show these symptoms of iron deficiency. To alleviate this problem, it may be controlled by using a liquid iron supplement by spraying it on the leaves this summer, then treating it with an iron sulfate powder around each tree in the fall and another spraying around bud break next spring. (Try to have a follow-up spraying ch spring after that.)

Be careful when using this li-

quid iron as it stains sidewalks and driveways. For more information, the County Extension Agent at 823-2131, Ext. 13.
