Four EMT's and 5 EMT Students were present to participate in the activity. The drill began with the EMT's running through a patient assessment and radio communications to demonstrate what was to be done during the drill.

The group left the Firehall at 6:30 enroute to their first stop which was at the Todd Washington home. Here Stachia Washington had fallen and suffered a broken ankle and Tye Barclay had been run over by a car while riding his bicycle.

At approximately 7:00 p.m. the group left the Washingtons and headed one mile East of the state park where they had reported a car wreck. Eunice McFall, driver of the automobile was suffering from severe chest injuries. Front seat passengers Beth Whitener and Jamie Wellman suffered from loss of consciousness and knee and head Ryan, Richard and injuries. Jessica Wellman and Paula and John Whitener, were all passengers in the back seat. Their injuries consisted of broken bones and unconsciousness

After these patients had been assessed, the group once again boarded the ambulance where several of the students practiced their radio communication with the Amarillo Communication Center.

The final stop in the drill practice was at the Wendell Farley home. A total of seven patients were found at this home.

Social Security **Benefit Increases** By Working Longer

If you continue to work full-time past age 65, you may increase your basic Social Security retirement benefit in two ways. First, for each month that you do not receive a benefit--until the month in which you reach age 70--your benefit amount will automatically increase. Second, you will be adding years

of high earnings to your Social Security record, and these earnings may result in higher benefits.

Under the delayed retirement credit provisions, if you will be 65 this year or in 1993 and you continue to work, your benefit amount will increase 4 percent per year. By

The 75th "Diamond Jubilee" edition of the Panhandle-South Plains Fair is scheduled for September 26-October 3.


