Postage Going Up

The Valley Tribune has been informed that the U.S. Postal Service is going to increase their rates in January. The regular rate for periodical mail will be going up 9.9 percent while the in-county rate will be increasing 6.8 percent.

Because of this higher postage rate, we will be forced to raise the subscription rate for the Valley Tribune. As of January 1, 2001, a one year subscription for Briscoe, Hall, Motley and Floyd Counties will now cost \$18.50 while all other sub-scriptions will be increased to

Motley County Lost The Weather Battle in 2000 Motley County farmers battled hot and dry weather, insect in-

festations, skyrocketing costs and dismal harvesting conditions this year 2000. This is the third in four years for a crop disaster.

The early winter weather in November and December is in contrast to the county's extreme heat and drought conditions in the summer. Temperatures below normal, eight inches of snow, ice and fog caused highway and air travel delays and the delivery of mail to county residents the last week in December

Farmers and ranchers believe the benefits far outweigh the inconvenience with good underground moisture and an unfavorable enviroment for the boll weevils

We appreciate the National Weather Service Volunteers for the monthly and total year end moisture reports.

Jim Stockton of Whiteflat registered 0.65 moisture in December bringing the total for 2000 to 25.04 inches. Mrs. Tommie Jo Cruse of Flomot reported 0.90 inches of moisture for December and the total for 2000 22.59 inches.






