# Vehicle Title Applicants Required To Have Social Security Number

Transportaion (TxDOT) will on require additional information on title applications for motor vehicles. Beginning November 1, Texans who request title transactions in counties using the Registration and Title System (RTS) must provide their social security number. RTS is an automated system that electronically links county tax offices to TxDOT Headquarters in Austin. The Briscoe County Tax Office and the Hall County Tax Office use RTS to process motor vehicle transaction.

The social security requirement is part of House Bill 1863, passed by the 74th Legislature; the bill addresses fraud prevention in public assistance programs. TxDOT is mandated to collect the social security numbers and make them accessible to other state agencies for the purpose of determining eligibility for those programs. Individuals who do not have a social curity number, or are not eli-

# **Fuston Re-Elected** To District Board

James Fuston was recently re-elected to the Hall-Childress board of directors on October 12, 1995. Fuston will represent zone

The purpose of the Hall-Childress Soil and Water Conservation District, with headquarters in Childress and Memphis is to promote sound soil and water conservation programs on farm and ranch lands within the district and to serve as a voice for farmers and ranchers on conservation matters.

The board of directors coordinates the conservation efforts of various local, state and federal agencies and other organizations and has authority to enter into working agreements with these governmental agencies and private concerns to carry out its purposes.

As one of five individuals serving on the district board of directors, Fuston will be responsible for district policies and procedures for carrying out the district program within the framework of the Texas soil conservation district law.

In Texas there are 210 soil and water conservation districts. Each is a legal subdivision of state government organized by local agricultural landowners with the assistance of the Texas State Soil and Water Conserva tion Board. Unlike most other legal subdivisions of state government, SWCD's do not have the powers of taxation or eminent domain. All conservation programs managed by the district are of a voluntary nature to the landowner or operator.

Programs and services of the Soil and Water Conservation District are offered on a nondiscriminatory basis without regard for race, color, national origin, age, sex, releigion, marital status or handicap.







The American Lung Asociation of Texas urges those who may be at increased risk of complications of influenza to be immunized before flu season begins.

Both influenza and pneumonia can be deadly. "Influenza is a highly contagious, potentially life-threatening lung disease, "said Dr. William Paul Glezen, epidemiologist at the Influenza Research Center at Baylor University. "Since 1960, pneumonia has been the leading infectious disease killer in the U.S. It is both the most common and most deadly complication arising from influenza," he explained.

1) Persons 65 yrs of age or older. 2) Residents of nursing homes


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
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
