Don't Panic...Be Prepared

by Randall S. James, Banking Commissioner of Texas As Commissioner of the Texas Department of Banking,

I want to express to the citizens of Texas the Department's confidence in the Texas banking system's preparedness for the Year 2000. Our state banks have reviewed all of their systems, and have tested and retested them after making necessary upgrades. Our banks developed detailed contigency plans to deal with possible power and communication disruptions. Futhermore, they have looked at potential cash demands and made plans to have sufficient currency on hand to satisfy their customers'

Every bank in the state, as well as the nation, has been examined at least three times over the last two years to verify their readiness for the Year 2000 changeover. Examinations show that community banks are just as prepared as large banks. While examination findings are confidential by law, each bank can, and should, tell you what it has done to prepare for Y2K. •

Banks are still the safest place to keep your money dur-ing the Y2K date change. Your money in the bank is FDIC-insured and will remain accessible through withdrawals, ATMs, checks and debit cards. For your safety and financial well-being, I recommend that people with draw only the amount of cash they normally would need for the holiday weekend during which the New Year falls.

The Department's biggest concern is that citizens may endanger themselves and their money by withdrawing large amounts of cash from the bank. We strongly urge that you not give out personal or financial information, such as account numbers, credit card numers, or

social security numbers, to individuals requesting it based on Y2K concerns. Some Texans have already

lost their savings by having it stolen from hiding places at home, or sending it to scam artists trying to cash in on the Y2K

The Department also urges citizens to adopt or maintain good financial practices, such as reconciling account statements monthly, and keeping receipts and records of all financial transactions. These safeguards are always advisable, and ensure that you can identify discrepancies, whether or not they are related to Y2K.

We also recommend that you not wait until the last minute to withdraw your funds for the New Year's weekend. Many banks will be closed on Satur day, January 1, and ATMs are likely to see heavy usage. Please don't assume that because your bank's ATM is out of cash that the bank is having a Y2K problem; the greater likelihood is that a high number of withdrawals have emptied the ma-

most confidence in the Texas banking system, you should know that we will be standing ready in full force over the date change to ensure that everything runs smoothly. We will have representatives at all federal bank regulatory agencies in the state, and at the State Office of Emergency Managemnt to exchange information and to quickly resolve any banking-related issues that may present themselves. The Department will also be staffing a phone bank throughout the date change to address any bankingrelated Y2K questions you may have. That toll free number is 877-276-5554.

Volunteers who would like to spend time delivering these meals need to be at the church in Floydada by 10:30 a.m. on Christmas



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Q: I had heard that the state lowered the level for drunk driving offenses. Can you give me some

A: With all of the parties that occur during the holiday season, the number of alcohol-related traffic deaths increases dramatically.

In 1997, Texas led all other states in the number of alcohol-related traffic fatalities. These deaths accounted for about half of all traffic fatalities in Texas, well above the national average of 39 percent.


About a fourth of alcohol-related deaths in Texas involved blood alcohol levels of less than .10, the previous standard for legal intoxica-

As a person's blood alcohol concentration (BAC) increases, his or her abilities are impaired. Many tests report that the vast majority of drivers exhibit impairment of critical driving tasks with a BAC of .08. This impairment can result in problems with attention, reaction time, speed control, etc., substantially increasing the risk of a crash.

During this year's legislative session, lawmakers passed a bill that changes the definition of legal intoxication to a BAC of .08 or

The law defines "intoxicated" as not having the normal use of physical or mental faculties as a result of alcohol, a controlled substance, a dangerous drug or a combination of these substances

It is hoped that a lower BAC level will serve as a deterrent for those who might consider driving



after drinking. In addition, the lower BAC standard will result in more drivers being eligible for Driving While Intoxicated charges.

Currently, approximately 16 states have .08 BAC laws. Several of those states saw significant decreases in the number of alcoholrelated fatalities after adopting the lower BAC standards.

A first-time offense of driving while intoxicated is a Class C misdemeanor with a minimum sentence of 72 hours in jail. If the driver is found to be intoxicated AND has an open container of alcohol in the car, the minimum sentence in increased to six days.

A second-time offense is a Class A misdemeanor and carried a minimum 30-day sentence. A third Driving While Intoxicated conviction results in a third degree felony charge. Keep in mind that these sentences are only for driving while intoxicated. They do not address any additional charges that may result if an intoxicated driver injures

In addition to safety reasons for adopting the lower standard, Texas now qualifies for additional National Highway Safety Administration grant money which can be used for highway safety or construction

Regardless of what the law classifies as legally impaired, no one should ever drive a car after drinking. No one should ever ride in a car with a driver who has been drinking or allow someone who is impaired to drive. Get the keys and call a cab or have a designated driver.
