Senator Lloyd Bentsen said Thursday that funding for a boll weevil control program, which has kept the boll weevil off the High Plains, has been assured for the next fiscal year

of the House-Senate conference committee on the ag riculture appropriations bill have agreed to \$9.6 million in funding for the program, which is funded by the federal government and local sources.

"Since 1964, the boll weevil program has saved an estimated \$1 billion for High Plains area farmers, all for a cost of about \$25 million, with local farmers paying about half. That's a cost-benefit ratio of 40 to 1," Bentsen said.






