## Comptroller Combs Distributes $\$ 640$ Million in Local Sales Tax

Texas Comptroller Susan Combs said this week the state collected $\$ 1.85$ billion in sales tax "State sales tax collections through the first five months of the fiscal year, September 2007 through January 2008, are up 6.8 percent compared to the same period last fiscal year," Comb said. "While growth remains firm, it is slower than that of the past two years. This moderatio Combs sent $\$ 640.8$ million in local sales tax to Texas cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose taxing districts, up 5.1 percent compared to sales tax distributions to local governments in February 2007.

New USDA Secretary of Agriculture Ed Schafer has an-
nounced that partial 2007 -crop-year Counter-cyclical (CC) payments would be issued to producers with upland cotton (CC) paypeanut base acres enrolled in USDA's 2007 Direct and Counteryclical Program (DCP).
Schaferis announcement came during the National Cotton
Councilís Annual Meeting February 9 in Memphis, TN. Since Councilís Annual Meeting February 9 in Memphis, TN. Since that time some $\$ 315$ million in partial 2007 CC payments have USDA says producers with enrolled upland cotton and pe ut base acres received $\$ 300$ million and $\$ 15$ million, respec tively, in partial CC payments. The 2007 -crop year projected partial payment rates equal 40 percent of the projected final CC payment amount.
pound for upland cotton and $\$ 7.60$ per short ton for USDA calculated the partial CC payment rates using the February World Agricultural Supply and Demand Estimates, released February 8, 2008.

House Unveils New Renewable Energy Legislation Earlier this week Democratic House leaders unveiled a bill
that would extend tax credits for investment in solar and wind hat would extend tax credits for investment in solar and wind power projects as well as energy-efficient buildings. The bill, aken up until the end of the month due to other house business and scheduling conflicts.
The proposed Renewable Energy and Energy Conservatio Tax Act of 2008 is modeled after the same plan that resulted in Senate opposition last year, repealing certain tax benefits that oil and gas companies currently receive, though these have bee caled back from the original version.
The bill would extend the $30 \%$ investment tax credit (ITC eight years (through the end of 2016). It also includes a long term extension and modification of the production tax credit (PTC), extending for three years (through December 31, 2011) certain qualifying facilities such as wind, closed-loop biomass open-loop biomass, geothermal, small irrigation hydropowe landfill gas and trash combustion facilities. It also includes a wew category of qualifying facilities: marine renewables (e.g.
waves and tides). The bill would cap the aggregate amount of tax credits that can be earned at $35 \%$ of the facility's cost.
A long-term extension and modification of the residentia energy-efficient property credit is also included. The credit for residential solar property would be extended for six years (through the end of 2014) and the annual credit cap (currently equipment and geothermal $\$ 4,000$. ### 3.5 Million Acres Of Wetlands In Texas May No Longer Have Clean Water Act Protection

 he Clean Water Act. Recent federal policy directives based in part on two split decisions of the Supreme Court have severely weakened Clean Water Act safeguards in Texas and other southwestern states,In Texas, 3.3 million acres of coastal wetlands, 200,000 acres of playa lakes and 75 percent of the stream miles in the state are jeopardized by these new guidelines.
"These waters are the lifeblood of our state," said Janice Bezanson, executive director of the Texas Conservation Alliance. "The government's failure to protect them impacts waterfowl, songbirds, and many species of wildlife, and, in turn, a major These treas economy

Is and playa lakes provide habitat for fish, birds and other wildlife, and the destruction or pollution of these aquatic habitats could have serious economic impacts for the state. In 2006 , more than 7.8 million residents and non"Our analysis reveals that whed wildlife in Texas, generating approximately $\$ 8.4$ billion.
toxics dumping," said Jim Murphy, National Wildlife Federation wetlands counsel and author of the report. "These water resources are not renewable. Once they are gone, they are gone forever.
Nationally, these policy directives have effectively removed Clean Water Act protections for 20 million acres of the nation's wetlands and created uncertainty as to whether numerous other bodies of water remain protected. For example, streams that do
not flow year-round could lose federal protection, affecting some 60 percent of the total stream miles in the United States.

In Texas, the potential for damage is exacerbated by the states rapid population growth, weak stale lever prowell as the challenges of climate change.
"Texas' wetlands provide important habitat for numerous waterfowl species, said Scott Yaich, Ph.D., director of conservation programs at
Ducks Unlimited. "Anyloss of wetlands in this state could have swift and resounding impacts on waterfowl populations here and throughout the Central Flyway.
"Healthy streams, wetlands and lakes mean healthy
people and abundant populapeople and abundant popula-
tions of fish and wildlife," said Helen Neville, Ph.D, a research scientist with Trout
Unlimite "Wen Unlimited. "Weakening protections for these waters puts
us all at risk." us all at risk."
There is a solution to the
problem of waters losing protection under the Clean Water Act. Senator Russ Feingold (D-WI), and Representatives Oberstar (D-MN), Dingell (DMI) and Ehlers (R-MI) intro-
duced the Clean Water Restoduced the Clean Water Resto-
ration Act of 2007 , which will restore Clean Water Act safeguards to all of America's water bodies and will clearly affirm the original intent of the
