When completing the question-naire, all income should be reported. Present laws authorize the VA to allow 10% deduction on the income received from retirement benefits, including Social Security. Thus, only 90% of such in come is counted by the VA. Each claimant is allowed to also report any family medical expenses which were incurred during the year. Any such expenses which are in excess of 5% of the reported income of the claimant may be used by the VA to re-duce the countable income, thereby establishing entitlement to a larger monthly payment.
