





Gladys Gatlin Miller Ends 72 Year Search For Grave

Editor's note: The following is a lo reprint from The Memphis Democrat. March 22, 1990 edition by Ruby Phillips Roden

heartbreaking searching ended for Gladys Gatlin Miller when she placed a spray of flowers on her mother's grave in the Newlin Ceme-tery, Saturday, March 10, 1900. Her story began in 1918, when

Etta Gatlin, a young mother and her four year old daughter moved with a friend to the A. O. Phillips farm to make their home. This farm was two and one-half miles north east of the then thriving town of Newlin, Texas.

On February 14, 1918, the young mother came to a tragic, and un-timely death. Communications were alow at the time, and travel even alower. Also, the names and whereabouts of her relatives were unknown. As a consequence, no rela-tives attended her funeral.

The young couple with whom the Gatlins had been living did not wish to assume responsibility for a little four year old girl. Adren and Lucy PhiPips only had one child at that time and gladly brought the beautiful, blue-eyed, blond, curly-headed who had information she had baby home with them. She easily searched for so long. baby home with them. She easily became a member of the family and talk and plans to adopt her were soon underway. Progress in adop-tion was slow due to lack of knowl-

Months later, Gladys Gatlin's great-uncle, and father of eight children, showed up and announced he had come to take her to his home to live. Since the Phillips family had no legal rights to Gladys, there was nothing that could be done. After that time, no contact could ever be made with her. It seems the families where she had gone to live with moved frequently. She lived with the great-uncle for about a year; after that, she lived with another uncle. Then for a time she lived with a grandmother who was struggling to raise three small children of her

edge of her relatives.

Soon she went to live with her father and stepmother. In a short time, her father passed away leaving her with her stepmother. After his death, she lived with various aunts and uncles until her mar-

During this period of time, she could not find out anything about her mother. All relatives appeared to feel they were being kind to her by not talking to her of her mother. It is possible they really did not know where she was buried. So try as she would, she could learn noth-

Frequently over the years, she would check records and inquire as to where her mother might have been buried. She had no memory of her staying with the Phillips. Therefore, there was a gap in her life she

Through the years, she had managed to keep a postcard with the postmark of Newlin, Texas. Newlin seemed a likely place to search, and as her children grew Many years of flustration, and Somehow, they were put in touch with Annie Hamilton, who keeps records of graves at Newlin. However, she was unable to help. The checked death records in both Hall and Childress Counties, with no results. Funeral hhomes were no help. The whole thing seemed hope-

> In February of 1990, Gladys' youngest daughter, Debra Miller Goff, decided to try one more time to make contact with someone who could furnish information her mother very much wanted and needed. She contacted Annie Hamilton once more.

> Annie gave her the name of Ruth Cobb who live in Newlin most of her life. Ruth Cobb could not help, but directed her to Mike Hughes of Childress, a former Newlin resident and history buff. Hughes could not help, but gave her the name of Ruby Phillips Roden.

After fifty or sixty years, she had finally contacted the right person 3rd Annual

After many telephone calls,and letters back and forth with Ruby, Gladys Gatlin Miller came to the Newlin Cemetery. She tenderly laid a spray of flowers on her mother's grave for the first time in her life.

grave for the first time in her life. Since no marker was ever put on the grave, A. O. Phillips told his daughter, Ruby, he was going to take a large gyp rock and place it on the Gatling grave. It could be identi-fied in future years. Little did he know, that 70 years later it would truely serve its purpose for which it was intended.

In early years, as late as 1918, many times a funeral home was not used. Neighbors came in and bathed and dressed the body. Others made a burial box, while still other neighbors dug a grave.

It is thought, death records were burned in a fire which destroyed a

store and office owned by the Newlin Justice of the Peace. Gladys Gatlin Miller will be re-turning to the Newlin Gemetery, where she plans to set a proper head stone in the place of the old gyp pock. No doubt she will proper the rock. No doubt she will replace the flowers from time to time.

At long 'ast, the gap in her life has been closed, and she must feel good after so many years of wonder-ing and searching, to finally put her mind at rest.

The Phillips family moved from Newlin to Memphis, and Alvin Phillips and Ruby Roden still make their home there.

Each February 14th had always brought back fond menaories of Gladys. For many years they had wondered where she was, and how
