Moves To Childress

Mullin Motor Now Mullin Ford-Mercury

It is with sorrow that we are witnessing the closing of a landmark business in Turkey. The Mullin Motor will be moving to 400 Commerce, Childress, on September 1, 1990, to be called Mullin Ford-Mercury.

On April 17, 1944, J. T. Mullin who had recently been released from the Army in WWII because of his war injuries bought a gas and oil business from J. V. Mahon.

Eight years later on April 17, 1952, J. T. Mullin purchased the Ford Agency from Roy Russell and J. V. Mahon. At that time it was located across from C. and L. Food. Ford tractors, as well as Ford cars were sold there.

In 1962, a new building was completed at the present location.

During the 35 years they have

served this area as a Ford dealership many honors have come their way. Mr. Mullin states, "The 18 distinguished awards we have won were because you, our customers made them possible."

Mr. Mullin has also won two trips to the Super Bowl because of the wonderful people of Turkey and the surrounding area. "We have won more distinguished achievements than any other Ford dealer in the Panhandle area," said Mr. Mullin.

"It is with much thought and deep regret that we have come to the decision to move our business to Childress. Because of the move we will be able to give you, our valued customer, sale and service on a bigger and better scale."

"We have been very fortunate to have such good employees and

customers to make our business the success it has been," declared Mr. Mullin.

The staff still includes Sandi Fuston, office manager, employed by Mullin Motor since 1961; David Tarrant, certified technician, a 17 year veteran of auto repair. Steve Thomas, parts manager has 15 years experience behind him. Terry Brewer has 10 years of skill to his credit. Brent Tutor who is general manager has been in this field for 8 years.

Stirring The Flame Begins FUM Church Celebration

The church was organized in the home of Mr. and Mrs. W.M. Cooper in 1891. There were seven charter members: W.M. and Elizabeth Cooper, Lily Z. Cooper, Challie Cooper, David C. and Betty M. Lane, and James D. Frazier.

When the City of Turkey was organized in 1905 the congregation built a small white frame building and moved to town. Many things have happened and many people have passed this way in a century of growth.

Sunday, September 8, the congregation will start its centennial year with a look to the future. A team of clergy and lay persons will be in Turkey to lead the church in STIRRING THE FLAME, Experiencing Small Church Renewal. Rev. lead the six member team. Plainview District Superintendent, Rev. Earl Blair, will also be on the team. The Turkey Church intends to have a second 100 years of exciting service.

STIRRING THE FLAME will start at 9:30 a.m. Sunday morning, September 2. The team will be leading the event throughout the day and again on Monday night September 3 at 6:30 p.m. The noon meal Sunday and Monday night supper will be served in the Church Fellowship Hall. All members and friends of the Turkey United Methodist Church are encouraged to take part.

Johnny Harrison will be filling the pulpit in Quitaque so that Pastor Steve Ulrey can be in Turkey for the entire STIRRING THE FLAME event. The event seeks to help local church members experience renewal in their own spiritual lives and to be empowered by the Spirit to become involved in the mission and ministry of the church.

Hall County To Celebrate 100th Birthday

On September 15, Hall County will be celebrating its 100th birthday. Many activities are planned for the day.

A centennial rifle and Hall County Centennial quilt will be given away at 4 p.m.

The north side of the square will be the place for the annual barbeque. Before the barbeque, a dedication ceremony will be held for the Centennial Monument on the Southwest court-

house lawn by the Hall County Centennial Committee. After the barbeque there will be a street dance.

Turkey-Quitaque School Board Has Public Meeting

On Thursday, August 23, 1990 at 8 p.m. a group of citizens met with Turkey-Quitaque School Board in a public tax meeting.

The Texas Legislature in special sessions recently passed Senate Bill 1. The purpose of this Bill is to equalize the rich and poor school districts. But for the Turkey-Quitaque district to receive these funds, they must collect \$313,000.

Also the average daily attendance has an effect on the amount of state funds available. In the past the ADA was set on only 4 weeks of the year. The new law states it will take the ADA rating from average attendance all year.

The school board is working under the rules and regulations now set by the state to "equalize" the state school dollars. The State Property Tax Board sets the value of the property—not the local school board.

Mr. Wilburn Leeper, school superintendent, told the group that the school building bonds have been paid off. When he came to this school \$120,000 had been borrowed and in September when school started, another \$120,000 was borrowed to "make ends meet". There is enough money in the bank to probably take care of this year's expenses.

There is a problem with the Turkey-Quitaque school in the loss of students. Even if half of the children were out of a class, it is a required class. A teacher still must be paid for teaching that class. Two-thirds of the budget goes to pay the teachers who return some of this money to the economy of Turkey-Quitaque. Until the teachers reach a certain salary limit, by law, each is guaranteed a \$1,140 raise each year.

It also takes about \$4,600 per student at Valley for their education.

For each \$1 raised by the school district, the state can supply \$1.70. The 80% tax rate compares with Floydada's proposed 78% and Silverton's 79% tax rate. State spokesmen said because of this evaluation of the property in the district the 91% tax rate is actually only 70%.

School Bus Safety

State law requires drivers on the same roadway as a school bus that has stopped to load or unload school children to stop and remain stopped until one of three things happen: the bus driver signals you to go on by or they turn off the flashing red lights, or the bus itself goes into motion. This law applies whether you are meeting the bus or whether you are going in the same direction as the bus. It also applies inside the city limits, as well as outside the city limit.

The only exception to the law is that drivers on the other side of a divided highway (roadways separated by a physical median) are not required to stop.

Hunting And Fishing Rule Changes Begin

Caprock Canyons State Park has received new guides for hunters and fishermen. New hunting and fishing permits are now available at the office.

The rules and regulations for fishing for catfish are the same for general fishing. However, if you plan to fish for crappie, you will have to throw back anything under 10 inches. Limit on crappies is 25 per day.

When fishing for catfish in the state park, you will need to remember they must be 14 inches long and five is the limit. These new fishing rules will go into effect September 1, 1990.

If hunting deer is your choice, you can begin on October 1 through October 31 in Briscoe and Hall counties with archery. With a bow and arrow only a buck is allowed. General deer hunting begins November 3 and runs through January 6. There is a three deer limit, 1 buck and 2 antler-less, (by permit only).

To hunt mule deer you will have to wait until November 17 through December 2. Limits are the same kinds and amounts as in general deer hunting.

On September 1, dove season will open. Turkey season will begin on November 3, and run through January 6. Two turkeys, hens or gobblers are legal. Spring season on turkeys will open April 6 through May 5. Two gobblers are the limit in the spring. Only three turkeys per license is allowed each year.

Hunting turkeys with a bow and arrow is allowed October 1-October 31.

Pheasant season opens December 8 and closes December 23. Only 2 cocks per day may be killed. Four in your possession is all that is allowed.

Quail may be hunted from November 3 until February 24. Fifteen is the bag limit on quail per day. Only 45 are allowed in one person's possession at one time.
