Two Retiring Educators To Be Honored Sunday

Two long-time teacher-administrators in the local area will be honored at the Valley Cafeteria on the eve of their retirement from their school posts.

Loran Denton, who has been active in all phases of school life, teaching and administration, for the past 39 years, all in Hall County, is retiring at the end of this school year, and will become County Judge of Hall County next year.

Mr. Denton has lived in Hall County since 1925. He graduated from the schools at Leslie in Hall County. He taught at Lakeview and Deep Lake and was superintendent at Lakeview 13 years, moving from there to Turkey where he was superintendent 16 years and has served in the Valley Schools as superintendent since the consolidation of Turkey-Quitauque schools.

Mr. Denton received both his bachelors and masters degrees at West Texas State and also did some work at Texas Tech.

Mr. and Mrs. Denton have two sons and a daughter. One of their sons lives in New York and Mr. and Mrs. Denton plan to go to New York this summer for a visit with their son and family, and he also says that he will do some fishing, when and wherever possible.

J. R. Adamson, Jr., a native of Turkey, is also retiring from the teaching profession at the end of this school term and will devote his time to farming.

J. R. has taught school for 22 years, spending one year at Estelline, three years at Quitauque, and the remainder of the time at Turkey until the consolidation of Turkey-Quitauque schools. He has served as elementary principal in both the Turkey and Valley schools.

Mr. Adamson attended Texas Tech where he majored in agricultural education. He served in the armed forces for 2½ years during World War II and served in Germany during that time.

Mr. and Mrs. Adamson have two boys, Rod and Rex, both students at Tech. Mrs. Adamson also teaches at Valley.

The faculty is hosting a get-together in their honor Sunday afternoon at the Valley School from 3 until 5 p.m.

Services for three members of a Brownfield family, who were killed in a two-car automobile accident Thursday night, May 9, 1974, were held Monday at Plainview First Baptist Church.

Killed in the accident were Mr. and Mrs. Robert A. Cole and their 7-month-old son, Robert, jr.

Rev. Carlos McLeod, pastor, Dr. Howard Crawford, interim pastor of First United Methodist Church and Dr. Floyd Bradley, pastor of First Baptist Church of Floydada, officiated. Burial was in Plainview Memorial Park with Resthaven - Singleton-Wilson Funeral Home in charge of arrangements.

Employed by R. C. Hodges Electric, Inc. in Plainview since June 1970, Cole was sent by his company to Brownfield where he began work February 12 as electrical job foreman on the new addition on the Brownfield General Hospital.

He was born August 15, 1950 in LaCrosse, Wisconsin. He attended the Silverton Schools and was graduated from Flomot High School. He attended Clarendon Junior College and Wayland Baptist College. Cole began working part-time for Hodges Electric when he went to Plainview to attend Wayland, and later began working full time.

Cole and his wife were married July 3, 1970 at Dozier.

Cole is survived by his parents, the Rev. and Mrs. Leo Cole of New Home, formerly pastor of the Flomot Baptist Church; a brother, John of the U. S. Navy at Norfolk, Virginia; three sisters, Aliee Rushing of Fort Worth, Donna and Lori Cole, both of New Home; and a grandmother, Mrs. Jeff Davis of Plainview.

Mrs. Sandra Sue Cole, 23, was a native of San Antonio. She attended Clarendon Junior College and Wayland Baptist College.

She is survived by her parents, Rev. and Mrs. C. R. Hankins of Wellington.

The three were killed in the accident Thursday evening just up the Lockney Caprock, along with the Spray family. The two cars hit head-on. No one knows just what happened.

A Quitauque lady came upon the wreck and drove about one-half mile to the Cogdill Ranch and called the emergency telephone number in Quitauque. She reported one car was on fire and the Quitauque Fire Department took a fire truck to the scene of the accident. Two ambulances were dispatched from Quitauque, an ambulance from Lockney, one from Floydada, the Sheriff of Floyd County and the Highway Patrol.

Mrs. Beulah Baker Named Pioneer Woman Of The Year

Mrs. Beulah Ann (Moore) Baker of Plainview, a former resident of the Turkey area, was named the 15th Pioneer Woman of

the Year last Saturday night at the Pioneer Round-Up Program in Plainview. She was crowned amid repeated rounds of applause from pioneer hands which helped carve this country. Mrs. Baker is 80.

After 31 years of residing in Hale County, and another 28 years in a nearby area, Granny Baker, as she is known, still lives in Plainview and "loves it," according to her friends.

Born in Wynnewood, Oklahoma on February 7, 1894, Beulah Ann Moore came to Texas at the age of two and married Jess B. Barker at age 17. The couple had five children, and at the time her husband, a Baptist minister, died, she was left to support herself and her two young sons during the depression days.

Later she married R. L. Baker, assuming the responsibility of helping to rear nine of his twelve children. After moving to Hale County, they were a farm family, until Mr. Baker's death in 1957.

STILL ACTIVE
A lover of children, the still-active Woman of the Year babysat for local families for years, even after she reached the age of 87. Her experience in handling children stems from "way back," having cared for seven of Mr. Barker's nephews and nieces, besides their own children. Now Mrs. Baker has 46 grandchildren and 40 great-grandchildren.

A host of "kids" from six to sixty call her Granny and other names of endearment such as Mother and Aunt Beulah, knowing that her interest and concern is available to whomever needs it.

A member of Seth Ward Baptist Church, she has taught Sunday School for 56 years, beginning in 1917. During Saturday's program, she was introduced as "a friend, a loved one and an angel of mercy."

Her selection as Woman of the Year was made by B&PW members from a field of several nominated by community members.

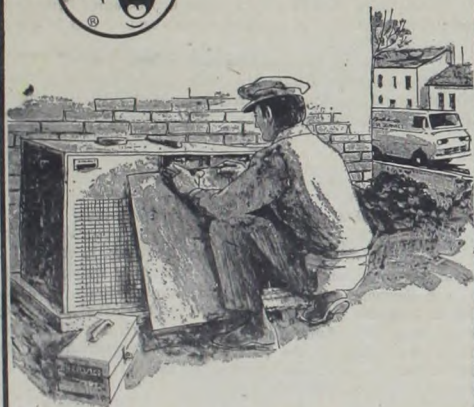
