Briscoe County Appraiser To Hear Tax Protests

Taxpayers in the Briscoe County Appraisal District will have an opportunity next week to protest values proposed for their property for local taxes. The district's appraisal review board (ARB) will begin hearing taxpayer protests on Thursday, July 6, 1989.

After the ARB concludes its hearings and approves the final property values, local governments will use these

values to assess property taxes to property owners for 1989.

The ARB is a group of citizens who live in the appraisal district and are appointed by the district's directors. Their responsibilities are outlined by the Texas Constitution, which requires that property be appraised equally and uniformly and that exemptions and productive valuation are properly granted.

Property owners appear before the ARB and may protest any of these seven specific actions of the appraisal office:

1. the appraised or agricultural value of property.
2. unequal appraisal of the taxpayer's property compared to other property in the district.
3. inclusion of the property on

I was outraged last week by the decision handed down by the United States Supreme Court concerning the charges of a Texas man burning Old Glory during a protest back in 1984. They say it is excused if done as a show of expression. Baloney! To me, as well as millions of other Americans, it's a kick in the teeth. It goes against everything this country is built on. My kids can tell you, I break out in goose bumps every single time I hear the National Anthem, even on TV. A SALUTE is a the only acceptable form of expression for the Flag. Whether it's flying freely or draped over one our boys. It stands for freedom in this country, and if someone doesn't like that, let them leave it, BUT leave our flag alone. Wonder what the courts would have done if he'd torched the Statue of Liberty?

The Boy Scout troop held the ceremony. They had dug a hole along side the flagpole for the retirement and burial of the Flag. Nor can I explain how my heart kept from bursting as they raised the new Old Glory, bright, pretty, fresh, proudly waving, reigning in freedom and hope, reassuring me it was okay. Saying to me, one may age and die, but I'll always be here big, bold and strong.

I'll never forget that night, as long as I live. Throughout the game, I'd catch myself looking up again and again at that big beautiful symbol.

The timing of this court ruling came just days before the whole country, from sea to shining sea, will celebrate the freedom that the American Flag stands for.

The courts may think it's okay, but I certainly don't. And I know I'm not alone. Like I said, it's a kick in the teeth.

Dear Editor,
My name is LaDell Harrison and I am President of the Memphis Little League. For the last two baseball seasons you town and area has supplied teams for our league. Last year there was about 15 players and this year there was 64. This included T-Ball (5-6 year olds), 15 minor league (7-9 year olds), 15 girls softball (9-12 year olds) and 16 boys major league. In the rest of the league Memphis had about 180 players.

In Memphis this year we will have the Area III major league boys All-Star Tournament. This will include teams from Memphis, Childress, HiPlains West, which includes Panhandle and Claude, HiPlains East, which includes Clarendon, McLean and Hedley. I want the Quitaque area to know that they are fortunate to have parents who are willing to devote so much time to give your kids recreation for the summer. The players and coaches helped with all of our fund raisers and were the main reason for their success. All through the season when we asked for help your people were there giving their time and support. To all of those parents who transported the kids back and forth, I commend them. I know it was extremely difficult especially with the bad weather that we had this year.

There are some that I need to name individually that went the extra mile with help. Gary and Vona Chandler were the first ones

to contact us about playing and they must have spent countless hours on the phone organizing the league. David and Dianne Brunson organized the sign-up back in March, which got the ball rolling. Vona and Manuel Cruz attended our umpire school and are certified Little League Umpires for life. The coaches were Tomas Hinojosa, Manuel Cruz and David Brunson for the Major League boys. Gary, Vona Chandler and Danny Stewart helped with the Girls Softball. In the Minor League were David Brunson, Gary Chandler and Walter Wayne Taylor. For the T-Ball they were Kay and George Calvert and Danny Stewart. Janice Henson kept books for the Major and Minor league teams. Dianne Brunson helped haul and corral the kids.

I want everyone to know that these coaches did an excellent job with their players. These players were always courteous and obeyed the umpires at all times. - the appraisal records.
- denial of a partial exemption, such as a homestead exemption.
- denial of agricultural-use, open-space or timber productivity valuation.
- identification of the taxing unit or units in which the property is located.
- determination that the taxpayer is the owner of the property, and any other action of the appraisal office that adversely affects them.

Carlye Fleming, chief appraiser for the district, outlined the steps for a property owner to file a protest. First, the property owner must file a written "notice of protest" with ARB. This must be filed before the ARB can hear a taxpayer protest.

Official forms for a notice of protest are available at the appraisal district office. "A letter from the taxpayer is also acceptable." Mrs. Fleming said, "as long as it identifies the property owner and the property which is the subject of

the protest and indicates dissatisfaction with some

decision or action of the appraisal office."

Each protesting taxpayer may offer evidence of argument either in person or by filing an affidavit with the ARB. Taxpayers should be aware that the ARB has no authority over tax rates or taxing unit spending and will not hear protest of those matters.

The ARB will schedule hearings as property owners file protests and will inform them of the time, date and place of their individual hearings before the schedule appearance date. Mrs. Fleming said that protest hearings will be held one day and that the ARB expects to approve the final appraisal roll on July 17, 1989. State law requires the ARB to review and approve the appraisal records by July 20, 1989.

The State Property Tax Board has issued a pamphlet called "Taxpayers' Rights, Remedies, Responsibilities," available at the Briscoe County Appraisal District office, which explains how to prepare and present an appeal to the ARB. For a copy, contact the appraisal district staff at the courthouse or call 823-2161.

Antique Car Show In Wellington July 3

Wellington will become the Antique Car Capital of Texas for a day when vintage vehicles valued at more than \$5 million visit the city for a day of fun and competition Monday, July 3.

Highlight of the July Fourth weekend celebration is the visit of 120 antique vehicles which will be participating in the Seventh Annual Great American Race.

The visit to Wellington, located on U.S. Hwy. 83 in the southeastern Texas Panhandle, will be the fourth stop on the day for the automobiles which will begin their cross-country journey a week earlier in Norfolk, Va.

Wellington will be one of only 41 cities acting as official hosts of the cross-country race which ends Friday, July 7 at Disneyland, Ca. and will be covered from start to finish by the ESPN cable television network.

Also on hand that day will be more than 60 antique and classic automobiles which have been lovingly restored by car buffs from throughout the Panhandle and western Oklahoma.

All of the antique vehicles can be seen on the Courthouse Square located a half mile west of U.S. Hwy 83 on Eighth street.

The display and car show of antique vehicles will begin at mid morning on the south side of the courthouse with the first of 120 racing antique vehicles expected to arrive in the city about 3:30 p.m.

Vehicles in the Great American Race range from a 1912 American LaFrance fire engine to a 1940 Jaguar SS-100 and 1940 BMW 328.

PCS Offers Free Weatherization Program For Low Income Homes

Applications are currently being taken for the Panhandle Community Services Weatherization Program. This program provides free weatherization of low income homes, with emphasis on homes of elderly and handicapped individuals.

With many of the elderly on fixed incomes—personal comfort and overall physical well being are often set aside in order to save on utility bills. Weatherization can reduce the cost of utility bills up to 30 percent, allowing these individuals to live in a better home environment.

Money to provide for this free service is a result of a fund for energy conservation by the state and federal government. There are some basic qualifications, for instance, income per year: a one-member family income must not exceed \$7,475 and a two-member family is not to exceed \$10,025.

On-site home evaluations are

conducted by a PCS representative of qualifying homes. Work on the home is conducted by a subcontractor. Individuals who could benefit from this program or know of someone who they feel might be in need of assistance are encouraged to contact a Weatherization representative. Summer Safety Tips for Kids Prevent Head Injuries

Summer is here and it's time for all those activities we associate with the warmer weather—swimming, bicycling and skateboarding.

All this summer fun, though, leaves our kids open to serious injury. The rate of head injuries is particularly high during this time of year.

Head injury is the number one cause of death among children. An estimated one million children under the age of 16 are victims of head injury each year in the United States, according to the National Head Injury Foundation. Practicing a few simple safety rules can greatly reduce the risk of head injury.

By the Water

Whether you're by a pond, pool or the ocean, have the kids check the water depth before they dive. Have them always jump in feet first the first time. Remember too, that the depth may vary just a few feet away and there may be hidden objects in the water.

- Don't let kids run at the pool's edge where they may slip and hit their heads. Instead, encourage them to play in a nearby grassy area.
- Don't leave children unattended near the water—even for a few seconds. In no time that child can be in the water and it only takes a

very small amount of water for a child to drown.

On the Ground

- When cycling, be sure your kids wear helmets. Because of the current popularity of bicycle racing, more and more people are wearing them.
- Be sure the kids' bikes have a basket or rack if they will be carrying things or encourage your child to use a backpack. If they try to carry something in their arms they won't have proper balance and won't be able to steer properly.
- When your kids are skateboarding, rollerskating, horseback riding or playing baseball and football encourage them to wear a helmet—even when just playing with a group of friends. Accidents don't only happen in competitions.
- If they're out at night, be sure your kids have on light-colored or reflective clothing and that their bikes have reflectors and a light.
