## Relatives of Mrs. Ray Payne Critically Hurt

Mrs. Ray Payne called the hospital Tuesday afternoon and talked to Mrs. Roy Matthews. She had come through surgery and was out of intensive care. One daughter, Jalaine, 16, is still in intensive care but the extent of her injuries is not known yet. Another daughter, Brenda, 15, is doing fine.

The family was injured in an automobile accident Friday night. The three-vehicle accident claimed the life of a Lubbock man, 69, a former Wellington resident, about 7:00 p.m., 11 miles south of Lubbock on U. S. Highway 87.

Mrs. Matthews was taking a group of youngsters, her two daughters and Jana White, 16, all cheerleaders, and a son, Terry, 11, to Tahoka to a football game when they met a car coming down the road going north in a southbound lane without his lights on. This was a four-lane highway and the man had just failed to drive far enough before turning back north. A pick-up truck following Mrs. Matthews and her group hit the north-bound car after it had hit Mrs. Matthews' vehicle.

All the group injured were taken to Methodist Hospital in Lubbock, where it was determined Mrs. Matthews had suffered three breaks in her leg, one in the hip requiring surgery Monday morning, another between the knee and ankle, and another in the ankle. She was also in surgery five hours Friday night.

Jalaine received head injuries, internal injuries, a cracked pelvis, and had not regained full consciousness Monday morning, although she had murmured something to her brother.

Brenda received a broken arm and facial lacerations. She underwent x-rays Monday morning for back injuries.

Tim Matthews, 11, was also hospitalized, but he was released Sunday at noon.

The extent of the injuries the White girl received are not known here, although we know she was hospitalized.

## SEASON'S FIRST BALE OF COTTON GINNED LAST WEEK AT QUITAUQUE

The Farmers Co-op Gin of Quitauque ginned the season's first bale of cotton Thursday of last week.

Von Tiffin, who farms between Quitauque and Flomot, produced the first bale of cotton, which weighed 450 pounds. Mr. Tiffin brought in 1480 pounds of seed cotton. There were 750 pounds of seed.

The gin paid Mr. Tiffin 50c per pound for his cotton and a premium is being made up at this writing for Mr. Tiffin but Gin Manager K. R. Dossey said that the premium was not completed as yet. S. C. Brown produced last year's first bale and ginned it on October 8.

## Flomot Horse Show to Be held October 3

Flomot's Eighth Annual Quarter Horse Show and Youth Activity will be held Sunday, October 3, starting at 10:00 a.m., it was announced this week.

The show, sponsored by the Flomot Lions Club, was postponed from the originally scheduled date of July 25, when horse movement was banned by the VEE quarantine.

The quarantine was lifted August 28. Halter performances and Youth Activity will be held simultaneously.

The show will be held at the Turner Arena, two miles east and one mile south of Flomot. The manager is Malcolm Turner of Flomot, the judge will be Tommy Buckner of Lamesa, and secretary is Mrs. Eliza Jones of Flomot.

The management is giving ribbons, first place—through sixth. Trophies will be given all first places. A trophy will be awarded the Grand Champion and a rosette to the reserve. The performance class will receive the same plus a third of the entry fees (paid to three places).

In the Youth Activity the Quarter Horse Association will give a beautiful trophy to the high point boy or girl entering the show.

The Flomot Quarter Horse Show is approved by the American Quarter Horse Association and is being held under the direction of the Flomot Lions. AQHA rules will be observed throughout the show.

All entries must be registered with AQHA and shown in the name of the owner as recorded. Exhibitors will be asked to present registration papers or a photostat copy as proof of registration before entries will be accepted.
