## The Texas State Democracy

 Returns To First Principles. Klan EliminatedThe Texas Democratic State Con ention met at Austin in the Senate Shamber Tuesday and held a two days session of what will go down in history as one of the most important conventions in Texas.
M. M. Urane was made temporary charman and former United States Senator Joseph Weldon Bailey was elected permanent chairman. Joe Burkett was made secretary.
The anti Klan controlled the con rention by an overwhelming maority. Out of 1,400 delegates the Klan only had one hundred present oo the great fight some predicted, turned out a fizzle, with the steam roller in the hands of the anti-Kisn, that showed especial delight in rolling it over Klansmen who aspired to any position. They made a clean weep in the State Committee, with out a Kiansmen on it.
Jed Adams was elected Nationa Committeeman to succeed Tom Love, who resigned and bolted the party after the second primary. Mrs. J T. Blordworth, by resolution, was requested to resign as National Com mitteewoman. After adoption of the resolution ex-Governor Fergu son asked that it be withdrawn, which was granted reluctantly. little hazy in report as to the status of the resolution. Mrs. Bloodworth will bave to support the State ticket or get out. That seems to be the impression
The platform closely follows Mrs, Ferguson's platform, with some modifications as to the Ku Klux Klan. The Klan was denounced by name as un-Demgeratic, un-Christian and un.American and all Democrats who have joined this danger ous order through misrepresentation as to ite real purpose, are asked to withdraw from it.
The National Democratic Convenion condemned the Klan without cailing it by name. John W. Davis, our nominee for President, in his speeches condemns the Ku Klux Klan by name.
Now the State Convention condemns the Klan, naming it as a dangerous order. So it looks like all Democrats who have been invelgled into this order will have to in open hostility to the National and State Democracy. A Democrat whether or not he ever hopes for any political preferments or just to re tain hie party standing will have to withdraw from the Klan, because the party has declared open war on
