## T.P. Offers Bargain Rate In Thanksgiving Fares

Texas can do their Thanksgiving traveling this year at bargain prices. According to Frank Jensen, General Passenger Agent of the Texas and Pacific Railway, fares to all points on that line in Texas and Louisiana will be sixty per cent of the one way fare for a round trip for Thanksgiving travelers.

"Such low fares," Mr. Jensen said, "are almost unheard of, especially during recent years. More than that, travel is made safe, comfortable and fast by the most modern of trains and conveniences."

These special low fare tickets, Mr. Jensen explained, will be on sale at all Texas and Pacific ticket offices November 28th, 29th and 30th with a return limit of December 5th.

"A fare of two cents a mile for distance traveled," the General Passenger Agent explained, "will also be on sale November 28th, 29th and 30th to Little Rock, St. Louis, Chicago, Minneapolis and St. Paul, with a return limit of ten days."

Pullman fares will also be reduced for these Thanksgiving fares.

## Officials Attend Relief Meeting In Austin

Judge J. H. Carpenter, Mayor H. Schwartz, Dr. W. S. Hamlett, County Chairman, of Baird; E. E. Cook, County Administrator and Mayor Tee Bauleh, of Clyde; Mayor Collins of Cross Plains; County Commissioners C. E. Bray of Putnam, and Geo. H. Clifton of Cross Plains, attended a meeting in Austin Tuesday where county and city officials and others affiliated with unemployment relief work from practically every county in the state gathered to gather information about the machinery set up to distribute funds and work to the needy of the state.

Governor Miriam A. Ferguson, her husband, James E. Ferguson; Lawrence Westbrook, director of the civil works program and the Texas relief commission, and Dr. Carl C. Taylor of Washington, assistant federal director of subsistence homesteads, conferred with county judges, mayors and relief workers at this meeting which was held in the hall of representatives.

## Callahan County Rural School Projects

Callahan County Rural School projects which were recently submitted to the local C. W. A. Committee by County Superintendent, A. L. Johnson, for general repairs on all school buildings and grounds in the county have been approved at Austin by the Texas Rehabilitation and Relief Committee.

This project calls for several days work at each school building and grounds in the county, thereby putting the rural schools in good condition and at the same time giving work to those who need it.

This work will be supervised by County Supt. A. L. Johnson, working in connection with E. E. Cook, County Administrator and local trustees in each school district.

## Twenty Dollar Advance On Cotton Option

Immediate distribution of \$34,000 to the cotton producers of Callahan County who took options in their cotton reduction campaign this summer, was made public today by Oscar Johnson, director of finance for the farm administration.

After signing the agreement to cut their five year average 40 per cent this next year and transferring his option to the pool the producer will receive \$20 for each bale on which he is entitled to an option.

The pool will issue certificates that will entitle the producer to the advance above 10 cents that may come after the deduction of expenses. A flat \$20 payment will be advanced now however, and should cotton advance more will be paid.

## Hugh Moore, Pioneer Baird Girl Chosen As Campus Beauty Favorite At A. C. C.

Hugh Moore, 76, a resident of Dudley, in the southwest part of Callahan county for more than 50 years, was found dead in his farm home, about 9 o'clock Wednesday morning by neighbors. T. J. White, J. P., F. E. Mitchell, county attorney and Bob Tollet, deputy sheriff, went out to the Moore home and held an inquest. Justice White gave a verdict of death from natural causes. Mr. White informed a representative off the Star that Mr. Moore was found setting in a rocking chair, with a pillow under his head and feet across a chair. A fire was burning low in the stove near where he sat. Mr. Moore has been in failing health for some months and has been under the care of a physician. He had died quietly without a struggle. He was up about his place Tuesday, neighbors said. Mr. Moore lived alone.

The body was carried to Abilene in a Laughter ambulance, where it will be held awaiting the arrival of his son and daughter, Hugh T. Moore and Mrs. H. M. Stephenson from California. Burial will be made in Abilene cemetery by the side of his wife, who died in 1908. His two children are his only survivors.

## Albany - Baird - 7-0

One third of the three-way tie for the leadership of this class B district was shattered Friday afternoon when the Baird Bears were defeated, 7-0 by the Albany Lions in the hardest fought game of the local season. It was the first time this year Baird has been held scoreless.

Albany and Cross Plains continue as joint owners off first place, as a result of the contest here.

Fifteen hundred people, including the Albany High School band and both high school squads, and several hundred Albany citizens saw the game. In the third quarter Warren Caudle off Albany plunged the line for the only touchdown of the day. Hemmons, substitute halfback, came in and kicked the extra point. With the ball a yard from the goal line, Albany used four attempts to buck it over.

Baird's chance to score was lost on an incomplete from Bell over the goal line after Bell had heaved a pass to Acheson for 40 yards.

### Government Reports 7997 Bales Cotton Ginned In County

The latest government report dated November 1, gives the number of bales of cotton ginned in Callahan county as 7997 as compared with 4172 bales ginned to November 1, 1932. These figures were given The Star by John H. Shrader, special agent, Department of Commerce.

### Plan To Grow Onions For Market

A plan is in the making whereby farmers of Callahan County may take up the growing of onions as a good money crop. Mr. Lloyd E. Cox, traffic agent of the Baltimore & Ohio Ry., was in Baird yesterday conferring with Ross B. Jenkins, county agent, in regard to this plan. Mr. Cox made a survey of the Clyde country and says he finds the soil fine for growing onions.

The proposed plan is for farmers to grow the onions between the cotton rows. This plan has been most successful around Dallas. Mr. Cox says, the farmers getting around \$1.00 per bushel for a yield of from one to three hundred bushels per acre.

The onion plants, White Bermuda or Yellow Wax, will be furnished at a minimum cost to the farmers and a guaranteed market will be available.

In addition, an expert in the culture of onions will visit this area to give all necessary instructions as to this work. The buyers will also gather, grade and pack the onion crop.

This seems to be a splendid plan to us and we trust our farmers will at least give it serious consideration. The soil in most every part of Callahan county is adaptable to most any kind of crops.

Mr. Jenkins asks the farmers who are interested in this plan to come in and give him what information they can as to the growing of onions in their section and if they would care to enter this plan. If not convenient to see Mr. Jenkins write to him, as Mr. Cox expects to return to Baird within the next two or three weeks to confer with Mr. Jenkins in regards to this plan.

The oil well on the T. A. Irvin farm near Oplin being drilled by the Oplin Oil Co. is the center of interest just now and that it will be completed a big producer is believed. Oil in paying quantities was encountered Thursday night of last week at a depth of 4490 feet in what is believed to be the Ellenburger lime.

The drill struck the pay at 11:30 o'clock and the hole filled in 30 minutes. Gas estimated at 5,000,000 to 8,000,000 feet sent heavy sprays of oil over the derrick at intervals of 30 minutes. Water infiltered and stopped the heads. The crew is now underreaming and cementing casing.

This well is four miles northwest of the Johnson-Empire well, which flowed 1,000 barrels until ruined by salt water.

The new well has created keen interest in this section and we understand leasing is quite lively in the Oplin section.

Many predictions have been made in the past that a wonderful deep oil pool would some day be opened in the south-western part of Callahan County. Maybe this is the beginning.
