GENE MAYFIELD IS NEW HEAD FOOTBALL COACH AT WTSU

Gene Mayfield, son of Mr. and Mrs. Jim Mayfield of Quitaque, has been hired as head football coach and athletic director at West Texas State University.

Gene, a QHS graduate, is one of the winningest high school coaches in the state of Texas, thus returns to his alma mater where he is rated as one of that university's all-time great quarterbacks.

Gene has been a high school head coach since 1954 and he has never had a losing season. In 1955 during his second year at Littlefield, Gene's team won 5 and lost 5 and that is the poorest season that one of his team ever posted. One other team lost four games but won 11, making it all the way to the state finals. He has won a state championship and has been to the finals or three other occasions.

In his years as head coach, Gene's teams have won 166 games and lost only 35.

Clesby Patterson, a former pastor of the Turkey Methodist Church, who died Wednesday, February 3 in St. Anthony's Hospital in Amarillo following a brief illness, were conducted at 10:00 a.m. Friday, February 7, 1971, in the First United Methodist Church in Fritch, Texas.

The Rev. Ted Dotts, District Superintendent for the Methodist Church from Pampa, officiated. He was assisted by the Rev. Edgar Irvin, a retired Methodist minister of Fritch. Graveside rites were conducted at 5:00 p.m. Friday in Merkel, Texas, with Rev. James Merrell officiating, under the direction of Ed Brown and Sons Funeral Directors of Borger.

The Rev. Mr. Patterson had been pastor of the First United Methodist Church in Fritch for the past seven years.

Bro. Patterson was born in Merkel, Texas, October 11, 1905.

Survivors include his wife, Jessie, a son, Clesby Lynn of Houston; a daughter, Mrs. Ralph Russell of Bossier, Louisiana; three brothers, C. O. Quitaque caught up and went ahead in the third quarter and led 25-24 at the final buzzer. The Pantherettes committed too many turnovers to win.

Bonnie Clary tossed in 13 points to win scoring honors for the Pantherettes; Wanda Ramsey was next with 11; Valerie Robison scored 5 points and Vanessa Robison and Mary Brunson each hit for 2 points.

Neva Morrison, the only senior on the Pantherettes squad played her last high school game for the home folks.

In the Panther - Owl contest the game was close for a quarter and a half. In fact, there was never more than three points difference in the score until about midway of the second quarter. The Owls tied the count at 28-all but from that point Quitaque started to pull away and at half-time had opened a 10-point gap. The Owls pulled to within 6 points early in the third period but it was short-lived and at the end of the period the count was 61-43 and it was just a question of how much. The Panthers were playing their last game at home for the season and for eight seniors it was their last game before the home folks and their farewell game was a fine one. It would have taken a great team to have beaten them Friday night.

It is customary for the President Pro Tempore to be sworn in early in the morning of the designated day to carry out gubernatorial duties as he deems suitable and to greet his constituents and other friends at designated times throughout the day.

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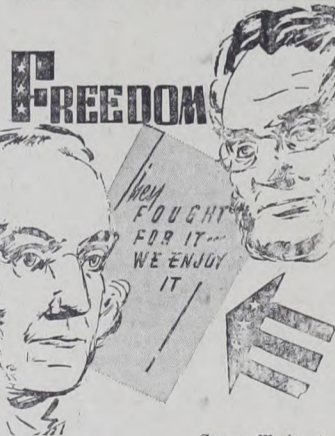

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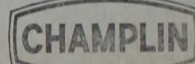

Witch Doctor To Modern Medicine



Modern medicine hopes to learn the witch doctor's remedies before they are lost. They may—as many doctors openly admit—hold the answer to some of mankind's worst ills and ailments.

But from Africa to the deep Amazon jungles, civilization is smothering the secrets of jungle treatments and cures, as well as discrediting the quackery that often kills and cripples.

According to the National Geographic Society, more and more witch doctors are retiring. They forget their secrets or take them to the grave.

Fewer and fewer regions of our "shrinking" world are beyond the reach of medical missionaries or government medical officers, which is good in one sense and bad in another.

It is a fact, however, that the medicines made by witch doctors from bark, leaves, seeds, nuts, fruits, or roots of plants, or maybe extracted from birds, snakes, fish or other animals may be far from worthless.

Americans know well the contributions of our Indians who have given us more than 50 plants for our modern pharmacology. For instance, the May apple, an old antidote for warts, is now known to contain an antitumor substance.

In Africa, Uganda's "toothache plant" produces an effective pain killer. Experiments with some powerful poisons may produce specialized anesthetics or relaxing drugs. The South American blowgun poison, curare, is used in treating heart disease. And a medicine of ancient India, taken from the snake-root or Rauwolfia, has been very useful in lowering blood pressure.

Science is also interested in sea snakes' venom, which is 50 times as deadly as the cobra's. When refined, it is useful

in stopping bleeding. The venom of the toad fish fights diabetes by burning up blood sugar.

Witch doctors have conducted their primitive practices in all corners of the world, with medicines evolving from thousands of years of trial and error. Traditionally, much witch doctor treatment involved the kill-or-cure approach, but some were highly skilled. A few years ago, two South American doctors performed a brain operation using surgical instruments invented for the same purpose by the Incas.

Even psychiatrists respectfully have studied witch doctors' successful treatment of mental patients, who believe their troubles come from a variety of unfriendly spirits.

And talking about spirits and "cheering up the mind," Polish doctors in the 17th Century recommended Polish vodka as a medicine. In fact, there is a little poem in Polish medical lore, which appears in the book "Vodka or Spirits," that is being followed by people the world over today: "Though you have had spirits for time immemorial in Poland, yet you do not know the advantage it has. Read this book, you who drink vodka. See for yourselves how it can restore your health." The Poles, incidentally, invented Vodka and have been producing it for centuries. "Wodka" as they call it, is now served in this country to thousands of Americans to "cheer up their minds."

MISSIONARY SAYS LANGUAGE NOT NEEDED TO UNDERSTAND AND LOVE COSTA RICAN PEOPLE

"Coma estas," conversational Spanish for "How are you?" became important overnight to Gay Pepper, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Dan Kingston of Flomot. It all happened because she was sent as a missionary assist to San Jose, Costa Rica, and had no Spanish language training.

"For the first time in my life," Gay relates with a smile, "I was the foreigner. The culture was different, the money was strange, and the three hours of rain that averaged ten inches per day seemed like a deluge to us. To the nationals it was just ordinary."

Miss Pepper graduated from Mount Vernon College in May, 1970, and was sent to the mission post where her aunt and uncle are missionaries. The sponsoring church is in Victorville, Calif.

The Man On The Moon Meets The Man On The Street

We know that landing men on the moon and returning them to earth was a tremendous accomplishment. The intercontinental ballistic missile fired from a submarine is more of a mystery but it is a marvel, too. Jet transports that can carry nearly 500 passengers across the Atlantic are easier to comprehend. But what does it all mean?

Good question!

It is difficult for us to bridge the enormous gap between an astronaut in a space suit walking on the moon and a new method of treating heart patients, or to relate the techniques used in designing, developing, and producing a supersonic transport to programs that will improve man's environment.

But there is a bridge and a direct relationship between the esoteric technology of the aerospace industry and a mundane problem such as how to transport a worker between his home and work quickly and efficiently.

The job of creating the bridge through technology transfer is underway, and the tide of transfer runs stronger every day.

Specific examples include:

- Microelectronic devices, developed for the Apollo program, that can monitor and broadcast physiological information.
- A turboprop, based on aerodynamic principles, powered by an aircraft-type turbine engine, that is lighter, faster, quieter, more reliable and cheaper to run.
- A computer-based information system that will link together law enforcement agencies in California, from a sheriff's office to a large police department.
- Solar arrays, developed to provide spacecraft power, that are being considered as auxiliary power sources for hospitals or laboratories.

The Aerospace Industries Association booklet, "Aerospace Technology: Creating Social Progress," contains numerous examples of applying aerospace-generated technology to problems that involve all of us. Purpose of the missionary assist program is to offer support and help to the missionaries. The assist lives with the missionary or in an apartment that is part of the church property. Fifty dollars of the \$75 an assist earns each month goes for board and room.

The missionaries conduct a Bible college there and have all the regular church activities that are carried on here, such as Sunday School, church visitations, youth programs and other church related activities. The predominant religion is Catholicism.

"When I first arrived, I found the nationals more emotional than we appear at home, where we are trained to be reserved and we hold up maturity as something quite desirable.

"The language is another barrier I had to cross. I think it was good that I couldn't speak the language at first, for it taught me to see that you can feel a bond with people, understand and love them, even though you can't communicate with them freely in their tongue. They are a happy people," she commented.

Miss Pepper found the people friendly and willing to share anything they may have. Their basic national foods are rice, tortilla, chicken and frijoles. Food is prepared with lots of spices.

The work of the Four-square Gospel Church in San Jose is not only to conduct classes and church services but to train young nationals to go out among the rural people

and teach the gospel.

Gay feels she has learned there are ministries beside those of filling a pulpit and that she has become much more sensitive to people. She sees these ministries as, 1) to help a person to grow spiritually; 2) to help people grow so close to others that you can feel the burden of their heart even though you can't speak the same language. Her own personal ministry, she feels, has become a more personal one to mankind in general.

"My training was learning to teach, to play the piano, to co-ordinate activities. Now it has become a sense of inter-communication which puts the two areas of training and sensitivity to the needs and feelings of those with whom you work and meet, so close to you, you feel better able to serve."

Miss Pepper returned to the States recently because of the death of her grandmother. She has returned to her work in Costa Rica and will be there until late spring.

She plans to be married in June, the ceremony to be performed in the Flomot Baptist Church.

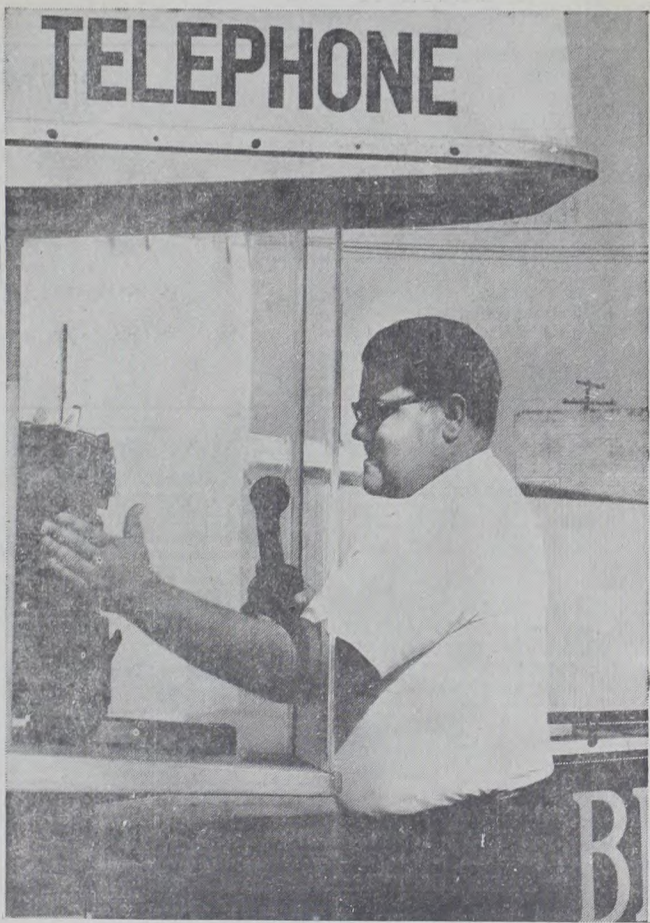

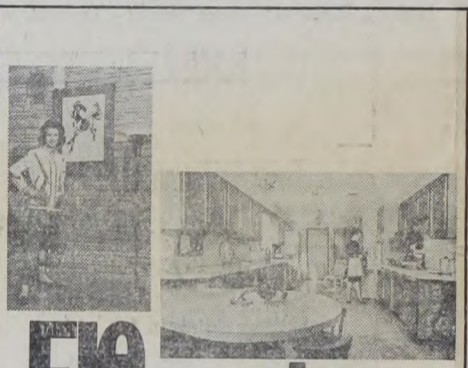
DOLLS TEACH GROOMING

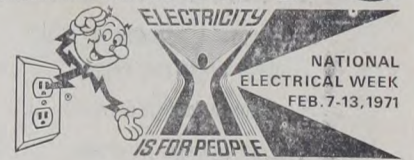

is engaged in service because he knows this is God's will for his life. Is he happy? He certainly is! But it is the by-product of a life that is yielded to God.

In today's scripture lesson James talks about the results of a pleasure-seeking life. His words may be freely but accurately translated as follows: "You want something desperately, and when you can't

have it, you feel like murdering someone; you're envious of what another has, and when you cannot obtain it, you quarrel and fight. You don't get what you want because you don't ask for it. And when you do, your prayer isn't answered because you ask with the wrong motives—to satisfy your own desires."

A self-indulgent attitude sets men at each other's throats because they are competing for the same things: money, power, prestige, worldly possessions and physical gratification. It also drives men to do things that are cruel and painful, and even to perpetrate crimes they never thought they could possibly commit. Finally this craving for carnal satisfaction blocks the avenue of prayer, for a pleasure-dominated person cannot pray unselfishly.

Believe God and give Him first place in your life. Obey Him and seek to do His will. Let the Lord take care of the pleasure problem, and He will give you joy and happiness that far exceeds anything this passing world has to offer.

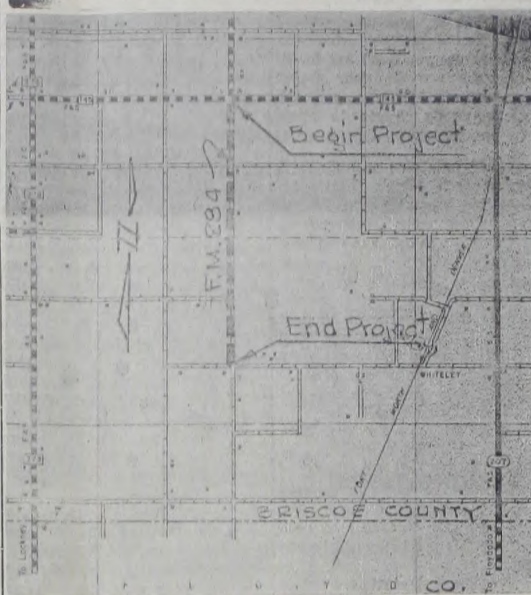

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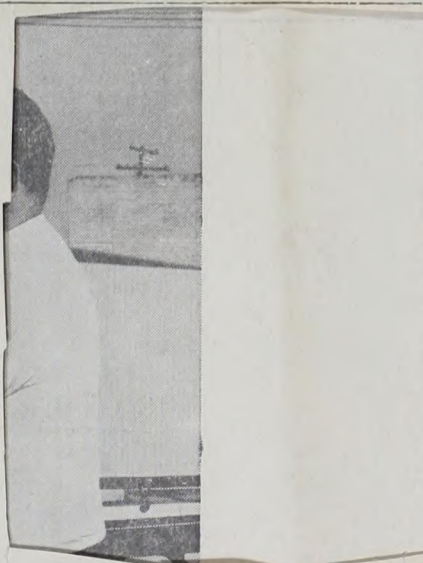
