

#### Turkey Residents Warned Of Nitrate In Water-Advised To Protect Infants

The Texas Natural Resource Commission has tested Turkey water samples, and found that Nitrate/Nitrite is 13.40 mg. This is a high enough level to cause concern among parents of very young

The Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission (TNRCC) sets drinking water standards and has determined that nitrate poses an acute health concern at certain levels of exposure. Nitrate is used in fertilizer and is found in sewage and wastes from human and/or farm animals and generally get into drinking water from those activities. Excessive levels of nitrate in drinking water have caused serious illness and sometimes death in infants under six months of age. The serious illness in infants is caused because nitrate is converted to Nitrite in the body. Nitrite interferes with the oxygen carrying capacity of the child's blood. This is an acute disease in that symptoms can develop rapidly in infants. In most cases, health deteriorates over a period

Symptons include shortness breath and blueness of the skin. Clearly expert medical advice should be sought immediately if these symptoms occur.

Letters have been sent out to notify Turkey residents of the results of the nitrate test, to encourage parents and other responsible parties to provide infants with an alternate source of drinking water. Local and State health authorities are the best source for information concerning alternate sources of drinking water for infants.

TNRCC has set the drinking water standard at 10 parts per million (ppm) for nitrate to protect against the risk of these adverse effects. It has also set a drinking water standard for nitrite at 1 ppm. To allow for the fact that the toxicity of nitrate and nitrite are additive, TNRCC has also established a standard for the sum of nitrate and nitrite at 10 ppm. Drinking water that meets the TNRCC standard is associated with little to none of this risk and is considered safe with respect to nitrate.

It has been reported on the news in the last few days that an out-break of whooping cough has been documented in New Mexico and one confirmed case has been reported in Amarillo. Whooping cough or "per-tussis" is a highly contagious disse with the risk of disease being highest in children under 5 yrs of age and with 30% of cases in the United States occurring in infants less than 6 months of age. Mortality is greatest in infants under 1 yr of age. Transmission is by droplets released during intense coughing and the disease incubation period ranges from 6 to 14 days, the average being 6 days. The symptomatic illness lasts approximately 6 to 8

Prevention is possible and read-ily available through immunizations with the scheduled injections beginning at age 2 months, again at 4 mos., 6 mos 12 mos., and between the ages of 4-6 years of age.

This is a serious and possibly fatal disease which can be prevented. If you are unsure whether your child has been adequately immunical these serious and the serious serious and the serious munized, please contact your local




A visit to tiny Turkey, Texas is lots of fun at this time of year.


