



Aviation Security

These are the times that try men's souls. The summer soldier and the sunshine patriot will, in this crisis, shrink from the service of their country; but he that stands it now, deserves the love and thanks of man and woman. Tyranny, like hell, is not easily conquered; yet we have this consolation with us, that the harder the conflict, the more glorious the triumph. What we obtain too cheap, we esteem too lightly: it is dearness only that gives every thing its value. Heaven knows how to put a proper price upon its goods; and it would be strange indeed if so celestial an article as freedom should not be highly rated."

That was written by the American revolutionary Thomas Paine in his pamphlet "The Crisis" to inspire the Continental Army as it fought for freedom and independence. It is as true today as it was 225 years ago. As we naneuver our way through this unimaginable time that tries our souls,

Our world is a different world now. Ever since September 11^{th} , everything has changed. Yet some things will remain the same: Americans, and our leadership, are still strong. With heavy hearts for those who lost their lives, we will go on. We will keep our nation strong, our economy strong, and our spirits

We began work immediately after the horror: when the President spoke out forcefully about our will and resolve; the FBI and CIA immediately began tracking suspects; the State Department reached out to other nations to build a coalition to stop terrorism; and, here at home, the Defense Department called up reservists to help patrol our airports and our air space. In addition, the FAA banned all knives on airplanes and increased security in airports across the

This issue of aviation security is of particular interest to me, and one on which I have long been working as the ranking member on the Aviation subcommittee and a former vice chairman of the National Transportation

One of our key priorities is to restore the public's confidence in air travel as quickly as possible. Therefore, in the days immediately following this tragedy, I introduced legislation to expand the air marshal program, wherein trained, armed security officers would be assigned to passenger flights to help ensure our safety. This program would free our pilots to concentrate solely on their Job – flying. I have already seen peace officers on some flights – detailed from other law enforcement agencies – but we need to make this a permanent

I believe that federalizing all aviation security functions is an important step in that direction. Currently, security is the responsibility of the airlines—who have different concerns and priorities besides national security. Our transportation security must be a priority, with the focus, coordination and influence that having a dedicated federal office would give.

That is why I am introducing legislation that would completely revamp aviation security, and place begans security expenses and federal air

aviation security, and place baggage security screeners and federal air marshals under one umbrella. We will institute a higher performance standard for our security practices and personnel, including extensive background checks, as weil as more rigorous training that would result in a stronger, more consistent security system in our nation's airports

Currently, airport security is a mishmash of private security firms employing low-paid workers with a staggeringly high turnover rate. To attract competent, dedicated people who can ensure our safety. I firmly believe that airport security needs to be a career, not just a temporary minimum-wage job.

We will fortify the cockpit in the aircraft. We are also upgrading the



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

Focus of Legislative Efforts Shifts To Senate

With passage of the Farm Security Act of 2001 the efforts of Piains Cotton Growers, and many other organizations, are shifting to a new somewhat unknown battlefield-the United States Senate.

How a hurting U.S. agricultural sector will fare in this atmosphere is unknown. Early indications have been less than encouraging. Both Senate Agriculture Committee Chairman Tom Harkin (D-IA) and Ranking Minority member Richard Lugar (R-IN) have indicated their preference

for support programs delivered through conservation programs.

One potential scenario that could come into play involves the tremendous diversity of opinion that exists in the Senate regarding farm programs. That could bode well for the House Bill. The House's Farm Security Act contains a good balance between traditional farm programs putting additional emphasis on conservation, food and nutrition and trade

programs administered through USDA.

In addition to the Senate's stance regarding new Farm Program legislation the Bush Administration is also gearing up to become development process in the Senate.

Secretary of Agriculture Ann Veneman, in comments made earlier in the week, has indicated the Administration will work with the Senate to

craft a Bill more to their liking.

Both the Senate and the Administration have noted their resistance to direct support of family farmers. Instead they have embraced the notion of pumping more money, well over the 80 percent included in the Farm

curity Act, into conservation programs. The theory is that this will both revitalize rural communities and keep farmers in strong enough financial position to offset historically low commodity prices. The reality is that without a reliable, predictable safety net to protect against price downturns U.S. agriculture is on the brink of

The position taken by the Administration and the Senate Democrats underscore the very real disconnect that exists between the people that

grow food and fiber and the people that consume it.

Because they seem to be paying little or no attention to the serious

nature of the current situation, the effort to inform the staff members from the Senate Agriculture Committee and USDA will be formidable.

By studying the issues for over two years and evaluating what policies have proven effective and which have not, the House Agriculture Committee committed itself to developing a balanced and fair program that would protect America's agriculture interests and critical infrastructure.

The goal of PCG, the National Cotton Council and others is to get the Administration and the Senate to listen to the feedback gathered by the

Farmers of all sizes are more than willing to invest in conservation programs and practices that protect, the air, water and land. The only problem is that unless they have the ability to maintain a positive financial situation, the realities of survival will mean putting conservation and other issues on the back burner, no matter what programs are offered.

TASS Survey To Provide Applicator CEU's

The Texas Agricultural Statistics Service (TASS) has initiated its annual Cotton Objective Yield Survey and accompanying chemical use questionnaire. This year's survey includes an additional benefit for participa-

Growers who receive the survey packet and return it will qualify for one CEU in Laws and Regulations from the Texas Department of Agriculture to apply toward their private pesticide applicator's license. T ASS and TDA teamed to offer the additional CEU to encourage wider participation among growers.

The survey is used to help track pesticide use trends. The survey's results are also a key component in the policy development process.

I was confused so I asked Tammy Salinas, Post Master, what in the world it was. Turns out it is a Parcel Locker.

If you recieve a package that is too large to fit in your box usually you have to wait until the Post Master is there to pick it up, well not anymore. If your package is too big for your box and will fit inside the new Parcel Locker you are in luck. A key with a number on it will be placed inside your P.O. box. You can then use the key in the appropriately numbered locker, bottom lock, and retrieve your package. Any time of the day or night, even weekends

The key will remain in the box lock, the Post Master will remove it after you have picked up your package. NOTE: The Key cannot be removed after the Parcel locker is opened, this may cause it to break

This is an added service your local Post Office provides to make getting your mail just a little easier
