 Cautioned About Mail ScamThe U. S. Postal Inspection Service is warning consumers that says the IRS is holding a refund check in your name. To claim the money, the tice says all you have to do is send ten dollars to an address in Florida. Those who send in ten dollars don't get a refund. Instead, they get a claim formsomething the IR
for free. for free.
Millions of notices have been sent to addresses throughout the U.S., and Postal Inspectors have
seized almost $\$ 1$ million from accounts belonging to the scam operators. There have been numerous complaints and inhoma areas.
"The postcards are desgned national spokesman for the U. S. Postal Inspection Service. "The bureaucratic mumbojumbo maksit appear as though disbursement has been ap. proved.
"But customers who send in their ten dollars don't get a re-
fund. Instead, they get a claim form--something the Internal Revenue Service gives away for free."
Linda Weiskopf, Assistant Di-
rector of the rector of the Taxpayer Service
Division for the Internal Reve nue Service, says there is neve a charge to claim a refund
"If a taxpayer is due a refund 800 her she has to do is call our 800 number and we'll send them a claim form free of charge." 800 number for a fully staffed questions about their income tax returns, including questions about tax refunds.
Meanwhile, Postal Inspectors offer tips to keep you from getting stung by scam artists who make bogus offers through the "Any offer that requires you
o pay a certain amount up front should be looked at dubiously," says John Brugger, a Postal Inspector in Washington, DC. Be willing to check them out. Make a few phone calls and ver--
ify the truthfulness of the offer." But one phone number you should not call is the 900 number printed on the postcard. Scams that employ this method usually charge high fees to victims who respond by calling. Finally, Postal Inspectors get a postcard promising a big ax refund for a small fee: throw
