Patriots Blitz Elks

Fidel Valdes carried the ball four times for 134 yards and 2 touch-Fidel Valdes carried the ball four times for 134 yards and 2 touch-downs, including a 77 yard run, recorded eight tackles, recovered a fumble, and returned an interception for a touchdown to help lead the Valley Patriots to a 54-6 win over the Cotton Center Elks. "Fidel was unbelievable," Coach Bret Tyler said. "But he will be the first to tell you that he had great blocking and that other people did their job on defense to allow him to do his. It's a team sport and Bidd is a team planer."

Fidel is a team player." The Valley team racked up 222 rushing yards and 78 passing yards

in the first half while only allowing 63 yards by the Elks. Charlie Walden led the defensive charge with 13 tackles but received a lot of help from Albert Espinoza who had 11 tackles. Bryant Ortiz, Alex Espinoza, and Zack Ramsey each tallied seven tackles, while Cody

Barrett had five tackles and an interception. "We played well defensively again," Tyler said. "The boys have been really quick to the ball. When you swarm a ballcarrier it makes life tough on an offense.

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

Disaster Calculator Available On PCG Website Passage of the 2003/2004 Agricultural Disaster Program has many producers, landlords and ag lenders looking for a tool to help them calculate their Crop Disaster Program payments. Last week, Plains Cotton Growers dusted off its Single Farm Disas-ter Payment calculator, and with the assistance of Jay Yates, Exten-

ter Payment calculator, and with the assistance of Jay Yates, Exten-sion Specialist-Risk Management, updated it to estimate 2003 or 2004 disaster benefits. Yates has also updated his comprehensive Multiple Farm Disaster Payment Calculator that allows producers to input information on multiple farms and estimate how much assistance may be available for this entire operation. The calculators have been developed specifically for use by cotton producers who downloaded the Single Farm Calculator last week should go back and get the latest version posted October 27 which cor-rects an error in the formula that selects the higher of the producer's APH vield or the County Average.

APH yield or the County Average. At this time there is essentially no concrete information about how the 2003/2004 Agricultural Disaster Program will function. The legthe 2003/2004 Agricultural Disaster Program will function. The leg-islation authorizing it refers to components used in both the 2000 and the 2001/2002 Crop Disaster Programs. Boiled down to simple language the new law instructs the Farm Service Agency to conduct the program in basically the same manner as the 2001/2002 CDP except using a higher payment rate structure from the 2000 CDP. Producers are advised to use the calculators as ESTIMATION TOOLS ONLY and check the PCG website regularly for updated ver-sions. Updates will be posted once a better knowledge of the rules is available. (www.plainscotton.org) **29th CRP Sign-Up Enrolls 1.18 Million**

29th CRP Sign-Up Enrolls 1.18 Million Acres; Posts 76 % Acceptance Rate

Even though Texas lagged behind the 76 percent national accep-tance rate of the 29th Conservation Reserve Program sign-up, the State's results were nonetheless gratifying as producers crafted a rea-sonably high number of bids that met the minimum enrollment score. Nationwide 1.18 million acres were accepted into the program from

approximately 1.6 million acres offered. Texas figures indicate that some 112,687 acres were accepted from 198,250 acres that were offered. That calculates to a 56 percent acceptance rate

Sammy Orange, Texas Farm Service Agency Conservation Division Chief, notes that the primary reason the acceptance rate was so high was the willingness of landowners to invest in higher scoring cover enhancements and wildlife watering facilities.

According to FSA's announcement, the minimum Environmental Benefits Index (EBI) socre necessary to gain acceptance during the 29th Sign-up was 248 points. Nationwide the average EBI score on acreage offered was 287 points. FSA officials are also reminding producers that there is still an op-

rtunity to submit new CRP bids for acreage through Bobwhite Quail Initiative

Known as the CP 33-Habitat Buffers for Upland Birds program, the Bobwhite Quail Initiative is designed primarily to increase habitat for Bobwhite Quail Initiative is designed primarily to increase habitat for bobwhite Quail and other upland game birds.

Up to 20,000 acres in Texas will be able to be enrolled through this initiative. A continuous sign-up period for this program began Octo-

ber 1, 2004 and will remain open until the acreage cap is reached. In addition to the bobwhite Quail program, FSA is also accepting bids for the CP 23A Wetland Restoration program for non-flood plain areas such as Playa Lakes. This program is also conducting a continu-ous sign-up process open until Texas' 25,000-acre allocation is reached.

Producers shall file appli-cations for benefits in the county where the sheep and lamb operation is physically located To be eligible for a ewe lamb payment, the sheep and lamb operation must: * Have purchased or retained ewe lambs for breeding purposes been August 1, 2003 and July 31, 2005 Have retained the qualifying ewe lambs in the herd for at least 1 mplete lambing cycle * Be engaged in the business of producing and marketing agricultural products at the time of filing the application * Not have received funds under the Lamb Meat Adjustment Assistance Program (LMAAP) for the same ewe lamb. * Certify the ewe lamb met all the qualifying characteristics at the * Certify the ewe lamb met all the qualifying characteristics at the same time during at least part of the base period * Apply for payment during the application period Eligible applicants must use FSA-384 to apply for benefits. This form is available at http://forms.sc.egov.usda.gov/eforms/mainservlet, or can be obtained at your local FSA office. Payments are not available at this time until a decision is made as to whether available funds will need to be prorated by a national factor to reduce the expected payments to be made by the amount available.

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





Landowners Need License To Conduct Hunts

AUSTIN, Texas — The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department would like to remind landowners that a hunting lease license is required for certain hunting operations. The owner of a hunting lease or the landowner's agent may not receive pay or anything of value from hunters unless the owner or agent has acquired a hunting lease license from the department. This law applies to all hunting leases:

There are three types of lease licenses: (1) hunting lease license; (2) hunting cooperative; and (3) wildlife management association. The license is required to be displayed on the hunting lease property.
