## Mountain Lion Sighted At New State Park

It was Thursday, November 3, at 5:35 p.m. The Rayford Hewetts were taking relatives on a drive through Caprock Canyons State Park. At the South Prong Campground, all five of the car's occupants got out to stretch and absorb the atmosphere. Shortly, a peculiar cry (like a human cry for help) stopped all conversation, and we drew closer together.

One of the group shouted out, "Say it again!" Silence. Then a commotion coming from the canyon, another cry, and the "sighting of a lifetime!" for three of us. Clearly in sight, 50 yards away, a mountain lion appeared above a gully giving a full profile, even turning his head in our direction, then he was gone. For a second or two, we neither moved nor spoke.

The next thing to happen was the sudden flight to our right of a frightened and escaping young deer, passing in a flurry not 25 feet away.

Those making the sightseeing trip of a lifetime that Thursday were Rayford and Norma Hewett, his aunt, Ione Hewett from Carrollton, and cousins, Bill and Val Hewett from Lubbock. Bill, Ione and Norma saw the cat, and Rayford and Val heard the cries and saw the fleeing deer.

Driving past Eagle Point on the way out of the park, we sighted the young deer again, his mouth open in labored breathing, as he moved in an easterly direction, probably to rejoin his "family."

## Deer Season Opens In Caprock Country November 19

The Texas Parks and Wildlife mentioned Quitaque and the Caprock Country twice in the last monthly report.

The quail season opened at Caprock Canyons State Park Saturday, November 5, according to the park ranger.

The deer season opens Saturday, November 19. They report the deer habitat in the Panhandle region is limited mainly to the Canadian River Bottoms and to the Caprock Country below the Llano Estacado. Biologist David Dvorak of Canyon said white-tailed deer populations and body condition both appear good in areas where the habitat supports deer. He said the area normally does not contribute to large portions of the statewide harvest, but the deer are larger average size than most other

regions. Dvorak noted that mule deer, which occupy an even more restricted habitat area in the Panhandle, may be on a slight population upswing after a good fawn crop in 1983. They also are expected to be in good body condition this year, he said.

The Texas Parks and Wildlife officials said there will be NO public hunt for aoudad (Barbary) sheep at Caprock Canyons State Park this year because of low aoudad populations.

The public hunts were held during the past three years in an effort to reduce pressure on native mule deer populations caused by the exotic aoudads.

Very few sightings of the aoudad sheep were reported by the park staff this year, officials said. The thirty-nine hunters participating in the January 1983

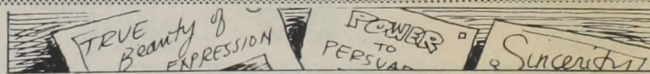
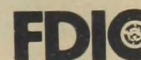
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## SUPERINTENDENT'S NEWS CORNER

The remainder of this school year and perhaps for many years to come we are going to hear more and more about House Bill 246. This is a piece of legislation passed by the 67th Legislature to review the Texas public school curriculum. It called for developing a basic curriculum to be offered by every school district in the state. The intent of the law is to improve student achievement by upgrading the curriculum. The effects will be far-reaching.

In addition to the curriculum work being done, the Governor has appointed a select committee to study education in Texas. This committee is chaired by well-known businessman, H. Ross Perot. The Perot Committee is finding revealing facts about

what education is all about in the state.

Because of changes to be made, look for:

\*A 3-year math requirement for graduation

\*A 4-year English requirement for graduation

\*Some type of requirement for studies in foreign language and computer studies before graduation

\*Increasing the number of credits for graduation from 18 to 20

\*Passing of four subjects rather than three to compete in athletics

\*Restrictions on athletics, particularly for the seventh grade and below.

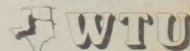

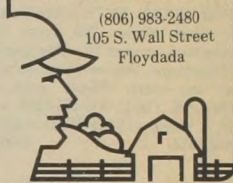
