

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

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

The question of "no pass, no play" for extracurricular or other activities is still a newsworthy item and is a concern with which schools must continue to confront. The state board just recently adopted a set of rules which may affect a student's participation in activities for the remainder of his school career remainder of his school career beginning with the sixth grade.

The adopted rule considers and identifies the number of credits a student must have earned at the beginning of each school year. Plus, the rule clearly states that the student must be passing all courses during the academic year. Seventh grade students, for instance, must have been promoted—not placed— from the sixth grade to the seventh. And, according to a Texas Education Agency inter-pretation, in order to be promot-ed the student must have passed ed the student must have passed all basic subjects in the sixth grade. That means that a student will be ineligible for junior high activities for the full first six weeks period if he fails to pass the required subjects taken during the sixth grade year. If the student is passing all courses at the end of the first six weeks period in the seventh grade, he period in the seventh grade, he then becomes eligible to partici-

The equivalent requirement is the same for eighth and ninth

graders.
Tenth grade students must have earned at least five credits toward graduation to establish eligibility while eleventh graders will need at least nine credits. At the start of the twelfth grade year, the student must have earned 13 credits. Any suspension will be removed at the end of a six weeks period if the student is passing each course taken.

The "no pass, no play" rule is affecting Valley School similarly to other area schools. Though we have some concerns at the junior high level, most high school students at Valley are working hard to remain eligible for their chosen activity. This is a new requirement and there are some adjustment problems which students and faculty must face. Hopefully, those problems will Hopefully, those problems will begin to clear next year.

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
