Fiery Crash Results With No Injuries

Two area teenagers walked away from a fiery automobile accident in the early morning hours Sunday, March 4, 1990. The crash occurred about 2 a.m. just inside the east city limits of the city of Turkey on Highway 86. The 1981 Chevrolet driven by 17 year old Edward Cheavez veered out of control, snapping a utility pole at ground level, traveled through the former Gulf station service area, colliding with the southeast side of the now storage building, then exploding into flames. Debris from the automobile and bricks from the building were thrown several yards in every direction from the force of impact and or explosion.

Cheavez and passenger, Vardo Ceddilla, 19, left the scene of the accident on foot, but were returned within minutes by Hall County Deputy Sheriff Tim Wiginton. The 17 year old youth was located six blocks from the wreckage, and Ceddilla was located at the home of a relative in Turkey.

Both youths listed a Plainview address as their residence. Both escaped the accident with only minor cuts and scratches, and were transported to Memphis by Deputy Wiginton and Department of Public Safety officer Robert Bird, who also investigated the accident. Both remained incarcerated on Tuesday.

Cheavez was charged with failure to produce a drivers license, failure to maintain financial responsibility, DWI (driving while intoxicated), and failure to wear a seatbelt,

which resulted in fines over \$2000 and 2 year probation.

Ceddilla was charge with PI (public intoxication) and failure to wear a seat belt, which resulted in fines of over \$200, as they appeared before Hall County Judge Chappell Monday and Local Justice of the Peace B. J. Robison.

The converted storage building, formerly Young's Gulf Station, is now owned by James Fuston and was used to store Turkey sweet potatoes.

Austin--The Texas Supreme Court today ruled that House Bill 2566, the teacher career ladder bill passed by the 71st Legislature, is unconstitutional.

Supreme Court Rules On Career Ladder

In its ruling, the Supreme Court reversed an earlier judgment by Travis County District Judge Scott McCown. The lawsuit, filed last July by the Association of Texas Professional Educators, challenged the procedural adoption of HB 2566. ATPE maintained in its lawsuit that the version of HB 2566 approved by the Legislature was not the same as the statute signed by the Governor.

In a decision issued September 11, Judge McCown ruled that the "enrolled bill rule" applied to HB 2566 and that he was prevented from looking past the bill as signed by the Governor, Lt. Governor and the Speaker of the House. McCown further stated that "making exceptions to the rule or abolishing the rule should be done...by the court of appeals or the (Texas) supreme court."

With the Supreme Court's ruling, teacher career ladder decisions will be based on the previous statute, House Bill 72. "We are really excited that the court has seen fit to right a wrong," said ATPE State President Carolyn Little. "Now that the confusion with HB 2566 has been cleared up, Texas teachers can go about the business of teaching school children." "We are very pleased with the Supreme Court ruling," added ATPE Executive Director Doug Rogers. ATPE, the largest independent, nonunion educators' association in the state and nation, has a statewide membership of 50,400, which consists mostly of classroom teachers but also includes administrators, paraprofessionals, retired educators, education students and public members.

Severe Weather Tips

Although tornadoes, severe thunderstorms and floods can strike virtually any part of Texas at any time, spring seems to bring an increase in violent weather.

You can take precautions to assist yourself and your family in the event of a tornado.

Periodically hold a tornado drill so the family members know what to do and where to go if the National Weather Service issues a tornado warning. The safest part of a house during a tornado traditionally is the basement, but be aware of the potential for flooding if there is heavy rain in the area. Interior bathrooms, hallways and closets on the ground floor also offer protection from tornado winds. Avoid windows and outside walls. Take along blankets or sleeping bags to protect yourself from falling debris and shattering glass, which are frequently the cause of death and injury

during a tornado.

Make certain you have a portable radio and several flashlights (fresh batteries for both) as well as bottled water, extra prescription medications and a first aid kit in your shelter area.

Remember, if a tornado strikes, electricity, gas, water and sewer service may be disrupted for several days.

Mobile homes and automobiles are dangerous places to be during a tornado. If you live in a mobile home, make sure all family members know where the nearest substantial shelter is. If you are in your mobile home or car and can't get to a better shelter go outside, lie down in the nearest ravine, ditch or culvert and cover your head with your hands. Be aware of the possibility of flooding in low-lying areas. Do not hide under your mobile home or car because both can easily be picked up and carried away by a tornado.

School Funding Facing Court

A second round of hearings begins this week in the Texas Senate on plans aimed at equalizing funding of the state's public schools.

Texas lawmakers, facing a May 1 State Supreme Court deadline to reform the funding system for schools, went into special session Tuesday, February 27. The Legislature will also begin consideration this week of plans to revamp the way the state selects its district judges.

A federal district court has ruled that the state's practice of electing judges on an at-large, countywide vote is a violation of the Voting Rights Act.

Last week, the Senate subcommittee on Public School Finance began hearing various proposals to balance state funding between poorer and wealthier school districts.

Some of the plans call for no additional monies, while others require the expenditure of billions of dollars over the next five years.

Before recessing late last week, the subcommittee, a group composed of members of the Senate's Education and Finance Committees, heard three of these proposals and is expected to hear the remaining bills this week.

Thus far, plans have been proposed by State Comptroller Bob Bullock, the Texas Research League, the Equity Center, the State Board of Education, and a special task force on school finance.

One provision common to all the plans is the guarantee yield concept adopted by the Legislature last year during the regular legislative session. By that agreement, school

districts are guaranteed a certain amount of state aid for every cent of local taxation for schools.

The Senate began its second week of business on March 5.

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A Texan's Travels

DALLAS—Two out of three notations in the visitors book at the Sixth Floor exhibit in Dallas begin with "I wasn't born when this happened" or "My parents told me about it." A new generation is learning about Nov. 22, 1963 in the excellent museum on the infamous sixth floor of the Texas School Book Depository.

I'll admit that my first reaction was negative when I heard the Dallas County Historical Society and the commissioners' court had approved the exhibit. It sounded crass and commercial. I was wrong.

The museum is well done, right down to Walter Cronkite's video address at the exit. The displays contain a wealth of tapes, pictures and memorabilia from the Kennedy assassination that brought Lyndon B. Johnson into the White House—plus the chilling sight of the window from where Lee Harvey Oswald is said (and how can there be a question about this?) to have fired the fatal shots.

The museum is open daily except national holidays 9:30 a.m. until 6 p.m. Monday through Thursday, and until 7 p.m. on weekends. Last tickets are sold an hour before closing. Admission is \$4 for adults, \$3 for seniors and \$2 for children 6-12. An audio tour is available for an extra \$2.

Parking at the Elm St. entrance is within easy walking distance of the revitalized West End shopping and entertainment district.

DIRECT AND NONSTOP: A direct flight is not nonstop. Direct flights get you to your destination without changing planes, but there will be one or more stops along the way. An example is the 11 a.m. direct Southwest flight from Austin to Chicago. It stops in Houston and Nashville on the way. A Southwest direct flight from Chicago to Austin on a recent Saturday morning had stops in Kansas City, Oklahoma City and Houston on the way.

Be aware that every intermittent stop can cause unexpected delays, so have your travel agent book nonstops whenever possible unless price is a major consideration and he finds the airline with stops en route can save you dollars enough to make the extra time worthwhile.

NOTICE OF TARIFF CHANGE TO CENTRANET® SERVICE

GTE Southwest Incorporated gives notice of its proposed tariff changes to CentraNet® service, which is a Central Office-based service that provides PBX-type features to multi-line business customers and is currently being offered in all company wire centers where such facilities exist to provide the service.

The Public Utility Commission of Texas approved a generic tariff for CentraNet® service up to 100 lines in Docket No. 7652. The proposed tariff revision would establish specific rates for CentraNet® service involving 101 to 400 lines. Other proposed revisions involve the rate applicable to changes, additions, or deletions to the data bases and a new rate is proposed for additional trunks.

The names of the three CentraNet® packages have changed from Standard, Premium, and Deluxe to CentraNet® 1000, CentraNet® 2000, and CentraNet® 3000, respectively. Direct Call Pickup has been added to the three CentraNet® packages while Multiple Call Park and Shared Speed Call 30 have been added to CentraNet® 2000, and Speed Call 30 and Call Forward Busy/No Answer Split have been added to CentraNet® 3000. Flexible Night Answer and Automatic Route Selection also have been added as new optional features.

The proposed changes and new service offerings have been assigned Docket No. 9251, and pursuant to Section 43(d) of the Public Utility Regulatory Act will become effective June 23, 1990. Rates for service will be applicable to customers who subscribe to the service as well as existing customers. Therefore, there will be no effect on any other rates of the company. The company's gross annual revenues will increase by approximately \$399,600, or less than one percent annually.

The proposed rates are on file with the Public Utility Commission of Texas, and are available for public inspection at the offices of GTE Southwest Incorporated.
