## "Inventive" 4-H'ers Enjoy A-H Electric



SPECIAL - Scientists like Edison and Marconi designed, built, tested and experimented with their inventions, before they became everyday realities. Young people enrolled in the national 4-H electric program have taken a cue from those two famous men and created their own inventions - computers, radio transmitters, teaching machines and other electrical devices.

Over 130,000 4-H members are hard at work in the 4-H electric program, sponsored by the Westinghouse Electric Company, creating their own electrical hardware, more sophisticated perhaps than the early works of the Edison, Marconi and others.

And they are constantly seeking new and improved ways of using electric power. David Krivoshtik, of Elizabeth, N.J., was one of

the national winners in the 4-H electric program, last year. David, who won a \$700 scholarship, designed and built his own logic computer. Randy Roush, of Jeffersonville, Ohio, another 1971 national winner and scholarship recipient, designed and built an antenna switching and tuning network and a high powered transmitter. Young Roush estimates that his antenna system which cost him \$200 to build, is equal in quality to a comparable system costing \$1,000.

A third national winner, Gary Johnson, of Wheatland, Wyo., built a teaching device which shows others how to wire switches, outlets, and lights.

Besides the \$700 scholarships for national winners in the 4-H electric program, Westinghouse also provides incentives and recognition for

winners at the state and county level. County winners receive gold plated medals of honor, and a winner from each state receives an all-expense paid trip to the National 4-H Congress in Chicago, Nov. 26-30.

Groups are also eligible for recognition. In the 4-H electric program, an embossed plaque is offered to one county in each state reporting the most outstanding county 4-H electric program activities.

Westinghouse provides handbooks and other materials to aid learning and also sponsors an annual workshop for leaders and power suppliers working with the 4-H electric program.

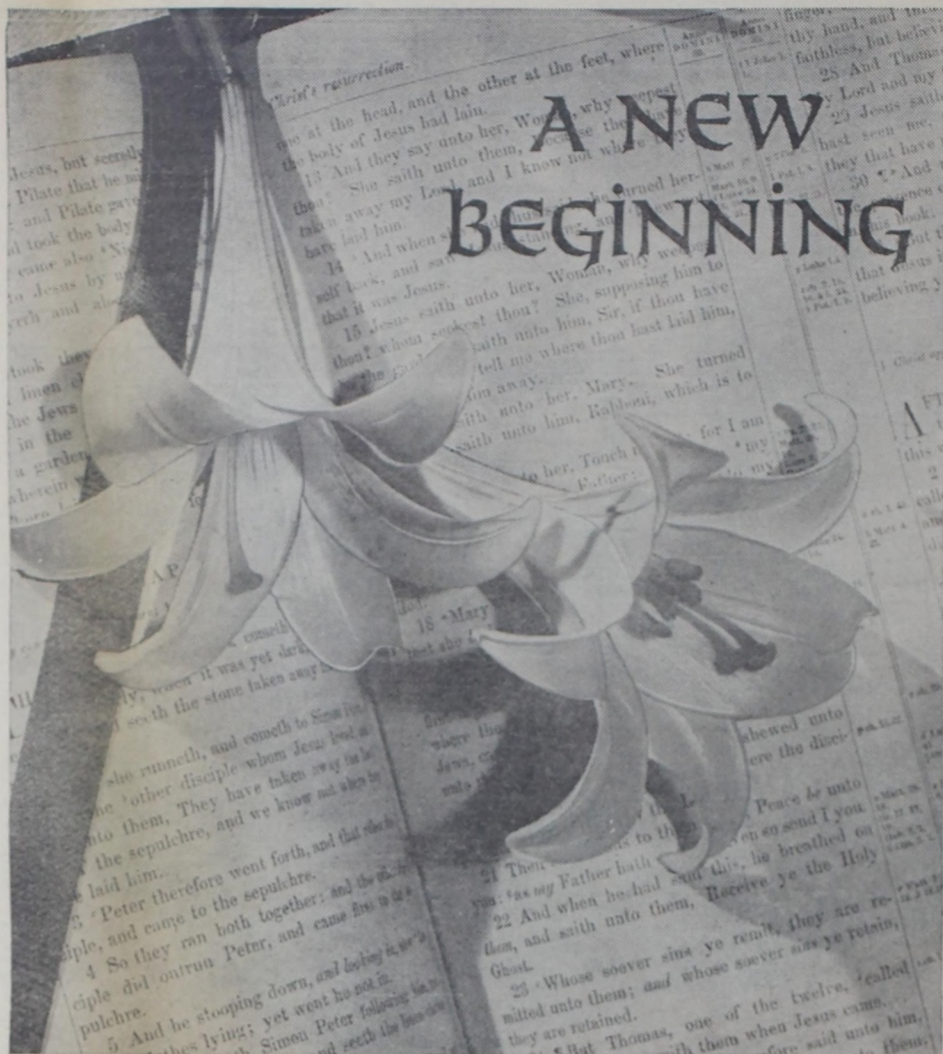

Our daughter came in from the florist the other afternoon and laid a spray of lilies across the pages of the family Bible. I couldn't believe my eyes—for it was harvest time, not Easter.

I put them in a vase on the dining room table, and at dinner that night we exclaimed over their sweet fragrance. But, to me, it was vaguely disturbing—Easter lilies in New England in November—the leaves drifting to the ground in the yard outside, and a symbol of the Resurrection blooming, all at the same time.

And why not? What is the Resurrection but rebirth . . . a new beginning? Even in the fall of the year, even in the autumn of our lives, is it ever too late to begin again? Even if one has not been going to church, is it too late to start again? These were the questions I asked myself. I found the answers when I went back to church last Sunday.

Dear Ones in Christ,  
You will never know how thrilled we were to find your letters awaiting us when we got here Tuesday afternoon. It was so thoughtful of you, Sister Willie and Belle—yours are the only letters we have received so far, so they have meant a great deal to us. We appreciate the love and kind

words and the news from the folks there that you sent us.  
The trip over was quite tiring. When we reached Chicago Friday, Oct. 6, we thought we were to start boarding the plane at 7:00 o'clock, two hours after we arrived but had to wait for over two more hours. We boarded around 9:15 p.m. and had such steep stairs

to climb—they were working over the airport there and had no walk-in ramp and this plane was the 747—the largest passenger plane of all—it would cover a football field—and with the baggage we were carrying on board I thought I would never make it to the top of the stairs. We reached London around 11 the next morning and it was about 1:30 before we got through customs and got to a hotel room. It was on the fifth floor and no elevator. When we got to our room we both collapsed on the bed and slept for several hours. After we woke up, we walked up town (we were in downtown London) and it seemed like we were in another world. Everyone drives on the wrong side of the road and people cross the street at anytime they can get across—dodging cars and buses. We found the people very friendly and helpful—when we started back to our hotel room we didn't know where we were, so we asked for directions back and the people were so helpful. One man called Jack "Your Lordship." We made it back to our room and didn't have any trouble sleeping that night. We tried to find a church the next morning to worship with and took a subway clear across town but hunted for several hours and walked and walked to no avail. We decided to have services in our room after we got back. We visited Westminster Abbey and several other places of interest there. London is such a big busy place—I was ready to leave for our destination the next day. We boarded our plane Monday evening and it was really crowded, people of all nationalities aboard. Our plane flew over Belgium, Germany, Austria, Yugoslavia and landed on Cyprus at Nicosia for refueling. This is the island that the Apostle Paul visited on his missionary journey, the cities of Paphos and Salamis, I believe. The next stop was at Entebb in Africa. I had the camera and stepped out the door of the airplane after everyone had disembarked to take a picture of the airport. A white man rushed up to the plane and shouted at me not to take any pictures. He said they would confiscate my camera if I did. I thanked him and went back inside the plane. We found out that this was Uganda where they have been having all the trouble and they didn't allow any pictures. We were glad to leave this place. We next land-

ed in Nairobi, Kenya and touched down there for about half an hour. I didn't even step out of the plane here. Our trip was about 1½ hours late and we finally reached Blantyre about 12:30. The Shelburnes were at the airport to meet us. We had to go through customs again and the natives over here were very nice to us. We had no difficulty getting into the country. We came on out to the mission after we had a bite to eat in Blantyre. This is such a beautiful and quiet place, there are so many pretty trees and flowers. This is the dry season and things have to be watered but the rainy season is only a month away. The people here were so glad to see us and they are a very gentle people. The men are all small in stature. The women carry their babies wrapped on their backs. The babies are so good and sweet. Yesterday was the day they came to sew at the mission. They were quilting a quilt and also mending some clothes. Some of the women were weaving baskets. Jack spoke to them with the help of B. Shelburne interpreting. (We have learned only a few words—we have so much to learn). Every morning they have a devotional here at the mission at 7:00 o'clock. We overslept yesterday morning, our first morning here. I guess we were more worn out than we realized. We feel fine this morning and were up at 5:00 o'clock. The sun comes up about that time and it starts getting dark about 6:00 o'clock. Ruth wants to take me into Zomba today to buy a few groceries so we can start keeping house. We have been eating our meals with them. They are such wonderful Christians. We know we will enjoy working with them.

one of the villages Sunday. Yesterday we took a walk about the mission. It is 90 acres. We visited the place where they are making bricks also the site where they are building a clinic. We walked for about two hours and stopped to speak to the workers. They all shake hands. We were shown a tree that a witch-doctor was digging up to make medicine out of. We saw where several of the men live that work on the mission. One of the men who is a foreman had pigeons, chickens and goats. They have to pen their goats up at night to keep hyenas from getting them. We will try to answer all of your letters. Give all our love there—we miss you all so much. Lovingly,

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**CHRISTIAN MEETS WITH INTERIM HOUSE COMMITTEE**

State Rep. Tom Christian met in Austin recently as a member of the Interim House Committee to Study the State and Federal Laws concerning the Inspection of Meat.

General consensus of the testimony brought before the committee was that the State and Federal Governments work together in setting the standards for the inspection of meat.

Directors of the Texas schools for meat inspectors expressed two areas in which improvements needed to be made: (1) Broader and longer training period for meat inspectors and, (2) Obtain a consistency in the inspection program throughout the State.

At present, meat inspectors only have a two week initial training course and meat standards vary throughout the State.

The committee will have the authority to call upon the State Department of Health, the Texas Animal Health Commission, the Attorney General's Office, and any other State agency or department deemed necessary for the completion of its study and report to the 63rd Legislature which will convene January of next year.

**PATROL INVESTIGATES FIVE COUNTY ACCIDENTS**

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated five accidents on rural highways in Briscoe County during the month of August, according to Sergeant Rex Smith, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.
