SCS, ASCS Offices Offer Help For Local Farmers

Farmers in the Quitaque-Turkey area are invited to a meeting next Thursday, November 19 to discuss the conservation requirements of the current farm program.

According to the Food and Security Act of 1985, everyone farming Highly Erodible Land must have a conservation plan by 1990 to stay eligible for Farm Program payments, FmHA loans, and other government assistance by 1995. This will affect almost every farmer in the Quitaque-Turkey area because most of the farmland is considered as Highly Erodible Land.

Representatives from the Soil Conservation Service

and ASCS from Silverton and Memphis will discuss conservation plans and answer questions about program requirements.

John Crowell, District Conservationist with the Soil Conservation Service in Silverton said, "Our main objective is to help farmers stay eligible for farm program benefits. The best way to keep getting farm

program payments and loans is to get your conservation plan developed as soon as possible and start applying the conservation practices in that plan".

The meeting will start at 7:00 p.m. in the Hospitality Room of the First National Bank in Quitaque. For more information, contact the SCS office in Silverton (823-2320) or the Memphis office.

Quitaque City Council Has Regular Meeting

The Quitaque City Council members met at their regular monthly meeting Monday, Nov. 2.

Dick Taylor and Rural Skinner turned in a petition to council members to roll back the tax rate increase. The city will now need to have a public election to roll back the taxes which is at .43/hundred to 8% above effected tax rate.

Also on the agenda, Briscoe County Appraisal District Board of Directors are up for election. City councilman, Elgin Connors is a nominee for one of the five seats on the board. Quitaque is represented by 93 out of 5,000 votes in the Appraisal District.

Also discussed by councilmen were the new rates for leasing city equip-

ment such as the shredder and ditch digger. The fee is \$35.00 an hour with the equipment operated only by a city employee. The job will be done by the city as soon as equipment and personnel are available.

A public hearing is scheduled for Thursday, Nov. 12 at 7:30 p.m. at the Community Center in regards to the submission of an application to the Texas Department of Community Affairs (TDCA) for a Texas community Development Program Fund Grant. The purpose of this meeting is to allow citizens an opportunity to comment on the City's proposed application and review the project prior to submission of the application to TDCA by December 3, 1987

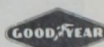

Quitauque Voters Reject Betting Amendment

Election Judge Elgin Connors stated that Quitauque had a heavy turnout with 176 voters, 38%, participating in the Nov. 3 election concerning Constitutional Amendments, particularly parimutuel betting. The results were as follows:

Amendment 1: To provide state funds to guarantee a self-insurance pool for grain storage facilities carried 112 - 45 in Quitauque, and was approved by more than 55 percent of statewide voters.

Amendment 2: To allow rural fire prevention districts in counties with more than 400,000 residents to raise property tax rates failed, 47-106 in Quitauque, and also appeared to be failing across the state. The vote was close.

Amendment 3: To allow a surviving middle-aged (or older) spouse of a deceased elderly person to keep homestead tax exemptions was approved 114-46. It passed easily statewide.

Amendment 4: To allow the legislature to make loans and grants to encourage economic development in Texas; the vote was close, but passed in Quitauque, 81-66.

Amendment 5: To allow the Dept. of Highways and Public Transportation and the Texas Turnpike Authority to jointly construct tollways, etc. was turned down, 47-94 in Quitauque... also statewide.

Amendment 6: To allow legislature to issue up to \$125 million in general obligation bonds for programs to develop and promote Texas products and business, failed by a narrow margin, 71-75, in Quitauque. It also failed statewide.

Amendment 7: To allow the legislature to issue up to \$400 million in general obligation bonds, creating a fund to help finance county and municipal construction projects, lost 48-94 in Quitauque.

Amendment 8: To allow the Legislature to issue up to \$500 million for construction and remodeling jail facilities passed 73-70, and also passed statewide.

Amendment 9: To allow a member of the legislature to hold another state office, providing they cannot benefit from pay increases approved by the legislature during their terms, was turned down by Quitauque 69-75.

Amendment 10: To exempt all non-residential, non-income-producing personal prop-

erty, such as boats, etc. from ad valorem taxes, was voted down 64-81, but balloting statewide appeared to pass.

Amendment 11: To exempt all goods, wares and merchandise, except for petroleum products - from ad valorem taxes under certain circumstances, failed to pass, 53-83.

Amendment 12: To allow property jointly owned in a marriage to automatically become the sole property of the surviving spouse passed 115 - 38 in Quitauque.

Amendment 13: To allow county commissioners courts to create taxing districts to provide emergency services, including medical, ambulance, and fire prevention. Quitauque passed this 74-70.

Amendment 14: To allow the legislature to pass laws giving the state a limited right to appeal criminal cases passed 85-56 in Quitauque.

Amendment 15: To abolish treasurer's offices in certain counties passed by 74-52.

Amendment 16: To allow counties with 150,000 residents or more to have more than one JP court in each precinct passed 88-57 in Quitauque.

Amendment 17: To allow the legislature to determine the functions of city governments failed by a vote of 59-79.

Amendment 18: To allow the legislature to create taxing districts for improvement and construction of local jails passed by a 74-64 vote.

Amendment 19: To allow the state to issue up to \$500 million in general obligation bonds concerning the multi-million superconducting supercollider near Dallas or Amarillo passed 119-37 in Quitauque.

Amendment 20: To exempt out of use offshore drilling equipment from ad valorem taxes failed by a vote of 55-87.

Amendment 21: To allow the legislature to appoint members to any agency or committee that includes officers of the executive branch failed by a vote of 52-81.

Amendment 22: Quitauque voters passed by a vote of 84-60, the amendment limiting the governor's power to appoint persons to state offices at the end of his last term.

Amendment 23: To allow the state to issue an additional \$400 million in Texas Water Development bonds passed 79-58.

Amendment 24: To allow a county to perform work for another government entity without compensation failed in Quitauque by a vote of 67-74.

Amendment 25: To allow the legislature to permit the Amarillo Hospital District to serve residents of northern Randall County passed 90-37, and was approved statewide as well.

Referendums 1 and 2 failed in Quitauque, by a vote of 43-115, and 57-115, respectively.
