Ae Turkey had a compress and the cotton was pressed to standard size here and then put in train cars and shipped to Galveston where it was pressed again in a high density press. Then put on boats bound for other ports and foreign countries. At this size about four times as many bales could be loaded in any given space, compared to regular gin size bale.

At this time the compress at Turkey was a modern up to date compress and belonged to the same company as the Childress press. Cotton was weighed in and sampled seven days a week during the fall months but only pressed about two days per week. On the pressing days a crew came out of Childress to run the machinery. The Turkey crew would stencil load and double deck cotton in the train car.



Now about the strike that happened at the compress. We had worked hard all day long cr at least we thought we had. The two managers came out on the job and told the men they wold have to work until 2:00 a.m. and finish up the pressing job then they would take all the hands down to the cafe for a midnight meal . But the word was passed around for all the men to walk off their job at a given time. This we did, so after a few threats by the managers and counter threats by working men. It was decided the company would treat all the hands to a steak supper with' all the trimmings then the pressing job would finished. To my knowledge this was the fist time and the only time Turkey had a walk off the job strike. There was no need to strike for higher wages for they paid thirty cents per h and at the end of a 10 hour day this would give you a big \$3.00 for that day.

Later years the building which included a tall 65 foot tower and housed all the machinery including the tall steam press, and the two large boilers, became a roost for hundreds of pigeons. And in the winter time hundreds of starlings moved in and took over. It was a sight to be seen early in the morning when the starlings was leaving out for their feeding grounds. To gain altitude they would circle back over the sheet iron buildings and it would sound like small hail falling on the roof but it was only the starlings spitting out the hackberry seeds they could not digest during the night.



(1) day and that the ARB expects to approve the final appraisal roll soon thereafter. State law requires the ARB to review and approve appraisal records by July 20. the

After the ARB approves the records, it can hear a protest under only circumstances which affect the owner's tax liability.

The State Property Tax Board has issued a pamphlet called "Taxpayers' Rights, called Taxpayers' Rights, Remedies, Responsibilities," available at the Briscoe County Appraisal District office, which explains how to prepare and present an appeal to the ARB. For a copy, contact the appraisal district staff at the courthouse, (806) 823-2161.
