

With its new personality, denim dress, rainwear, jeans and pants all express the popular fashion moods of earthiness and natural-

The total denim look is sporty so select patterns with topstitch ing, flat felled seams, patch pockets and front closing to emphasize the denim look.

Denim is especially popular with home sewers because the fabric is easy to handle and requires no special sewing equipment. But a few sewing hints can be helpful. Work from the right side of the garment when topstitching, lengthen the stitch to eight stitches per inch, and sew about one-fourth inch away from the seam edge. Topstitching is best along side seams, at the hem, around the edges of collars, cuffs, pockets and down the front openings.

An almost straight seam is required to flat fell. To sew a flat felled finish, first reverse the nor-

The flat felled seam is especially useful to prevent raveling.

All About Shaving

Things You Always Wanted To Know

You're all lathered up and ready to begin what has been described as man's greatest burden in life — shaving.
