## Farmers Urged To File Notice Of Herbicide Application

Cotton planting is well on its way and grass serving on CRP acreage is winding down. Since the rain, farmers will have a weed problem.

Most farmers are aware that the Commissioners applied to the Texas Department of Agriculture in December of 1986 to loosen the restrictions on summer use of herbicides and to shorten the restricted time in the fall. These requests were granted, but the Texas Department of Agriculture imposed one very important restriction of their own. The County Judge, Commissioners, and County Agent opposed the ludicrous restriction! The new restrictions are as follows:

1. The aerial application of any regulated herbicides is prohibited in Precincts 1,3, and 4 from April 25 through

2. The aerial application for brush control may be permitted under the direct supervision of the Texas Department of Agriculture.

3. The application of regulated herbicides by ground equipment is banned except for Dicamba products and 2, 4-D amine. Permits must be obtained from the Texas Department of Agriculture for ground application prior to the application of these herbicides during the regulated period.

4. No permit is required for

the application of regulated herbicides from September 21 through April 24 of each year; however, the filing of a Notice of Intent to Spray is required for these herbicides from September 21 through April 24 of each year, and should be filed with the Texas Department of Agriculture prior to application.

Item #4 is the TDA's insistence that farmers file a notice to spray with them when planning to use any restricted phenoxy herbicide from September 21 through April 24 (meaning the winter months.) No permit is required at this time.

Those wishing to receive a

permit for application of 2, 4-D amine or Banvel, should contact Mr. Jimmy Bush or Mr. Lavon Harmon with the Texas Department of Agriculture in Amarillo at 806-358-7285. These permits will cost you \$10 per acre during the summer restricted period. Plan far enough in advance in order to have enough time to receive the permit and still do a timely application for good control.

## WTU Files for Rate Increase; Cites New Plant as Reason

West Texas Utilities Co. has filed for an increase in its retail electric rates, citing the costs of completing a new coal-fired power plant as making the move necessary.

"We have said over and over again that it would be necessary to increase rates when our Oklaunion Power Station was completed," said Wayne Loury, WTU's local manager in Turkey and Quitaque, adding that WTU's last rate request came almost three years ago.

The rate changes being sought would add \$50,361,475 to the Company's annual retail revenue. This is a 23.9 percent increase over the test year ending March 31, on which the case is based. The request was filed May 19 with cities in the WTU service area and with the Public Utility Commission of Texas in Austin.

Loury said there is no such thing as a "typical customer," but that the new rates, if approved, would mean that a residential electric customer using 625 kilowatt-hours per month would pay \$10.83 more per month than previously. A commercial customer using 1,500 kilowatt-hours would pay \$29.94 more.

"To put this request in its proper perspective, our overall residential revenues will be only six to eight percent higher than they were two years ago," Loury said. "The decline in fuel costs since then just about offsets this increase."

The Oklaunion Power Plant, situated near Vernon, went into commercial operation Dec. 24, 1986. WTU's share of the cost as majority owner is \$275 million, which increased the Company's total investment in facilities by 75

percent of WTU's total generating capacity. The long-term contract for low sulphur western coal diversifies the Company's fuel base and will help stabilize fuel costs, which in recent years have been affected by sudden changes in

Construction at Oklaunion started in May 1982, and the plant was completed on time and well within the original budget. Industry surveys show that Oklaunion was the most economically constructed coal-fired power plant built during the mid-1980's.

## Schools

This will be any time between 1918 and 1928. We will take a tour of the different schools within ten miles of the Turkey school. As very few people have cars, we will take our trip in a wide tire wagon. For this hookup there will be two well-trained horses with a genuine set of leather harness, complete with leather tugs, blind bridles, collars, hames, and breeching so the horses can hold the wagon back going down a hill, although we will have a brake on the wagon if we need it. Some of the people will ride in a two seat surrey with fringe around the top and will have the same hookup as the wagon. Several people will follow on horse back. We will start in a westerly direction from Turkey.

The first schools we will visit will be Bolton and Kent. Most children walk to school but some ride horse back and some in buggies. They carry their lunch boxes with them, usually their lunches consist of homemade biscuits and ham with an apple for dessert. Those were one teacher schools.

Next we will go to Gasoline and Folley with two teachers at each school. There are small stores here so we can buy our eats and supplies. Some of the schools during these years did not allow the boys and girls to play together so they would assign one-half of the school yard to boys and the other half to the girls, the school house being the center. Imagine playing peek-a-boo around the corner of the school building. We will continue our trip south to the Montgomery and Barton schools with one and two teachers. At most schools the students were required to form straight lines before marching in time to the teachers bell.

From here we go east to Wolfflat and Bridlebit schools. At noon the students had planned a surprise fruit shower for the teacher. They all had an enjoyably afternoon. From there, east to Tampaco and Buffalo Flat schools.

Some schools have organized basketball teams and only had outside courts to play on. The well dressed boy player wore sleeveless jersey, shorts, with heavy knee length socks. The well dressed girl player wore long sleeve mitty blouse, black bloomers with elastic below the knee, also with heavy stockings. Now, back west to Turkey school.

road from the Richard Brook Lane grave is that of R. W. Officer, the last survivor of his regiment, another confederate soldier. Mr. Officer was born in 1845.

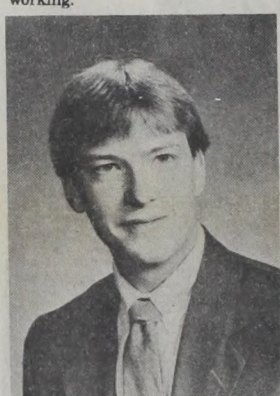
**OLGA ORTIZ**

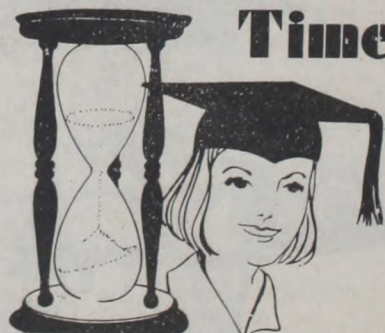
