WTU Files for Rate Increase; **Cites New Plant as Reason**

has filed for an increase in its plained. retail electric rates, citing the Construction at Oklaunion costs of completing a new coalfired power plant as making

the move necessary. "We have said over and over again that it would be necessary to increase rates when our Oklaunion Power Station was completed," said Wayne Loury, WTU's local manager in Turkey and Quitaque, adding that WTU's last rate

request came almost three years ago. The rate changes being sought would add \$50,361,475 the Company's annual to retail revenut. This is a 23.9 percent increase over the test year ending March 31, on which the case is based. The request was filed May 19 with cities in the WTU service area and with the Public Util-ity Commission of Texas in Austing.

Loury said there is no such thing as a "typical customer," but that the new rates, if approved, would mean that a residential electric customer approved, would mean that a residential electric customer using 625 kilowatt-hours per month would pay \$10,83 more per month than previously. A

The first schools we will visit will be Bolton and Kent. Most children walk to school but some ride horse back and some in buggies. They carry their lunch boxes with them, usually their lunches consist of homemade biscuits and ham with an apple for dessert. Those were one teacher schools.

Next we will go to Gasoline and Folley with two teachers at each school. There are small stores here so we can buy our eats and supplies. Some of the schools during these years did not allow the boys and girls to play together so they would assign one-half of the school yard to boys and the other half to the girls, the school house being the center. Imagine playing peek-a-boo around the corner of the school building. We will continue our trip south to the Montgomery and Barton schools with one and two teachers. At most schools the students were required to form straight lines before marching in time to the teachers bell.

From here we go east to Wolfflat and Briddlebit schools. At noon the students had planned a surprise fruit shower for the teacher. They all had an enjoyably afternoon. From there, east to Tampaco and Buffalo Flat schools

Briscoe County Agent By Dirk Aaron Briscoe Co. CEA-AG Bagworms are one of the major pests of junipers and other trees and shrubs in Texas. Spring hatch began early on the South Plains this year. Hatching is usually completed in about three weeks Insecticide control is most effective in late May and early June when the bagworms are small, says County Extension agent Dirk Aaron

County

In the spring, bagworm larvae emerge from hatching eggs inside last year's bags and begin feeding on leaves. They soon begin to on leaves. They soon begin to construct their own protective bag of silk, twigs and leaves, making them camouflaged and hard to see. As the larvae and their bags continue to grow, control becomes more difficult

Bagworms feed throughout the summer months, building their bags until the bags are about 1 and 1/2 inches long, Aaron adds. In the fall, the bagworms become adults, mate, and the females lay eggs inside their bags. They then overwinter in these bags in trees and shrubs. Each overwintering female bag on a tree contains from 500 to 1500 eggs. "Since the bagworm only com-

pletes one generation a year and spreads very slowly from plant to plant, picking the bags off infested plants in the winter will help a lot toward controlling this pest," says Aaron. "But if bagworms were present on the plant last year and control measures were not applied, chances are very good that an insecticide will be needed this spring."

Insecticides which can be used to control bagworms include sevin, dursban, diazinon, mala thion, dylox, and orthene. The biological insecticide Bacillus thuriengensis can also be used. To obtain effective control, thorough coverage of the foliage is important. The addition of a small amount of liquid soap or surfactant to the spray solution will improve control because it helps adhere the insecticide to the treated trees and shrubs. Always read and follow label instructions when applying insecticide

Workshop Cotton, corn and sorghum roducers in the Panhandle and South Plains are again receiving a special invitation to take part in the annual High Plains Insect Scout Training Workshop to increase the effectiveness of their pest manage-

ment programs. The first of two workshop ses-sions will focus on early and midseason pests and will be held Tuesday, June 2, at the Hale County Agricultural Center in Plainview. The center is on U.S. 87 Business Route south of the city.

The workshop conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, was first held in 1973 to train scouts in the pest manage ment programs conducted by Ex tension, part of the Texas A&M University System.

In subsequent years, it has ex-panded to include scouts employed by consultants, aerial applicators and others, as well as producers who want to learn how scout their own fields for insects.

The workshop will begin at 8:30 a.m. with Dr. James Leser, Extension entomologist, outlining the scope of the training. General concepts of pest management and sampling will be discussed by Dr. William P. Morrison, Extension entomologist. Aspects of pesticide safety will also be presented.

Leser will open the cotton pest session with infomation on thrips and the growth and development of cotton plants. Cotton of cotton plants. Cotton fleahoppers will be discussed by Mark Brown, Extension Agent-Entomology headquartered Crosbyton

Greg Cronholm and Allen Knutson, Extension Agents-Entomology in Plainview and Dimmitt, will provide information on early and mid-season pests of sorghum and corn.
