## Jimmy Ross Sworn In June 30 As New Briscoe County Judge

Jimmy H. Ross was sworn in as the Briscoe County Judge Tuesday morning, June 30, after the Commissioners Court had received Judge Fred Mercer's resignation in a special session.

Ross expressed a sincere desire to serve all the people of Briscoe County, and said that "his office door will always be open and he will be receptive to the constructive ideas of the people." He has plans to have an open meeting soon at which residents will be invited to voice their opinions about the future of Briscoe County.

"Not having campaigned for this office, I have not had an opportunity to get acquainted with them prior to assuming this office," he said, "and I do want to get to know them and learn what their priorities are for our county government."

Ross is married to the former Velda Woods, daughter of Duke and Mary Woods. They have three daughters, Julie, Janet and Sammie Dee.

### "Line Car"

Some people still remember when Turkey had a passenger bus from east to west each day. During this time the roads were kept in pretty good shape and the buses could get through during the rain storms and muddy roads.

In the early years and long before the time of the buses, the passengers were hauled through and from Turkey in a car which was called a line car. The reason it was called a line car was because the roads were all on the section lines and did not go across peoples land like they do now. If you bought a ticket from Turkey to Quitaque it was a fifteen mile fare for the line car had to travel fifteen miles to get there. The line car had no heater or air conditioner but if it started to rain the driver would stop and put up the side curtains and this would keep the passengers dry except during a hail storm. This happened one time out between Turkey and Estelline and almost beat the top off the line car, but no one was badly hurt. Going by section lines it was fifty miles to Estelline. The freight wagons would make deep ruts in the roads and this would make it difficult for the cars to get through but the freight wagon drivers would often use teams of horses to pull them through the worst mud holes. Turkey had only one through road and that was the only from Estelline through Turkey to Quitaque, then you go from there up the Lockney Cap or up the Silverton Cap that is if you would use your lowest gear then sometimes people would have to get out and push. After you got out on the plains the roads were good except during rains and this meant trouble for everyone. The line car driver would stop in front of a drug store and pick up the passengers and you did not have to have a ticket just hand him the fare and go get in if you could find room.

Now the old Greyhound has taken over and can travel in comfort on the super highways, but will still look up to the big Jet Aeroplanes.

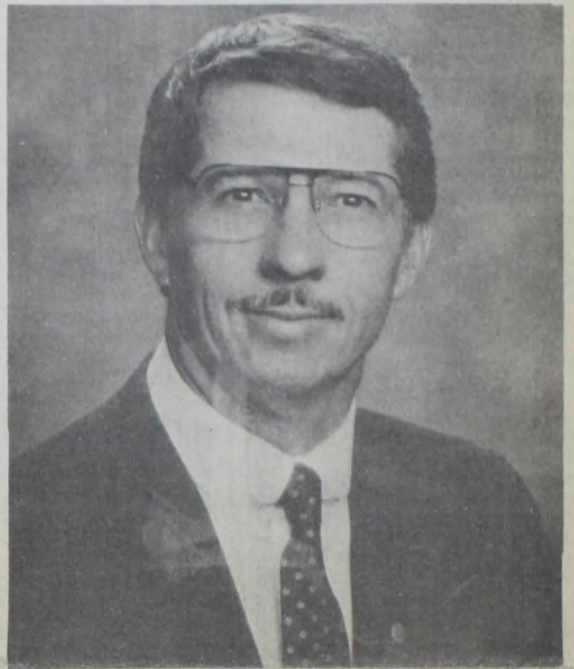
Ross was a Sunday School teacher in 1979-81, was chairman of the Administrative Council of his church in 1982-86, and is currently a Lay Leader.

Mercer stated his health as the reason for his resignation and said, "I've really enjoyed these 8 1/2 years I've served as County Judge."

Mercer has also served in the Commissioners Court, on the board of the Silverton Independent School District, on the ASCS county committee, as Scoutmaster and as Mayor of Silverton. He has been active in community service through his involvement in the Lions Club and other civic organizations.

### Hall County Sheriff's Dept. Investigates Burglary

The Hall County Sheriff Department received a call on Monday, June 29, 1987, that Peggy Puckett's house, in Turkey, had been burglarized.

A color T. V., two stereos and speakers, cameras, tripod, alarm clock and a few blankets were taken.

Deputy Garvin Speed, investigating officer, received some information that some of the stolen items were hidden in an old pick-up. Late that night, Sheriff T. W. Tippitt and Chief Deputy Kenny Schull, went to Turkey to assist Deputy Speed.

About 1:30 a.m., Tuesday, June 30, 1987 a white male subject was picked up and questioned. After questioning,

he told the local law enforcement officers where the rest of the stolen items were.

The rest of the items were picked up and the subject was charged with, and arrested for burglary of a habitation, which is a first degree felony, which carries a penalty of life or 5 to

99 years in the Texas Department of Corrections and optional fine not to exceed \$10,000.00.

The subject was brought to the Hall County Jail Tuesday, June 30, 1987. The subject was taken before Justice of the Peace Ruby Roden for arraignment and his bond was set at \$15,000.00

## Hall County To Vote On Hospital District Aug. 8

Hall County citizens who are eligible voters will be deciding in an election to be held Saturday, August 8, 1987 whether or not to create Hall County Hospital district under a newly passed State law authorizing the creation.

The new law, now in force is H.B. No. 2510, Chapter 1017, and the law spells out all aspects of the creation, maintenance, financing and operation of a hospital district in Hall County.

The new law states in Article One, Section 1.02; the Hall County Hospital District may be created and established and, if created must be maintained, operated, and financed in the manner provided by Article IX, Section 9, of the Texas Constitution and by this Act.

### Certification Deadline

For the past several years, farmers in this area have had to measure and report acres of spring seeded crops by the 15th of July. This date crowds many producers especially those years when many crops have to be replanted or substitute crops become necessary.

The July 15 deadline is still in effect for 1987. Producers who have not done this need to measure and then report the acreage by certifying, no later than July 15.

Appointments will be taken through July 10th. For more information contact Briscoe County ASCS office.

The boundaries of the district are coextensive with the boundaries of Hall County, Texas.

The Commissioners Court of Hall County become temporary directors of the district as soon as the law is enacted.

The district may be created and a tax may be authorized only if the creation and the tax are approved by a majority of the qualified voters of the territory of the proposed

district voting at an election called and held for that purpose. A majority of the temporary directors (commissioners) of the district may order a creation election to be held.

Section 3.02, 3.03, 3.04 and 3.05 deal with specifics as to how the election will be called, held, notices published and other details concerning the election.

The ballot for an election at which the issuance of bonds is

Briscoe County Appraisal District met June 11, 1987 at 9:00 a.m.

There was some discussion on filing suits to clear up old back taxes, some that have been on rolls for several years. Carlye was instructed to ask lawyers about this and to get something in writing from them.

Carlye stated that she has discussed with Steve Jarnigan of the First State Bank the possibility of putting the appraisal district funds in a NOW ACCOUNT. Steve agreed to this suggestion.

Social Security

People who change their name—whether because of marriage, divorce or other reasons should be certain to contact Social Security to apply for a new Social Security card.

Employers report earnings covered by Social Security under the name by which employees are known, and the Social Security number. If the workers' names are not listed correctly, their earnings may not be properly entered on their Social Security record, and they may not receive all credit due them.

A marriage itself does not have to be reported. Many women continue to use their maiden names after they marry. If this is the case, Social Security need not be informed of the marriage. However, women should make certain to use the same name consistently throughout their employment.

Even women who are not employed should report any name change to Social Security. Records will contain the correct name when they apply for benefits.

To apply for a new Social Security card, which will show the new name and the old number, contact any Social Security office and ask for an Application for Social Security Number card (Form SS-5). Proof of identity under both the old and new names is required, a marriage license for example.

not proposed shall be printed to permit voting for or against the proposition: "The creation of the Hall County Hospital District and the levy of annual taxes for hospital purposes at a rate not to exceed 20 cents on each \$100 valuation of all taxable property in the district."

The temporary directors shall canvass the returns of such election, and if the election results are favorable to the proposition to create the district, they shall issue an order declaring the district created.

If the temporary directors find that the election results are not favorable to the proposition to create the district, another election may be held within 12 months after the date of the election at which voters disapproved the proposition.

If the creation of the district is not approved at an election held within 60 months after the effective date of the Act, the Act expires.

Absentee voting on the creation election will begin on July 20th in the County Clerk's office and will end five days prior to the August 8th election.

(Note: This is the first of a series of articles to be published before the election to give Hall County voters opportunity to thoroughly study all the aspects of H.B. No. 2510 relating to the creation, administration, powers, duties, operation and financing of the Hall County Hospital District.)

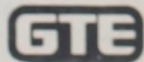

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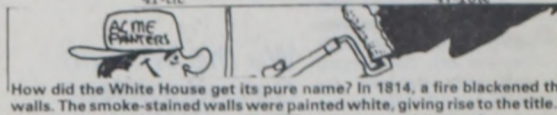

# Conservation Corner

By John Crowell  
**CONTROLLING WEEDS ON CRPLAND.**

Recent rains have given us perfect conditions for growing grass on Conservation Reserve Program land. Most of the grass is up and growing. However, when conditions are good for growing grass, they are also good for growing weeds.

This is not all bad. At least the grass has a good start, and, with any luck at all, we will get the rains needed to keep it growing. The best time to control weeds with a herbicide is RIGHT NOW, when the weeds are growing rapidly. RECENT applications of ALLY have resulted in VERY GOOD control on weeds up to about a foot tall. We have seen much better weed control since the rains than we did when the chemicals were applied early in the spring, when conditions were dry. No chemical works well when we have dry conditions because the plants stop growing and taking in the chemicals.

If you have land in the CRP that is planted to grass, you must do some kind of weed control NOW. There are several chemicals on the market that will kill weeds, but some will kill the young grass too. The only herbicide we know of at this time that is labeled for application on the young grass seedlings is the herbicide "Ally". Other chemicals such as "Banvel" and "Glean" are labeled for grass but should not be applied to the small grass seedlings. These chemicals could be considered later in the summer if the grasses continue to grow.

Shredding is an alternative that should be considered if you have tall weeds that chemicals cannot control. However, shredding alone will only limit the height of the weeds. It will not affect the small weeds or keep any new ones from coming up. If you shred, we recommend you follow with any application of "Ally" IF moisture conditions are good and the young weeds are actively growing. When applying "Ally" it is recommended that you increase the amount of water and surfactant. This seems to improve the control. Contact our office if you have any questions.
