

Some people still remember when Turkey had a passenger bus from east to west each day. During this time the roads were kept in pretty good shape and the buses could get through during the rain storms and muddy roads.

In the early years and long before the time of the buses, the hauled th which was called a line car. The reason it was called a line car was because the roads were all on the section lines and did not go across peoples land like they do now. If you bought a ticket from Turkey to Quitaque it was a fifteen mile fare for the line car had to travel fifteen miles to get there. The line car had no heater or air conditioner but if it started to rain the driver would stop and put up the side curtains and this would keep the passengers dry except during a hail storm. This happened one time out between Turkey and Estelline and almost beat the top off the line car, but no one was badly hurt. Going by section lines it was fifty miles to Estelline. the frieght wagons would make deep ruts in the roads and this would make it difficult for the cars to get through but the freight wagon drivers would often use teams of horses to pull them through the worst mud holes. Turkey had only one through road and that was the only from Estelline through Turkey to Quitaque, then you go from there up the Lockney Cap or up the Silverton Cap that is if you would use your lowest gear then sometimes people would have to get out and push. After you got out on the plains the roads were good except during rains and this meant trouble for everyone. The line car driver would stop in front of a drug store and pick up the passengers and you did not have to have a ticket just hand him the fare and go get in if you could find room.





to the fact that most of the men had been playing under the lights a couple of weeks. But there were no alibis - it was just a nice friendly get-together with fun and frolic for



### Conservation Corner

By John Crowell CONTROLLING WEEDS ON CRP LAND.

Recent rains have given us perfect conditions for growing grass on Conservation Reserve program land. Most of the grass is up and growing. However, when conditions are good for growing grass, they are also good for growing weeds. This is not all bad. At least the

grass has a good start, and , with any luck at all, we will get the rains needed to keep it growing. The best time to control weeds with a herbicide is RIGHT NOW, when the weeds are growing rapidly.
