W. T. U. To Increase Rates By 16 Percent

West Texas Utilities Co. will pay about 16 per cent more for their electricity as result of a rate increase granted by the Public Utility Commission of

The Commission approved an increase about \$28.5 million annually, which amounts to a 12.9 per cent average. The Company has filed last May for a \$50.4 million rate increase, which would have been a 23 per cent

Under the Commission's final order, the typical residential customer would see his bill increased by \$7.24, or from \$43.95 to \$51.19. This is an average between the summer and winter differenwill raise residential bills per

cent, while the winter rate will raise bills by 17.4

The new rates are scheduled to go into effect Dec. 22. The rates will be prorated, so that all customers will be treated equally no matter what time of the month their meters are read.

2 tablespoons flour Salad oil

Salad oil

1. In pie plate, beat egg; place pistachios on waxed paper. Coat cheese with flour. Dip cheese in egg to coat; then coat with pistachios. Place on cookie sheet. Refrigerate 30 minutes.

2. In 4-quart saucepan, heat 2 inches oil to 375°F. Fry cheese, a few pieces at a time, until coating is lightly browned, about 2 minutes, turning occasionally. With slotted spoon, remove to paper towels to drain. Serve immediately. Makes about 12 appartizers.

FmHa Office To Demonstrate **New Computer**

Floydada - An open house will be held at the Floyd Home County Farmers Administration office on Tuesday December 15 from 10:00 a.m. - 12:00 p.m. to demonstrate the new computer system, according to FmHA County Supervisor Becky Via.

The open house is part of a state and nationwide open to recognize the house completion of the three-year automation project; one of the largest projects of its kind in country. FmHA installed 264 computer terminals in Texas and over 6,000 nationally, Ms. Via said. "We think this computer

system is going to be a big help to our borrowers, expecially family farmers," Ms. Via family farmers," Ms. Via said. "Once we plug basic numbers into the machine, we can help determine which management decisions will be the most beneficial. We'll be able to project annual cashflow figures quickly and accurately.

Austin-Phase two of the International Quilt Festival, Texas Quilt Search, a massive the world's fair of quilts, which effort to document the state's quilt heritage, has begun. The first phase, which focused on antique quilts made between 1836 and 1936, is featured in the book fore State of Lore State the book Lone Stars: A Legacy of the authors said Texas Quilts, 1836-1936.

The authors of Lone Stars are now conducting a second phase of the Search. This time they're seeking quilts made by Texans between 1936 and 1986.

Karey Bresenhan and Nancy Puentes are researching these contemporary Texas quilts for a companion volume to their award-winning book. Lone Stars II will also be published by the University of Texas Press.

"More than 3,500 quilts were discovered and documented during the first part of this project, which was conducted for the Texas Sesquicentennial," said the authors, who are cousins. "We anticipate fully that many quilts, perhaps more, will be discovered in the period covering the last 50 years of quilt-

making in Texas. They add that those 50 years have seen three wars, Texas' move from a rural to essentially an urban state, and the changing role of women and the family, and that they expect those changes to be reflected in the

quiltmaker's art. "Our state is one of the most active and exciting places to be for contemporary quiltmakers. There is a long-standing tra-dition of fine quilting here, as well as a very strong network of quilt guilds and quilt specialty shops. Furthermore, Houston is the home of both the America/International Quilt Association, the world's only inter-

national quilt organization, and

G.T.E. Offers Reduced Telephone Installation

served by General Telephone in Texas who presently do not have telephone service may be eligible for reduced telephone installation charges as part of a national prog-ram being piloted in Texas to expand the availability of telephone

E.L. "Buddy" Langley, president of General Telephone, said installation fees for eligible participants will be reduced by a maximum of \$30 with the balance payable without interest in four

qual monthly payments.

Texas is one of four states in which the program, called Link Up America, is being piloted. The telephone company official said the goal is to preserve and promote telephone service for low income households and to get those Americans who currently do not have telephone service onto

the telephone network.

The concept of Link Up Americr was proposed earlier this year by the Foderal-State Joint Board to

the Federal Communications Commission. The FCC adopted the program in April.

The program will be funded through interstate telephone rev-

Qualification for the program is based on income level and eligibility for social service assistance programs. In general, an individual or household will qualify if income is below the federal poverty level, and the individual has not had telephone service for at least three months.

Qualified individuals who are interested in more details or who might want to sign up for the program are asked to contact the Link Up America representative in the General Telephone business office.

The program is limited to reduced installation charges and does not include any assistance with monthly phone charges.

Social Security News

If you change jobs frequently, you probably will want to know if

your earnings from different em-ployers have been correctly entered in your Social Security record.

To find out, the first thing to do

is to request Form SSA-7004PC (Request for Statement of Earnings) from any Social Security office. Complete it, mail it back, and in a few weeks, you will receive, free of charge, a statement of your; earnings covered by Social Security. This statement will show:

•The grand total of earnings credited to your record beginning January 1, 1937 through the latest

period posted.

•A subtotal of earnings for

1937 through 1950.

•A subtotal of earnings for

1951 through the 5th year before the current year.

•Annual earnings for the 4 years before the current year.

Social Security recommends that every worker check his or her earnings record about every 2 or 3 years to be sure his or her earnings have been reported. It is very important, especially for workers who change jobs often, to verify if their earnings have or have not been correctly reported or credited under their names and

an earnings statement shows that earnings have not been correctly reported, the Social Security office will help to correct

Social Security numbers.

with you your W-2 form or other evidence showing your earnings for the year in question. Because of the time required to process earnings reports, the statement may not include earnings for the year immediately preceding the

There is a time limit to correct a worker's earnings record. By law, the correction can be done at any time up to 3 years, 3 months, and 15 days after the year in which the wages were paid or a self-employment income was earned.

There are some exceptions, however, for revising the ear-nings record after the time limit has passed. Some of these excep tions are: to correct a mechanical, clerical, or other error; to correct an error in crediting earnings to the wrong person or the wrong period; to correct an entry established through fraud; to add wages paid in a period by an employer who made no report of any wages paid to the worker in that period... and others.

A. Ice cubes provide an active surface that naturally attracts odors, so they should be used often to prevent them from becoming old and stale. Home economists from and stale.
