## Property Tax Protest and Appeal Procedures

The law gives property owners the right to
protest actions conceming their property tax protest actions concerming their property tax
appraisals. You may follow these appeal procedures if you have a concern about: the value placed on your property -any exemptions that may apply to you the cancellation of an agricultural appraisa
the taxable status of your property -the local governments which should be taxing your property
-any action taken by the appraisal district that adversely affected you.

Informal Review
For an informal review, contact the appraisal
district staff at the courthouse or call 823 For an
district

Review by the Appraisal Review Board If you can't resolve your problem informally
with the appraisal district staft, you may have your case heard by the appraisileview board The ARB that reviews problems with appraisals or other concerns listed above. It has the power to order the appraisal district to make the necessary changes to solve problems. If you file a
written request for an ARB hearing (called a notice of protest) before the deadline, the ARB will set your case for a hearing. You'll receive written notice of the time, date and place of the hearing. The hearing will be informal. You and asked to present evidence about your case. The ARB will make its decision based on the evidence presented. You can get a copy of a protest form from the appraisaldistrict office al
the courthouse or write Briscoe C.A.D. Box 728 , Silverton, TX 79257
Note: you shouldn't try to contact ARB members outside of the hearing. The law requires ARB members to sign an affidavit saying that
they haven't talked about your case before the ARB hears it.

not satisfied with the decision you have the right to appeal to district court. If you choose to go to court, you must start the process by filing

has appraised your property at $\$ 1,000,000$ or more, you must file a notice of appeal with the chief appraiser within 15 days of the date you eceive the
ARB's order

On or before May 31 (or 30 days after a notice ever is later).

Late protests are allowed if you miss the usual deadline for good cause. Good cause is some reason beyond your control, like a medical
emergency. The ARB decides whether you have good cause

Late protests are due the day before the appraisal review board approves records for the year. Contact your appraisal district for more information

Special Deadlines
For change of use (the appraisal district informed you that you are losing agricultural appraisal because you changed the use of
your land), the deadline is before the 30th day your land), the deadline is before the 30th day to you.
For ARB changes (the ARB has informed you of a change that increases your tax liability and the change didn't result from a protest you
filed), the deadline is before the 30 th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you.
If you believe the appraisal district or ARB should have sent you a notice and did not, you may file a protest until the day before taxes
become delinquent (usually February 1. The ARB decides whether it will hear your case based on evidence about whether a required
notice was mailed to you.
