The men joined Wren and Jo Jean Vinyard of Turkey, who are the coordinators of the farm project underway for Major General Mutlog of Saudi Arabia.

The Mutlog Farm is located about 20 miles out of Buraydah (a city of 315,000 population), and is a homestead that consists of homestead that consists of

10,000 acres.

This is new land and will have to be cleared, levelled, ripped, mulched, and fertilized before it can be sown to wheat. It will be can be sown to wheat. It will be irrigated, also. The goal for the group of farmers is to prepare and farm 5,000 acres this year and at the last report, they say it looks quite possible to reach that

Granddaughter of Mrs. Harrison Found Dead After Two Months

On May 15, 1983, Mrs. Tracy On May 15, 1983, Mrs. Tracy. Zan (Harrison) Powers, 20, and her son, Justin Powers, four months old, and Mrs. Pamela Kay (Lance) Hudgins, 21, were pronounced missing. The three were last seen at 7:00 p.m. that day on South Main Street in Weatherford, Towar griding in Weatherford, Texas, riding in Mrs. Powers' car. Larry Lance, a Fort Worth Police Officer and the brother of Pamela, reported at the investigation that the circumstances surrounding the womens' disappearance seemed to indicate they may have left the apartment they shared involun-

tarily.

Mrs. Powers was a granddaughter of Mrs. Harrison and the late O. L. Harrison of Quitaque. Her parents are Norman and Melba Harrison of Weatherford.

During the investigation of the missing women, every possible lead was investigated beginning with the checking of footprints around the apartment. Mrs. Harrison says the footprints on each side of the car were found only at the front of the car. The parents called a number of times parents called a number of times and failing to get anyone on the phone, went by the apartment. When they arrived, they noticed Mrs. Powers' new car in the yard. She was known to take special care of her car, never stopping it in the sun. After checking the car and apartment, they called the police. The officers asked Mr. Harrison to deep everything as quiet as keep everything as quiet as keep everything as quiet as possible until further investigation could be completed. According to the brother of the other woman, Larry Lance, burglary was ruled out immediately. Nothwas ruled out immediately. Noth-ing seemed to be missing from the apartment but the ladies' purses, and even the baby's clothing was still in the apart-

On June 22, some human remains were found at a culvert between Weatherford and Min-eral Wells. The Parker County Sheriff's Department went back to the area to begin a second search and found the skeletal remains of an infant and other evidence which led authorities to believe they had found the bodies of Tracy Zan Powers and her infant son. The tarrant County Medical Examiner confirmed the remains found were those of Mrs. Powers, and later the remains of

the infant were confirmed.

The tight security asked for seven days wait before the

funeral was held, and a large number of officials, including the FBI, were at the service. Two leads were obtained there, but Mrs. Harrison reports they proved false.

There were two teenagers who disappeared previously and the officers are going on the assumption there is a connection.

Mrs. Hudgins has not been

found, and the search continues.

Mrs. Harrison remarks that

we read these things, hear them on television, and we dismiss them, but when it comes home, there is no way to dismiss them. Mrs. Norman Harrison was in the hospital several days and the doctors were concerned for her doctors were concerned to a new life, her mother-in-law reports. She is at home now and Norman called his mother this week and reports she is improving. Mr. Harrison has an automobile parts store in Weatherford, His son-inlaw and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth Lee, moved from Okla-homa to help him, and another daughter, Mrs. P. O. Wright, also moved from Oklahoma and is now his secretary. The couple has another daughter, Mrs. Joe Hall, who lives in Weatherford and she is also helping.

The Valley Tribune and the entire area extends sympathy to Mrs. Harrison and her family.



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Senator Bill Sarpalius Reports

AUSTIN The Texas Legislature has approved legislation we sponsored which calls for changes in the state's social work certification process

The new measure allows the Texas Department of Human Resources to consider experience and degrees which are closely related to social work when a person applies for social work certification.

work certification.
Under the new provision.
a person can become a
Certified Social Worker,
which is the highest level
of certification, if he or she
has a Ph.D. or master's
degree in a social work
related field and two years
of experience. In addition,
an individual can qualify as
a Certified Social Worker if
he or she has a bachelor's he or she has a bachelor's degree in social work or a related field and five years related field and five years of experience, or a bachelor's degree in any field and ten years of experience. Previously, a person applying for Certified Social Worker status was required to have a Ph.D. or master's degree

a Ph.D. or master's degree in social work.

To become certified as a social worker, which is the second highest degree of certification, a person will now be eligible if he or she has at least an associate's degree and ten years of experience or a high school diploma and fifteen years of experience. Previously, a person would be considered. of experience. Previously, a person would be considered for Social Worker Certification only if he or she had a bachelor's degree in social work.

The new provisions in-cluded in the Social Work Certification process will only be in effect until 1985. After that time, the standards for certification will revert back to the original educational requirements, and the "grand-fathering" period will be

The grandfather clause is necessary to protect those workers who are highly re-spected in the field of social work and who are ex-tremely competent despite the fact they may not have a Ph.D. or a master's degree. We believe the grandfather clause is important to allow for certification of those individuals who have worked in the field of social worked in the field of social work for ten, twenty, thirty years or more and contrib-ute a great deal towards understanding and respon-sibilities of child care. We believe this legislation is significant to Boys Ranch

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



Realtors, veterans praise Mauro's changes in Veterans Land Program

AUSTIN - Texas realtors and veterans have re-sponded favorably to recent changes in the Veterans Land Program made by Texas Land Commissioner Garry Mauro.

Following Mauro's recommendation, the Veterans Land Board recently abolished the subdivision rule of the Veterans Land Program which prohibited the Board from buying more than 20 percent of larger subdivisions

Mauro, who serves as Chairman of the Veterans Land Board, said, "After consulting with Texas realtors, veterans, and lending institutions, I am convinced this action will help make higher quality land available at a cheaper price for our veterans.

By allowing sellers to designate as many 10- acre tracts as they wish for purchase by the Veterans Land Board, we will encourage development and open up more tracts closer to urban areas where most of our Texas veterans now live," Mauro explained.

Houston realtor Jim Perryman with Texas Gulf Timber Co. praised the decision, saying, "This is great news for realtors and veterans. It gives us the absolute assurance we can sell available land and we can commit to buying larger tracts requiring greater financial obligation on our part. Veterans, realtors, and individuals with land to sell will all benefit from Mauro's

Austin realtor John Winkler said, "I was glad to see the subdivision rule eliminated because this restriction was actually penalizing veterans. have more veterans looking for land than we have tracts and this will create a much greater selection.

"We keep the names of veterans on file here to match with tracts whenever they become available. Tracts sell just as fast as they go on the market," he said Winkler said veterans

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realize that land is an attractive hedge against long-term inflation.

"A \$20,000 loan for 40 years at 8.5 percent with. semi-annual payments is far superior to anything to be found anywhere else in today's market. Land is going up in value each year. It's a tremendous investment. If a veteran decides to sell his property 5 years later, he's had the advantage of a long-term pay-out and low interest rate," he said.

Navy veteran Ira Hood found his land four years ago with the aid of Winkler.

"My wife and I were fortunate to get 22 acres for \$15,000 near Lytton Springs

near Bastrop We bought our land as an investment and it couldn't have worked out better. Comparable land to

ours is now selling for \$20,000 for five-acre tracts within a mile of us.

"We couldn't be happier. The Veterans Land Program has lived up to its every promise for us," he
