A few years ago Judge Sam Davis Tatam, of the Juvenile and Domestic Relations Court of Nashville, Tenn., named four contributing factors to delinquency among young people: 1. Violation of the law. 2. The divorce curse. 3. Lack of religion among children and parents. 4. Homes where mothers and fathers drink intoxicating beverages. He further stated that the 9,500 boys under 17 years of age who had been in his court, there was not one whose parents attended church

services regularly. Again, there were only 44 out of the 9,500 who attended church services regularly themselves.

Today systematic efforts are being made to eliminate faith in God from our society. In many areas these efforts seem to be succeeding. Further, many, without being aware of it, are contributing to the decay of religious faith through their indifference and neglect. Today, crime, especially among young people is increasing at an alarming rate. Are we not reaping the consequences of religious decline?

The Bible says, "The fool hath said in his heart there is no God" (Psalms 14:1) and, "Righteousness exaltheeth a nation: but sin is a reproach to any people" (Proverbs 14:34). It exhorts parents, "And ye fathers, provoke

not your children to wrath: but bring them up in the nurture and admonition of the Lord" (Ephesians 6:4).

Is it not time to re-affirm and strengthen our faith in God? Is it not time to exemplify and teach it to others?
