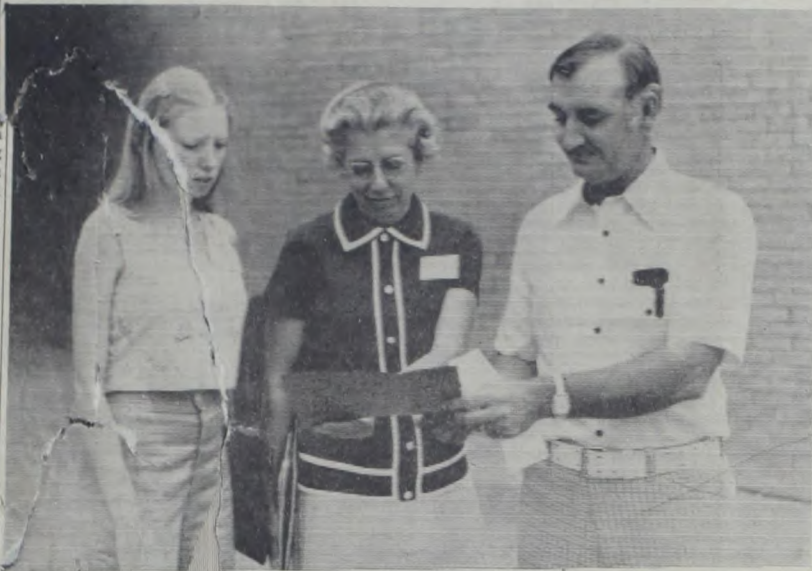

Attend Nuclear Science Symposium In Austin

Twenty outstanding students and teachers from the area served by West Texas Utilities Company attended the 15th annual Nuclear Science Symposium at the University of Texas in Austin. The conference got underway Wednesday, June 4, and ended Saturday, June 7.

Sponsored by WTU from this area were Mitchie Lipscomb, a student at Valley High School, and Mrs. Jo Mae Merrell, Valley School teacher.

The Symposium was jointly sponsored by the Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation and the University of Texas. West Texas Utilities is one of the sponsoring companies.

The 500 selected high school science students and teachers who attended the session were offered the rare opportunity of hearing lectures by some of the nation's outstanding nuclear scientists.

The Foundation was formed for the primary purpose of conducting the world's first and largest privately financed research effort in the field of nuclear energy. Currently, the Foundation and the University are sponsoring a program in nuclear fusion research aimed at controlling thermonuclear reactions for the production of electric power. Fusion is the energy process of the sun and the stars.

The goal of the Foundation and WTU is not research alone, but to also assist in the advancement of the knowledge of nuclear science in Texas schools. Of special interest to the sponsors is bringing to students and teachers a realization of the privileges, responsibilities and opportunities which scientific discoveries in the field of nuclear energy presents.

WTU paid all expenses for the 20 students and teachers attending from schools in the area served by the company. Lecturers at the Symposium were chosen from top men in their field.

There are over 1,000 accredited senior high schools in the state of Texas. Turkey and Quitaque can be justly proud of its high school for having been chosen as one of the 150 high schools in the state invited to send students and teachers to the Symposium.

Her family was one of four that came to this area before the county was organized. A brother, Briscoe Honea, was the first white baby born in the county.

The second of three Briscoe County Eliminations for the District 4-H Horse Show was held June 9 at 7:00 p.m. at the Silverton Rodeo Arena. Twenty-seven Briscoe County 4-H Horse Club members competed for honors with Roland Moore judging the performance events and Steve Barbour pulling showmanship.

The third Briscoe County Elimination for the District Horse Show will be June 16 at 7:00 p.m. at the Silverton Rodeo Arena. At that time, points will be tabulated and those qualifying for District Competition will be announced. Each contestant qualifying for District competition must, on June 16, turn in an AS3.030 record form on project horses. Copies of registration and certification papers on project horses must be submitted; also, according to Texas State 4-H Horse Show rules, health papers and veterinarian's certification must be submitted on grade horses.

Anyone who does not submit his horse project record, health papers and registration papers on June 16 WILL NOT be eligible for District competition.

Wayland Baptist College's AAU champion Hutcherson Flying Queens have landed four top high school players for the 1975-76 season, Coach Dean Weese has announced.

Sonya Shropshire of Euflata,

Oklahoma averaged 41.3 points a game and helped her team advance to the area playoffs for the third straight year. In previous seasons, she averaged 28.6 points and 36.4. The versatile 5-10 performer hit 50 per cent from the field and 91 per cent from the line, making 69 free throws in a row at one stretch. She scored 30 or more points in 12 of 26 games as a senior and had 55 points in

one game and 41 in another. She tallied 24 points in the East's 72-69 win in the recent Oklahoma All-Star Game. A straight A student, Band Queen, Yearbook Queen and third place finisher in the State Music Festival in Coronet, she was contacted by some 40 schools.

Oklahoma's Jim Thorpe Award winner as the state's outstanding female athlete for 1975-75, Valerie Goodwin of Forgan, led her team to the State Class B title,

averaging 28 points a game. She ranked second in the state in scoring as a junior with a 31.9 average. The 5-10½ all-ster won the state high jump title four times. She a straight A student, two-time International Science Fair participant and has been to state in both instrumental and vocal solo.

Eva Cheatham, 5-10 post-forward for two-time state tournament participant Valley High (Quitaque, Turkey, Texas), averaged 22

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points in a 31-4 season in 1974-75. When she was a sophomore, Valley High lost in the state finals to Grandview and fell to the same school in the semifinals the next year. She scored 45 points in one game this past year. Miss Cheatham was salutatorian of her graduating class.

Four-time All-District selection, Trina Bryant, averaged 26 points a game in 1974-75 as Valley View, located 10 miles south of Gainesville, won its third district title during her career. She scored in double figures 27 times. As a junior, Miss Bryant averaged 32 points and scored 47 in one contest. Sporting an A average, she was valedictorian of her graduating class and has been active in Choral Club, FHA and the Student Council. She'll play in the

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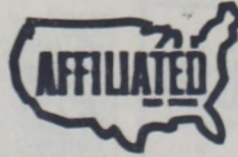

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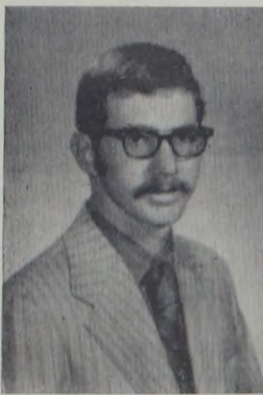

Thickening the spread thins the profit. "Spread" is the farm-retail spread, i.e., the difference in what consumers pay and farmers receive for agricultural products. "Thickening" is the unusual increase the "spread" has gone through in the past year. In January of 1974, farmers received 46 cents of a market basket dollar . . . by December their share was down to 41 . . . this year the figure could be less than 40. Growth of the "spread" is causing officials to launch specific investigations into agricultural marketing and distribution systems. Suggestions are being made to locate processing plants closer to the producer, to increase efficiency in food transportation, to locate major supermarkets in central-city areas and to take a second look at effects of labor unions. Success in shrinking the "spread" will work well for everyone. The producer will get a larger share of the money spent and the consumer will receive more product for his food dollar.
