






The Quitaque EMS held their monthly Thursday, regular meeting November 15, 1988, from 7-10 p.m., at the Fire Hall.

The program, called Growth Initiatives for Teachers (GIFT), is entering its fourth year in Texas under the sponsorship of GTE and GTE Southwest.

Since starting the program in 1983 as a pilot effort in North Carolina, GTE has expanded the program to eight states and the Distict of Columbia. Over 500 Happy Anniversary including 128 from Texas, have

won the grants. The GIFT The GIFT grant allows experienced math and science teachers to broaden their subject knowledge, network with other talented teachers, and carry out a classroom-based project for the benefit of students and school. The program is designed to offer new opportunities and enhance condary school teaching.

A feature of the program is its team approach with a GIFT team composed of one math and one science teacher from the same school.

Each team submits a school enrichment program and two professional development proposals

The school enrichment portion of the grant is \$7,000 while the professional development portion \$2,500 for each team member. Unlike previous programs, the grants do not have to be matched by the school or community.

In addition to the grants, GTE will bring together all GIFT teachers from throughout the country in late June 1989 for a week-long seminar in Boston and Washington, D.C., including a tour ao GTE laboratory facilities.

This month the Farmers Home Administration will send notices to 6,521 farmers-borrowers across Texas who are at least 180 days delinquent on their FmHA loans.

Farmers are being couraged to apply for all Primary and Preservation loan options when completing the paperwork. The Primary Loan Servicing Options include: loan consolidation; loan rescheduling; loan reamortization, interest rate re-ductions; deferrals; or debt writedowns.

If a borrower does not qualify for any of the Primary Loan Servicing Options, he may still be eligible for Preservation Loan Options, which include home stead protection and farm-land leaseback/buyback.

Finally, if a farmer is denied restructuring, he has the right to appeal the decision through a new FmHA Nationals Appeals System. Texas Farmers Union President Joe Rankin says the Ag. Credit Act Joe Rankin says farmers can seek help from credit counselors or mediation services when filling out the forms, but that they must be completed by the 45 day deadline. "If the forms aren't make this Act work."

when tested for writing mastery. Data shows that the third grade exibited a 38% mastery, compared with the state average of 76% and the fifth grade showed 55% mastery compared with the state average of 79% mastery. All other grades tested for writing mastery compared favorably with state averages. TEAMS scores for math and

reading in all grade levels was at or above the state average and analysis suggest that the school district is providing adequate district is providing adequate instruction. For the third year in succession, the 11th grade has successfully performed mastery on the TEAMS Exit Level Test The seventh grade class performed a 100% mastery for math, reading, and writing.

The school district is considering providing remedial instruction to all eligible Chapter I students through the implementation of Prescription Learning Program. If adopted, students needing remedial instruction in reading will be instructed at a level in which they can perform successfully.

Efforts to improve writing skills will be teacher delivered strategies including; increasing the volume of creative writing, improving teaching strategies for motivating creative writing, and securing resources and materials for the teaching of writing skills.

Failure rate for grades 6-12 remained consistent with previous remained consistent with previous year experiences. A high failure rate for grades 6-8 resulted in student ineligibility for extra-curricular participation following the first six weeks grading period. High school students suffered very little throughout the school year due to failures. No pass/ no play has a positive impact upon the academic performance of all students.
